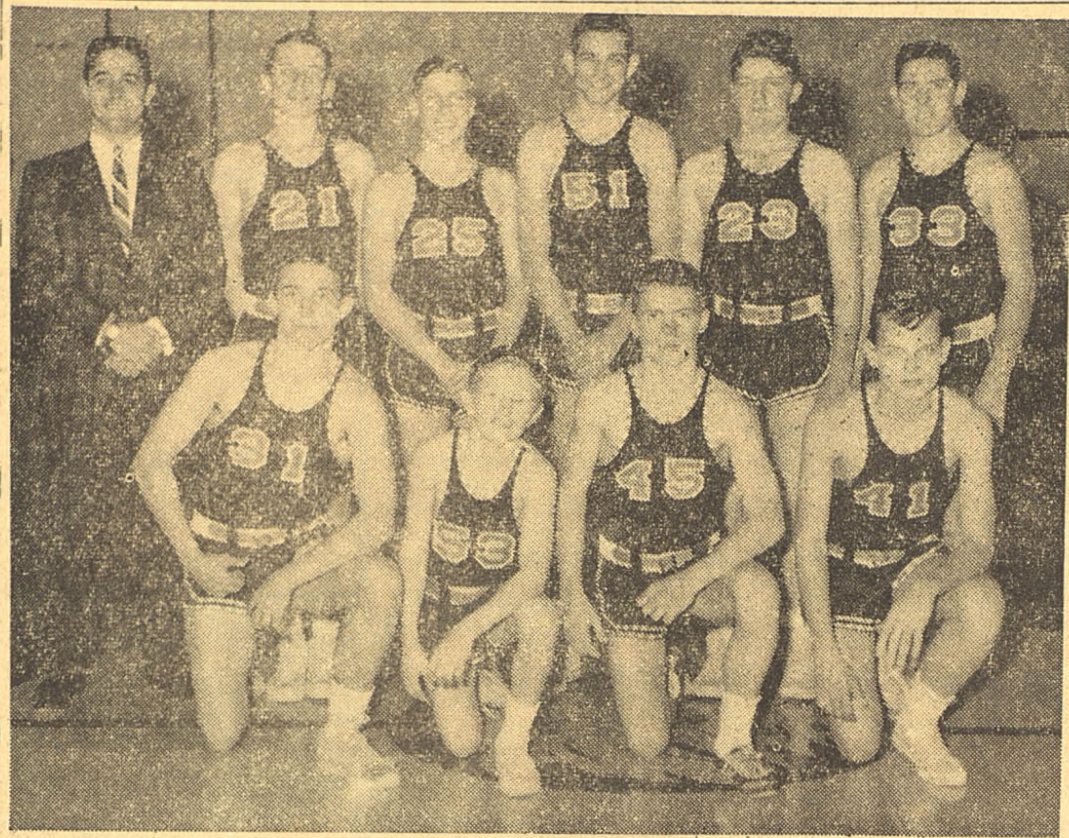

County Funds Will Earn Interest; Election Officials Are Named

Eastland County money will earn interest for the first time as the result of a contract awarded this week by the Eastland County Commissioners Court to Eastland National Bank to serve as depository for county funds.

The Eastland bank bid was the only one submitted for commissioners consideration at their regular meeting Monday morning, when they also named general and special election judges and alternates for the coming year, and accepted the Hamilton-Duncan Road as a neighborhood road near Lake Leon.

County funds will earn three per cent interest, held in time deposits of 30 days, and commissioners are to work out a schedule of which funds will be placed in interest-earning accounts. A county depository is named every two years, and the Eastland bank has been chosen for several years, it was reported.

County funds include permanent improvements, school, county clerks, district clerk and other county funds.

A check for \$2,500 accompanied the bank's bid as security, and the agreement to be entered into is to be approved by the state comptroller's office.

Motion was made by Buck Collins of Rising Star and seconded by C. B. (Runt) Dill of Cisco.

An application and bond from J. R. Bucy for independent weigher at Rising Star was approved by the court.

The Hamilton-Duncan Road comprises about a half to three-quarters of a mile off FM 2214 south of Lake Leon, and is to be dedicated to the county by the General and special election judges (listed first) and alternates named are:

One Leg of Interstate 20 Completed in This County

The six-mile stretch of Interstate 20 west of Cisco to the Callahan County line has been completed and accepted from the contractor and work is moving satisfactorily on other highway projects in the county, Resident Engineer R. P. Haun has announced.

Cecil Ruby Co., Inc., had the contract for grading, drainage, structures and hot mix asphaltic concrete paving on a bid of \$1,893,546.04 on the 6.212 miles beginning one mile west of Cisco and extending to the Callahan line. The highway department accepted the job Saturday, Feb. 6, Haun said.

Cooper & Woodruff, Inc. is 30 per cent complete on a project extending 5.660 miles from a point 1.5 miles east of Ranger to a point 3 miles west of the Erath County line, with IH 20 specifications and bid for \$1,086,119, Haun said. Base is presently being hauled for the south lane and traffic will probably be turned onto that lane in the next few weeks, he said.

Right-of-way negotiations are moving ahead of schedule near Cisco for the five-mile stretch from State Highway 206 eastward, and are expected to be completed in time for a possible mid-July bid letting, he said. This IH 20 strip is a Unit One construction and will include sub-grading and bridges.

Right-of-way negotiations for the strip around Ranger are lagging, he said, and are from four to six months behind the Cisco strip, indicating a probable January bid letting for that section.

Third section to be undertaken will be the five-mile leg from mid-Eastland-Cisco to the Highway 6 junction south of Eastland.

Preliminary drawings are being completed at the local Highway offices for the section between Eastland and Ranger and are to be submitted to the state and to the Federal Bureau of Roads for approval. A public hearing on this section will be held

after these approvals come through.

Work is moving swiftly on the 14-mile State 206 work from Sabanno to Cisco and the department looks for a mid-summer completion date, he said.

Engineers Will Submit Proposals On Sewer Plant

A discussion concerning plans for the sewer plant was the main business taken under consideration at the regular city commission meeting Tuesday night.

The plant has been for several years inadequate, City Administrator John Bohannon said. A drawing of the present sewer plant, including dimensions, etc., has been forwarded by Mr. Bohannon to Freese, Nichols and Endrus, consulting engineers in Fort Worth, for their examination. They will submit to the commission a proposal to either

rebuild the plant or install a new plant.

In other action a 25-year optional lease on the property owned by the city on which the Girl Scout House is located was granted by unanimous vote. The request for the lease was made due to plans by the Girl Scout Association to make major improvements on the house.

One resolution, to declare an election to be held Saturday, April 6, for the purpose of electing two city commissioners and a mayor, was passed.

Strong Rangers To Be Opponents

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College, who are scheduled to meet the strong Ranger JC basketball team in conference play at community gym here at 7:30 p.m. Thursday (tonight), advanced to No. 2 in national ratings in polls released this week. Dodge City, Kan., still was in first place.

The CJC moved up from No. 4 in national ratings released last week. Coach Leland Willis' team continued to be No. 1 in the three-state Region Five. They stood 5th in national scoring with a 101.3 point average.

The Wranglers have a record of 23 victories and one loss for the season and are 8-0 in conference play. The Ranger team is 16-5 for the year with a conference mark of 7-2.

Cisco won a victory by a narrow 80-to-79 margin in conference play with Panola JC at Carthage last Tuesday night. It was a hard-fought game all the way and the score was 46-45 at half time. Cisco's biggest lead was six points, and the Wranglers were behind by one point at one time.

Frank Biggers led scoring for the game and for the Cisco team. He had 11 field goals and four free tosses to post 26 points. Sturrock of Panola was second high with 25 points.

402 Students In Classes At CJC For Second Term

Enrollment of academic students for the second semester of the 1964-65 school year totals 402 at Cisco Junior College, President G. C. Gogue reported to the board of regents at their monthly meeting Wednesday night at the college.

This number was compared with 326 for the second semester last year.

Mr. Gogue's report showed that in addition to the 402 academic students, the college has 103 persons enrolled in adult education programs and 17 in an LVN nursing program.

The monthly expense accounts were approved for payment. Dr. H. C. Brown, the board president, presided.

HAWAII REPORT

Editor:
In my last letter, it was mentioned that we would visit the other islands, and this has now been completed with our return today from Hawaii to Honolulu. It is good to be back to "home base" and to pick up some mail which had arrived during our absence.
We booked our island to island flights with the Hawaiian Air Lines under a special vacation rate where the wife can go along at half fare. It was such a good idea that I decided to take Elsie along for the ride. The first island visited was Kauai which is ninety five miles from Oahu in a north of west direction. We took a morning flight and was landing in about forty minutes. The weather was clear and was really a beautiful flight as we watched the fluffy

white clouds above the deep blue water of the Pacific. Perhaps you will recall those same clouds as you flew in this area some twenty two years ago.
The plane landed at the Lihue airport where we rented a small Datsun car for hopping about the island. Lihue is the county seat of Kauai. The State of Hawaii is comprised of five principal islands which are counties and make up the State. Lihue is not a big town but is growing and building. All the islands have good airports since air travel is the principal transportation method. We registered at the Hale Punahele Hotel. It is a small place but found it very clean and comfortable. There are large plush hotels on every island but to see the everyday folks we found the smaller hotels more satisfactory.
Kauai is a beautiful island, and this goes for all we visited. We soon headed west along the large cane fields toward Waimea Canyon. The cane fields are irrigated in most

cases with water coming down from the mountains. The mountains of central Kauai are said to be the "wettest place on earth" because annual rainfall is 400 to 600 inches. This will shock Texans where we are pleased when we receive thirty inches; many years less than this amount. Waimea Canyon is a pretty place. These deep valleys and canyons have been cut by torrents of wind and rains. Most available hill-tops are cleared and planted with sugar cane. Harvesting this crop, transporting it to the mill and finally to shipside for shipment to the mainland gives employment to many thousands of workers. The island mills crush the cane and convert the juice to raw sugar. Final operations to make the white granulated sugar are done in the U. S. mainland. We stopped at the office of the OLOKELE SUGAR CO. at the town of Kaunakani and asked if we could see the mill. The office man called the plant and we

were on our way. The plant foreman, Mr. Itsuki Kajitani, met us and gave a big Japanese smile as we shook hands. First we were given "hard hats" to wear while in the plant.
The cane is brought from the fields by large trucks. The small trains which formerly did this are just about gone. Where men once cut the cane with large knives, today large bulldozers do the job in much the same way as they clear mesquite in the Cisco area. Large motor cranes lift the huge piles of cane from the fields to trucks. Cranes unload the trucks at the mills and build huge stacks high as a three story building. An overhead rail crane then picks up large amounts of the cane and places it on the conveyor which carries it to the crushers. After passing through the crushers the residue cane pulp is almost dry and quite warm from the tremendous squeeze it gets. After the process is completed we have a beautiful yellow granulated substance which smells like good sorghum molasses. The trip was very interesting and informative. All we did was ask and we received a personally conducted tour by a friendly Mr. Kajitani.
After looking over the south coast line we returned to Lihue for dinner. Next morning we took the highway up the east coast to Haena. Many beautiful hotels are along this route, also the prettiest golf course I've seen. You can imagine what can be done in this climate with plenty of water and a good caretaker. The beach along the east coast is very scenic. The Waialua river flows from the mountains through deep valleys where dense ferns, flowers and every form of greenery thrives. Beautiful waterfalls are quite common. After much looking at flowers, mountains and sandy beaches we reluctantly turned the Datsun toward Lihue where we caught a plane back to Honolulu. We rested overnight and then caught a morning plane to Maui. By the way, Kauai is called the "Garden Island", and correctly named. Pineapples are the second best money crop here in Kauai.

Maui is called the "Valley Island," and quite aptly so because of the large and beautiful valleys. The highest point in Maui was covered with snow this morning as we flew in from Hawaii. We were detoured north of Maui because of the big Navy explosion from Kahoolawe scheduled this afternoon. We landed at the Kahului airport where another little Datsun awaited us. We rent these cars for twenty four hours for \$5.00 plus five cents for each mile driven. It works so much more satisfactorily for us because we can see anything where a road leads us. The ocean was wild at Maui. People were evacuated from the beach areas after the tidal wave alert was broadcast Wednesday night. The rains came, landslides occurred in many valleys and roads closed. We were limited to a smaller area of Maui. We drove around to Lahaina on the west coast. This was settled by Japanese and was a prosperous fishing town. It is both old and interesting. It is the home of the islands' largest banyan tree. A few miles up the coast the Sheraton Maui is a luxurious place, also near is the Royal Beach Hotel. Both are luxurious in every detail, including

a beautiful eighteen hole golf course and wide, white sand beaches. They are about thirty five miles from the airport, and business appeared to be good. Both hotels will have a grandstand seat for the Navy's test explosion this afternoon. Kahoolawe island is in plain sight of the hotels.
We were handicapped in Maui by very stormy weather and did not see as much of the island as we first intended. Wailuku and Kahului are the two largest towns and only three miles apart, which has created great rivalry. Both are towns of about 10,000 people. Kunulu is the seaport town and about 1000 people larger. We were unable to see Mount Haleakala which is over ten thousand feet in height due to heavy low clouds. We saw it this morning as we returned to Honolulu from the "Big Island," Hawaii. Haleakala is in reality a dormant volcano whose crater is seven miles long, three miles wide, and some 2500 feet deep. No one rules out the possibility the dormant volcanoes will erupt again. All the Hawaiian islands appear to be of volcanic origin. The 1959 eruptions on Hawaii added much land area to that island as the red hot lava flowed to the ocean.
Much of the down town area seems somewhat run-down in many of the island towns. Large shopping areas seem to be springing-up out here, and no doubt will have a big impact on the older business sections. An amusing sidelight occurred at a new shopping center which had automatic door openers. I was watching

'Attorney General's Opinion Forbids Expenses' -- Brown

Eastland County Commissioners are not entitled to a \$75 monthly expense account, according to an opinion written by County Attorney Perry T. Brown, basing his opinion on a letter from the attorney general's office.

The commissioners passed Order No. Six last week providing:

"Order fixing salaries and allowance for the calendar year of 1965 providing further that members of Eastland County Commissioners Court shall receive such expense salaries as is provided for in Article 2350o of Vernon's Civil Statutes. Upon a call for the vote by the county judge motion declared passed."

The communication from the attorney general's office, dated Feb. 1, and received Friday, contained a copy of Attorney General's Opinion WW-513 (1958), and the following summation:

"County commissioners may receive the traveling allowance expense provided in Article 2350n for traveling on official business within the county, provided the county commissioners are using their

vehicles for traveling on official business within the county rather than the county furnishing the commissioners with county-owned motor vehicles for such purpose.

"The allowance provided in section 2 of Article 2350n, Vernon's Civil Statutes, constitutes allowance for traveling expense and automobile depreciation and does not constitute salary or compensation."

In an opinion submitted to county officials, District-County Attorney Perry T. Brown writes:

"It is my opinion that said Attorney General's Opinion forbids payment of such allowances in Eastland County, as said commissioners are furnished pick-ups by the county; that said opinion and Article 2350o, Section 6, clearly states that Article 2350o has no application in counties that have furnished cars or pick-ups to the commissioners as has Eastland County."

The commissioners apparently do not concur on the opinion received from the state office, stating that it is a copy of an opinion written for another county, with similar circumstances. According to County Judge Scott Bailey the court has asked the county auditor to secure another opinion specifically on this county's circumstances. The question appears to hinge on whether the pickups and trucks assigned to the various precincts actually are "provided for the commissioners".

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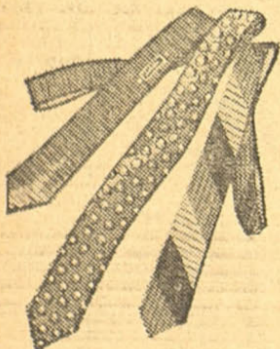

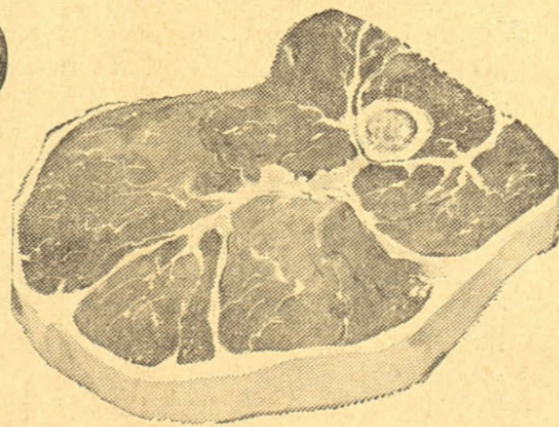
