WEEK'S REVIVAL TO BEGIN SUNDAY FOR LOCAL CHURCH

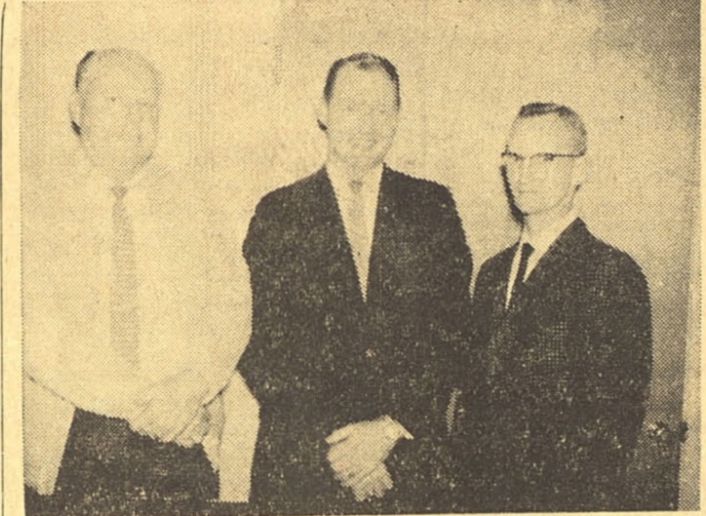

CofC Begins New Year At Tuesday's Meeting

Directors of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce elected new officers and took steps to begin a new program of civic work as they met last Tuesday noon for the first time in 1965. The meeting was held as a luncheon at the CofC offices.

New officers named were: Bob Elliott, president; Paul Blaine, Bill Boothe and Kenneth Cooper, vice presidents. Dr. E. E. Addy was the retiring president.

In taking over the president's position, Mr. Elliott told the board that "I will do my best." He said that a 1965 work program would be organized as soon as possible. Various committees to handle the CofC work program will be named in the near future.

The CofC board accepted an invitation by Mayor John H. Webb to meet jointly with the city commission at 8:30 p. m. Tuesday at the CofC office — just after the regular city commission meeting that will be held at the city hall. The work program and community problems generally will be discussed.

Dr. Addy reported that detail work was progressing on schedule in the city hospital project. The next step, he added, would be enactment of a local bill by the Texas Legislature to permit the precinct to be organized into a hospital district.

It was announced that a delegation from Fort Worth would be in Cisco at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 19, to advertise the annual Fat Stock Show there.

The board voted to participate in the Houston Boat Show by having two picture slides of Lake Cisco scenes shown in a special advertising project. Cost will be \$20 for the advertising.

Research Specialists At Wednesday EC-65 Meet See Bright Future for Area

The importance of research as a major key to Eastland County's future industrial development was accentuated during another "EC-65" seminar held at Eastland Wednesday morning.

The session, second of five planned seminars and devoted to aspects of research and analysis, was convened at the White Elephant Restaurant at 9 a. m.

Following brief introductions and opening remarks by Frank Sayre, EC-65 member of Eastland, and County Judge Scott Bailey, Dr. W. L. Fisher, research scientist of the Bureau of Economic Geology of the University of Texas, presented a summary of "Mineral Resources of Eastland County."

Oscar Castillon and Bob Browder of the area development division of Texas Electric Service Co., discussed "Specific Advantages for Plant Location in Eastland County," and Perry Shepperd and John Malloy of the industrial economics research department, Texas A & M University, presented slides and a commentary on "Sources of Information and Data."

Representing Ranger were Mayor Morris Newnham, W. T. Eaton, Dr. Theodore Nick-sick Jr., Mrs. D. E. Pulley, Bill Collings, Glyn Gilliam and Grover Lee.

Dr. Fisher pointed out that mineral resources and mineral industries play an important role in the industrialization and wealth of any area.

"In Eastland County," Dr. Fisher said, "value of mineral raw materials produced annually (chiefly oil, gas and ceramic clays) amounts to about \$5 1/2 million. After processing into manufactured products (such as natural gas liquids, structural clay products, lightweight aggregate) value, of course, is increased.

"In Eastland County," he added, "value of mineral raw materials produced is about equal to the value of agricultural products, twice the value of manufactured products, and about one-fourth the total value of retail trade."

Looking to the future, Dr. Fisher said that oil and gas production and processing will continue to play a major role in industrial development of the county. Mining and processing of ceramic clay and aggregate materials also can be further developed. Eastland County ranks 9th in Texas as a clay-producing county.

In addition, Dr. Fisher said that large deposits of bituminous coal, industrial sands, and large deposits of limestone are major resources which can be transformed into wealth for Eastland County in the years ahead.

TESCO's Castillon, in his message to the EC-65ers, stressed four major requirements for a successful industrialization program:

(1) Markets, (2) labor, (3) natural resources and raw materials, and (4) transportation. He asserted that Eastland County meets those requirements and suggested that the area could be an ideal site for plants producing fertilizer, petrochemicals and anhydrous ammonia. He also declared that a cement plant or limestone processing facility could be an ideal industry for the area.

Castillon considers the county's water resources as a major lure for industry and also complimented the area for having two colleges, Cisco Junior College and Ranger Junior College, Lone Cedar Country Club and outstanding recreational facilities making Eastland County a highly desirable place for industrial workers and their families to live.

Browder, a TESCO agricultural research specialist, reviewed the area's resources and said "There is real opportunity here." (Continued on Page Six)

New Credit Service Aid For Low-Income Rurals

A new credit service to help low-income families in rural areas raise their incomes is now available in Eastland County, according to State Director L. J. Cappelman of the Farmers Home Administration.

Mr. Cappelman said the new service opens up Farmers Home Administration credit aid for the first time to many low-income rural families who previously were unable to obtain either public or private loans to improve their earnings.

The County FHA office in Eastland, Cappelman said, is accepting applications for loans up to \$2,500 to finance farming enterprises, small family businesses, trades and services. Rural cooperatives serving low-income families and providing services and facilities not otherwise available may also be eligible for credit under the program.

Borrowers will be provided continuing management aid to help them make a success of their farming enterprises or new businesses. Farmers Home Administration, a U. S. Department of Agriculture agency, will administer the new loan service under recently delegated authority from the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Liberalized loan terms and conditions for participating low-income families allow for an interest rate of 4-1/2 per cent. To be eligible for the new rural credit program, an applicant must live in a rural area, have an income that does not cover basic family necessities, be unable to obtain credit from other sources, including the regular loan program of the Farmers Home Administration, and show a reasonable promise of succeeding in the enterprise to be financed by the loan.

COL. WHITE IS AWARDED AF COMMENDATION MEDAL

DYESS AF BASE, Texas — Lieutenant Colonel Morris D. White of Cisco was awarded an Air Force Commendation Medal in ceremonies at Vapor Trails Community Center here Dec. 31 as nine members of the 96th Strategic Aerospace Wing were retired.

Col. White had been serving as deputy commander of supply services. Col. Walter C. Stewart, the wing vice commander, pinned the medal on Col. White.

The citation which accompanied the award read as follows:

"Lieutenant Colonel Morris D. White distinguished himself by meritorious service as Deputy Commander of Supply Services, Headquarters, 96th Combat Support Group, Dyess Air Force Base, Texas, from 25 November, 1961 to 10 December, 1964. During this period, the exemplary ability,

diligence, and devotion to duty of Colonel White were instrumental factors in the resolution of many complex problems of major importance to the Air Force. The distinctive accomplishments of Colonel White culminate a distinguished career in the service of his country and reflect credit upon himself and the United States Air Force."

Col. White served as a bomber pilot in World War II. He flew 30 combat missions over Europe, winning the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal and other decorations. He held the dual rating of a command pilot and a navigator. Since the war, Col. White's assignments include duty in Berlin during the air lift, a tour in Morocco, and various posts in the Strategic Air Command since 1956. He and his wife and three children are at home on their ranch seven miles northwest of Cisco.

About 3.5 million families in rural areas across the country, including 500,000 farm families, are unable to obtain credit to develop income-increasing enterprises. The new credit program is budgeted at \$35,000,000 for the current fiscal year.

In addition to the new credit service, the Farmers Home Administration serves all rural counties in Texas with loans to finance farm operations, buy and enlarge farms, construct rural housing and develop community water systems, recreation areas and grazing land. It also provides a program of emergency loans, watershed loans and rural renewal loans.

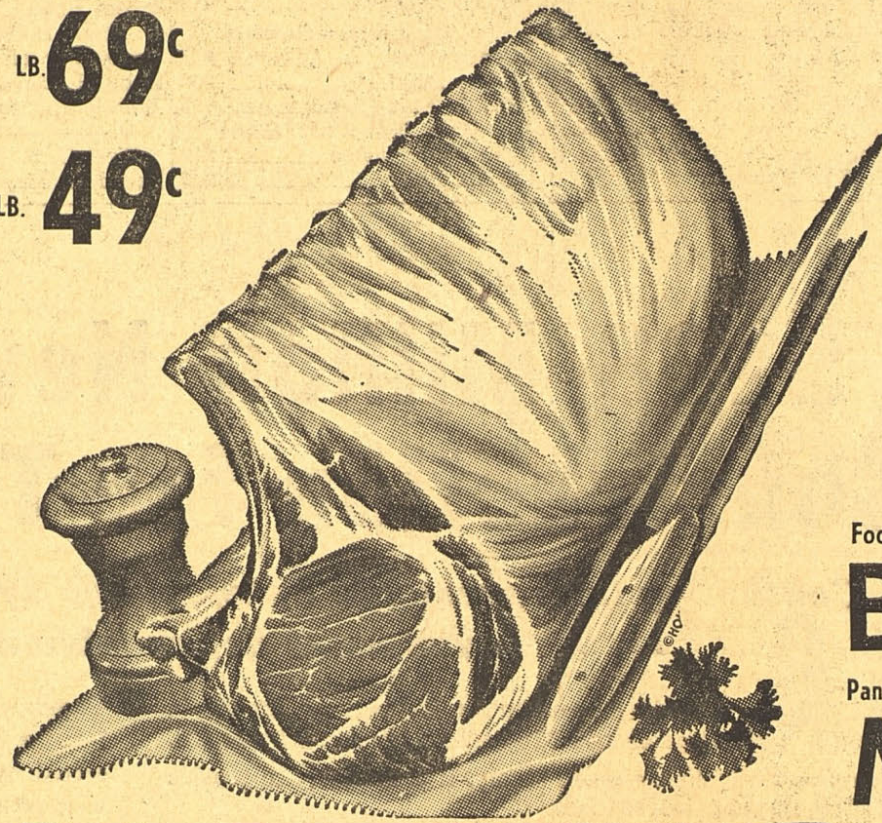

# Thurber Natives Remember Duchess By Another Monicker -- 'Wildcat' Warfield

The presence of the Duchess of Windsor in Houston, where her husband, the Duke of Windsor, has recently undergone major surgery, has stirred the memories of former residents of Thurber.

The history of the rise and fall of Thurber, located in the northwest corner of Erath County, U. S. Highway 8 east of Ranger, rivals that of the international romance of the former Wally Warfield, now the Duchess of Windsor.

The link connecting the two is the visits the Duchess made to Thurber when her grandfather, Col. Edward Dickey Hunter, was one of the owners of the fabulous coal mining and brick-making operation.

Mrs. Hazel Miller of Stephenville, whose husband, Mose Miller, was an executive with the Texas and Pacific Coal Company, recalls vividly the days Wally Warfield spent in Thurber as a 'teen-ager.

"She would come and stay several weeks in the Colonel's mansion on New York Hill or at his cottage on Thurber Lake," Mrs. Miller said. "Many of the young people thought she was an 'oddy' because of her Baltimore background, but I always enjoyed being with her. I invited her to our home for dinner, and she seemed very grateful for being invited."

Mrs. Miller recalled that Thurber was in its heyday at the time the future Duchess made her visits. More than 2,000 homes lined the streets of the bustling community, which boasted a population of approximately 10,000. Starting with the discovery of a rich bituminous coal vein in 1837, Thurber mushroomed into a brick making business that soon became the largest in Texas. Vitrified brick, used primarily for paving purposes, soon

found its way into virtually every city in the state. When oil displaced coal, the mines were closed. The clay, a by-product of the coal mining, ceased to feed the brick plants, and the two primary industries of Thurber had died.

Thurber itself did not die, it just faded into the surrounding areas. The rows of homes, formerly occupied by the miners, did not rot and fall as a monument to a ghost town, but they were sold one by one and moved to the many small communities surrounding Thurber. As

with the Duchess in some big, empty sugar barrels. "I was spending the night with Wally. She woke me up after midnight and we went outside and got the barrels. We'd get in them and roll down a steep hill toward the lake. Once I heard her say 'here goes nothing,' and she jumped into the lake," Mrs. Miller said. This type of antic probably lead to the nickname "Wildcat" which Colonel Hunter bestowed on the Duchess.

Little did Mrs. Miller, or any other person in Thurber, realize that their playmate would someday be involved in an international romance with the King of England. A romance that, in 1936, resolved into the now historical decision "My Kingdom for a Woman."

In a move that shook the royal roots of Great Britain, the King denounced his throne and married the beautiful "Wildcat" Warfield.

They later became the Duke and Duchess of Windsor.

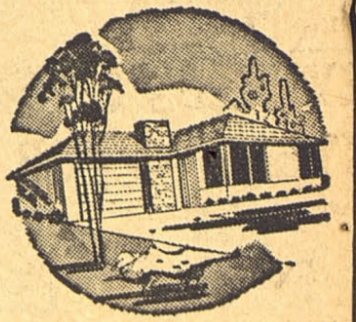
"I wish I could see her while she is in Texas," said Mrs. Miller, "and talk about the many wonderful visits we had in Thurber."

In 1933, 70,080 Americans died of tuberculosis; in 1963, 9,311. Furthermore, in the 25 years between 1935 and 1960, prescription drugs saved the lives of two million working-age victims of only four 'killer' diseases — pneumonia, influenza, tuberculosis and syphilis." tunity for agribusiness development in Eastland County." He pointed out that the county's peanut output, second highest in Texas, made it highly eligible for at least one peanut processing plant. Other possibilities, he said, include a fertilizer blending plant, meat packing, and development of commercial vegetable production.

Browder said that of the area's 600,000 acres, 80,000 are devoted to farming and the remainder to ranching. He said the county has 1,330 farms with an average value of \$35,000. Proper treatment of range lands, he declared, could increase net income per acre from 50c up to \$3.00. This, he said, would increase the county's agricultural income about \$1 million annually.

Texas A&M's Shepperd, using slides with his presentation, explained in detail sources for information which industry considers in detail in considering plant locations: (1) General description, (2) living conditions and business climate, (3) Business and industry in area, (4) utilities and communication, (5) transportation, (6) taxes and indebtedness, (7) Laws and regulations, (8) Markets, local and area, (9) raw materials, (10) labor, (11) sites and buildings, and (12) local available financing.

Harry W. Clark, executive director of Texas Industrial Commission, Austin, was featured speaker during the midday "Dutch Lunch" with the Eastland Rotary and Lions Clubs Wednesday at noon. His topic was "Putting Facts and Figures to Work."

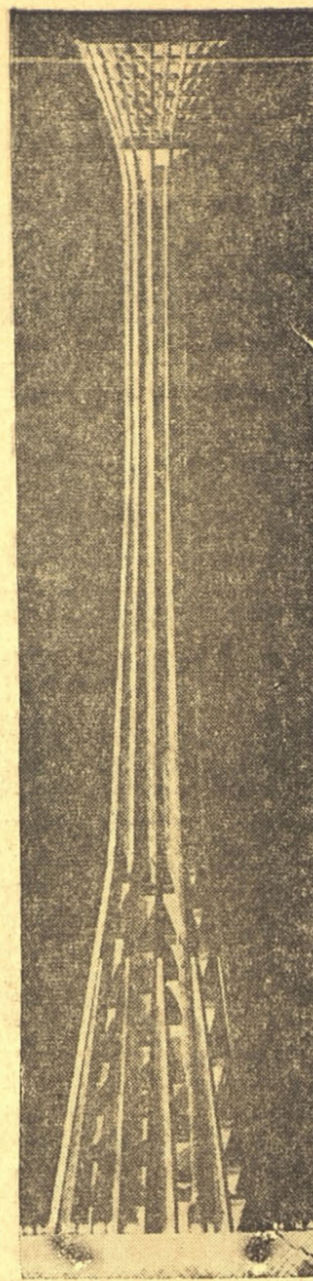

# Pee Wee Boxing Tourney Ducats On Sale Thursday

Entries from Eastland and surrounding counties are invited to enter the first annual Pee Wee Boxing Tournament to be held in Ranger on Friday and Saturday, Jan. 15 and 16.

The two nights of pee wee ring action is sponsored jointly by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and Ranger Junior College. Jack Allen, business manager of the college, is director of the tournament.

Tickets for the pee wee gloves event will go on sale Thursday in Ranger and surrounding communities. The ducats are priced at \$1.00 ringside, 75 cents for general admission for adults and 25 cents for general admission 6 years of age will be admitted free.

The juvenile fistic action is scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m. nightly, Allen said. The contests will be unrec-

ed in the new Ranger Junior College gymnasium on the college campus. It has a seating capacity of 1,400 and sponsors of the boxing tournament expect large crowds to attend the two nights of leather-slugging action.

The divisions, Allen said, will be separated in five pound brackets. From 45-50 lbs., gnat; 51-55 lbs., mite; 55-60 lbs., chigger; 61-65 lbs., flea; 66-70 lbs., termite; 71-75 lbs., spider; 76-80 lbs., mosquito; 81-85 lbs., ant; 86-90 lbs., tick; 91-95 lbs., bee; 96-100 lbs., wasp, and 101-105 lbs., beetle.

There'll be a special weight division under 45 lbs., if required, Allen added.

There will be two classes in the tournament: Novice and Open. An Open class boxer is a boxer that has had as many as six (6) fights or has been a champion. A novice is a boy who has not boxed over five (5) times.

A contestant cannot have reached his 12th birthday by the date of the tournament. Contestants must weigh in at the time allotted for this purpose and file with the tournament director a liability release signed by his parents or guardian.

Champions and Runner-up in each weight division and class will receive trophies. Team trophies will be presented to the championship team and runner-up in both the Novice and Open Divisions based on number of points.

The weighing in ceremonies will be conducted at the gymnasium between 3:30 and 6 p.m. on Friday, January 15. No entries will be accepted after 6 p.m.

The current rules as set forth by the A.A.U. will govern the tournament unless otherwise specified. Rounds will be of one (1) minute duration with one (1) minute rest. There will be three

judges and a referee. The decision of the judges will be final.

Pairings will be made between 6 p.m. Thursday, January 14, and 3 p.m. January 15. Pairings will be posted on the bulletin board of the Ranger Junior College gymnasium.

The pee wee leather-slugging event will preface the regional Golden Gloves Boxing Tournament to be held at the college on Thursday, Saturday and Monday nights, Jan. 23, Jan. 30 and Feb. 1.

The tournament is sanctioned by the AAU, officially approved by the Texas Interscholastic League, and is one of several similar elimination boxing events staged over the state under sponsorship of the Texas Golden Gloves Athletic Assn.

Eligible to compete in the three nights of ring action are amateurs from 16 to 26 years of age who desire to compete in one of three classes — open, novice or high school.
