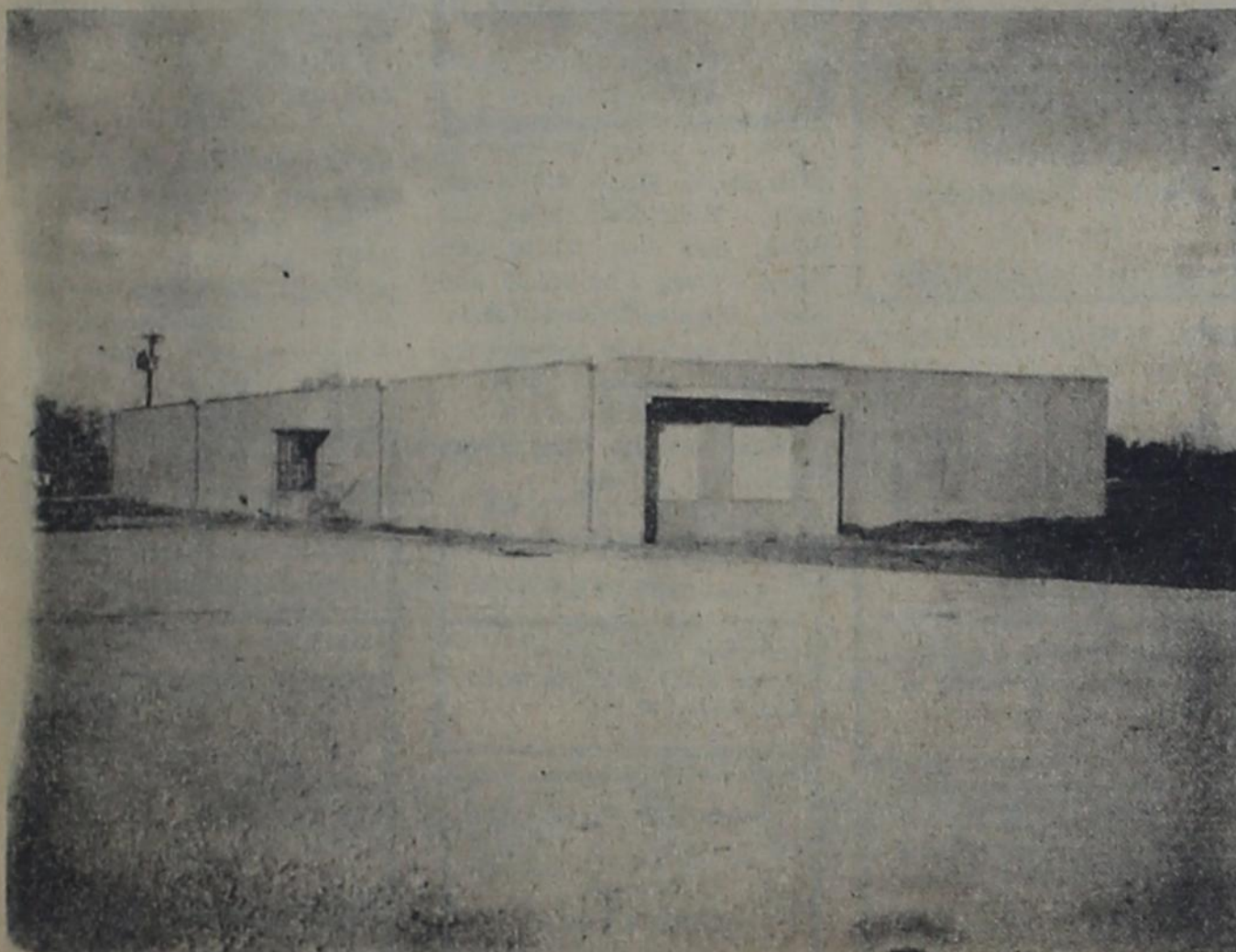

Dental troubles may not kill you, but sometimes they can make you wish you were dead. Check in once yearly with your dentist to make certain your teeth and gums are in good shape, and let him teach you the proper way to maintain your dental health every day.

Do your clothes seem to fit a little more snugly these days? If so, it could mean you're putting on weight, which is a lot harder to take off than it is to put on.

It's difficult during the holiday season to pass up the goodies which come your way. But if you've overdone it, resolve to start passing up the candied yams, gravies and cream-filled tidbits which almost invariably spell extra pounds and perhaps an early grave.

Too much weight contributes to high blood pressure, and may be associated with hardening of the arteries and various forms of heart disease. Also, it means impaired vigor, greater surgical risk and greater danger from otherwise minor illnesses.

On the other hand, if you've noticed an unusual loss of weight, you should consult your physician.

A good, physician-prescribed exercise regimen will keep your body in shape, tone up your heart muscles and put the spring back into your step.

Safe driving is a habit everyone should get into. Drive and walk defensively, and you'll be less apt to wind up as one of the state's traffic statistics. And don't forget that the 55 mile-an-hour speed limit saves gas, saves lives, and applies to everyone.

While disease in Texas continues to be relatively low, the threat of epidemics hasn't subsided. Check the immunization records of your entire family - not just the children - as a safeguard against diseases and their complications.

Getting plenty of sleep is another resolution which will be of benefit - especially during the cold winter months when the body's defenses should be their peak.

Nutrition goes hand in hand with proper rest. To provide your body with the essential nutrients to make it function properly, proper diet is necessary. Resolve to put tasty and nutritious foods to work for your body.

Don't overlook fresh fruits and vegetables. People living in towns and cities owe it to themselves and their neighbors to obey local and state laws pertaining to health protection.

For example, if your town has a dog leash law, adhere to it. Keep your animals in good health and protected from rabies, which is still a threat - especially in rural areas.

There's another good resolution you can make. Resolve to give an occasional thought to such awesome problems as water conservation, pollution abatement, juvenile delinquency, drug abuse and the growing number of elderly people in our society.

Lend your support as a responsible citizen to community efforts to solve them. After all, they affect you, too.

Your health should be of great concern to you. So get the good health habit by putting some healthful resolutions to work.

It has been a long, colorful, light-filled trip for Pink Floyd, the English rock group now starring in the movie "Pink Floyd."

The film captures the uniqueness, the independence, and the imagination that have made Pink Floyd the top group in its field.

Such a group could have come only from England, where avant garde has always been encouraged.

And Pink Floyd has always been avant garde despite its vast commercial success that has included a multi-million-dollar American tour, hit songs, and soundtrack music for three motion pictures.

Pink Floyd was formed in 1964 by Roger Waters (bass guitar), Rick Wright (organ/piano), Nicky Mason (drums) and Syd Barrett (lead guitar/songwriter).

The Floyd was part of an obscure underground movement by rock groups that went beyond simple pop songs and added a rather wild theatricality to their performances.

Barrett's soaring creativity has been described as "psychedelic fairy-tale rock, electric free-form amorphous rock, and his own unique form of mad-gleam-in-the-eye humor whose music could as easily come from the bowels of an insane asylum."

Barrett did indeed later wind up momentarily in asylum, and was replaced by Dave Gilmour, whose strong presence is easily sensed in the "Pink Floyd" movie.

Through Gilmour, Pink Floyd expanded into the virgin territory of space rock that made its mark in the movies "More," "Zabriskie Point" and "The Valley" and more recently resulted in the fantastic hit album, "Dark Of The Moon."

Much of the new direction comes from bass guitarist Roger Waters who has become intrigued by the possibilities of the growing electronic music technology.

And Pink Floyd has developed that free-form concept as an important part of their total performance.

They use a 360-degree sound system which makes not only their recording work extra-dimensional but also works for them in concert halls where such effects as rivers have babbled down the center aisle while birds chirped in the rafters.

It was that approach to rock music that brought Pink Floyd above ground and beyond their cult reputation.

Now their music is lyrical, searching, merging their rock with vast orchestras and choruses, with classical overtones, presented with bold theatrics from lights to overpowering volume.

All of that is captured in their "Pink Floyd" full-length feature film which is rich in superimposed images - from volcanic fury to giant hands - and performed mostly in the ruins of Italy's Pompeii.

It is a swirling, misty, musical look inside the heads of Pink Floyd.

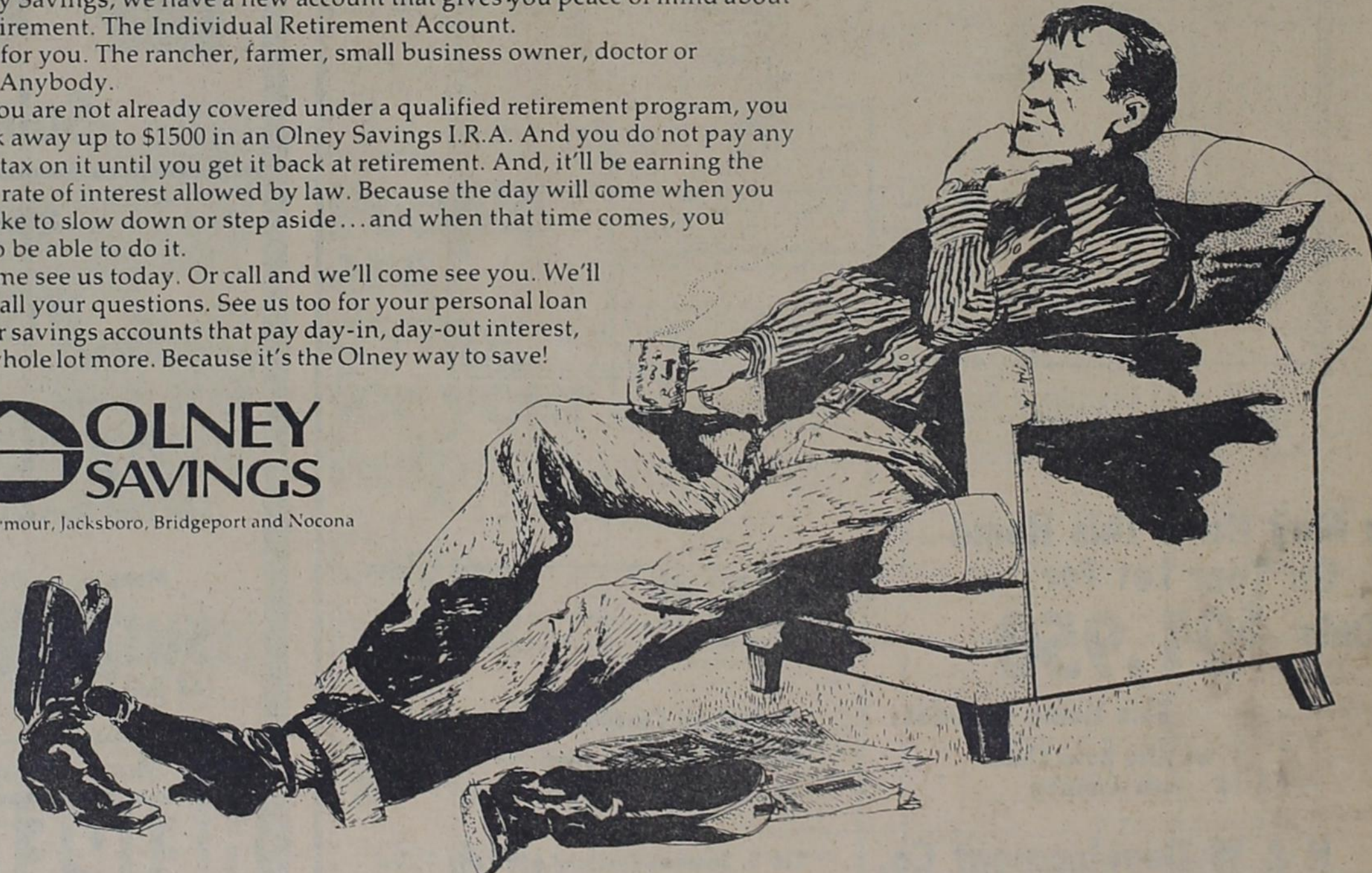

MILK PRODUCTION CHANGES—Milk production in Texas has changed drastically in Texas during the past 25 years since dairymen have operated under federal milk marketing orders, points out an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Daily milk delivery by Texas dairymen has increased from 503 pounds in 1951 to 2,908 pounds today. Class I (fresh milk) sales have also changed—the volume of homogenized milk has dropped while skim milk volume has jumped sharply. Flavored milk sales have also increased while buttermilk sales have dropped. Prices to dairymen have virtually doubled but so have their production costs.

**Supply Demand Can Bring About Dramatic Switches**

The law of supply and demand can bring about some remarkable switches. One dramatic example is the status of fur trapping in Texas within the past five or six years. In 1970, it was predicted that the fur trapper running his traplines would become as much a relic of the past as the blacksmith or iceman. The decline in trapping was attributed to low fur prices and the fact that youthful trappers had become more urbanized and not so eager to earn their pocket money by tramping through the woods. The boom was in synthetics and there was ready availability of attractive artificial furs. Fur farms also were a factor in the market. But two or three years ago, the picture started to change. High operating costs of fur farms and the upswing in price of petroleum products and derivatives began to have an impact on the cost of synthetic clothing. Natural furs again came back into vogue, for reasons of versatility as well as the economy. Another significant factor was increased demand from Europe for American furs, perhaps because of reduced wildlife habitat in Europe. Fur-trapping in Texas has become a multi-million-dollar industry. Almost 10,000 trapping licenses were sold by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in 1974-75 and an estimated 700,000 animals were harvested with a wholesale value of some \$4,200,000. Increases in license sales and prices of pelts are continuing this current season. The fur-bearing species in Texas that now are bringing the greatest returns are the raccoon, ringtail, gray fox, and red fox. According to Pierce Uzzell, P&WD program director for nongame, these four species in recent years are comprising more than 60 percent of the furs bought and 80 percent of the revenue of the Texas trapping industry. The P&WD has wildlife management responsibilities relative to furbearers and see the need for in-depth studies of the status of these species in Texas. P&WD personnel in each region of the state will make random samples of fur houses during five consecutive trapping seasons. Pelt or carcass samples of raccoon, ringtail, gray fox and red fox will be examined to collect data on sex-age structure and breeding condition. This information will be correlated with fur harvest information, to determine the significance of annual harvest of these resources on the overall population, as well as indicating population trends. The department's objective is to continue viable populations of these valuable species, through prudent management which will benefit not only the industry but the economy of the state as well.

**Directory Assistance Charge Included in Telephone Rate Order for Texas**

The Texas Public Utility Commission in an order dated December 14, 1976 authorized a new plan for charging for calls to Directory Assistance throughout Texas. This plan will be effective January 7, 1977.

The plan ordered by the Commission provides for a charge of 20¢ for each call — after the first 10 calls each month — and includes an exemption for customers with visual or physical handicaps.

A maximum of two numbers may be requested during each call to Directory Assistance.

Customers will not be charged for Directory Assistance calls for long distance numbers in the Home Area Code if there is a corresponding long distance call in the same monthly billing cycle.

Customers with multiple-line service are allowed one additional call per month per line up to the first 25 additional lines. They will also be allowed one-half call per month for each line beyond 25.

Centrex and PBX customers will be allowed 10 direct dialed Directory Assistance calls per month for the first group of six main stations within a system at no charge. They will also be allowed one additional call per month for each additional group of six main stations up to the first additional 25 groups — and one-half call per month for each additional group beyond 25 groups.

Customers with Dormitory Centrex service will be allowed 10 direct dialed Directory Assistance calls per month for each main station or student billing card at no charge.

Customers who have already been certified for an exemption as handicapped need not reapply. Included is a coupon to claim an exemption for those not already exempt. Coin telephones and hospitals are also exempt.

Additional information regarding changes in billing under the Commission's order will be included with your telephone bill.

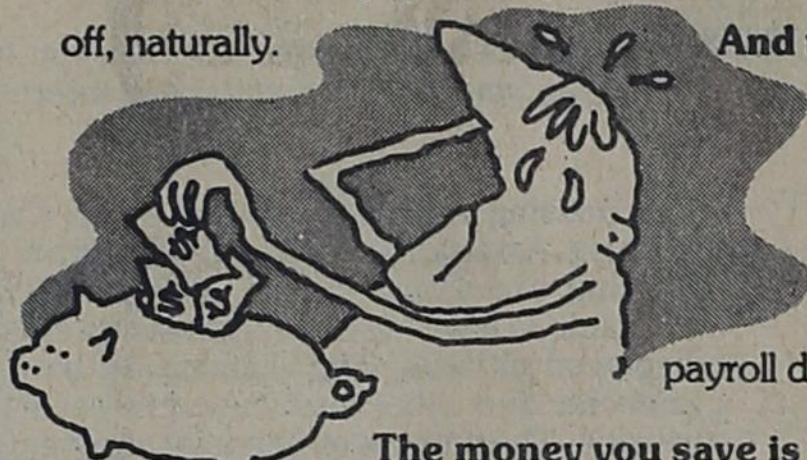

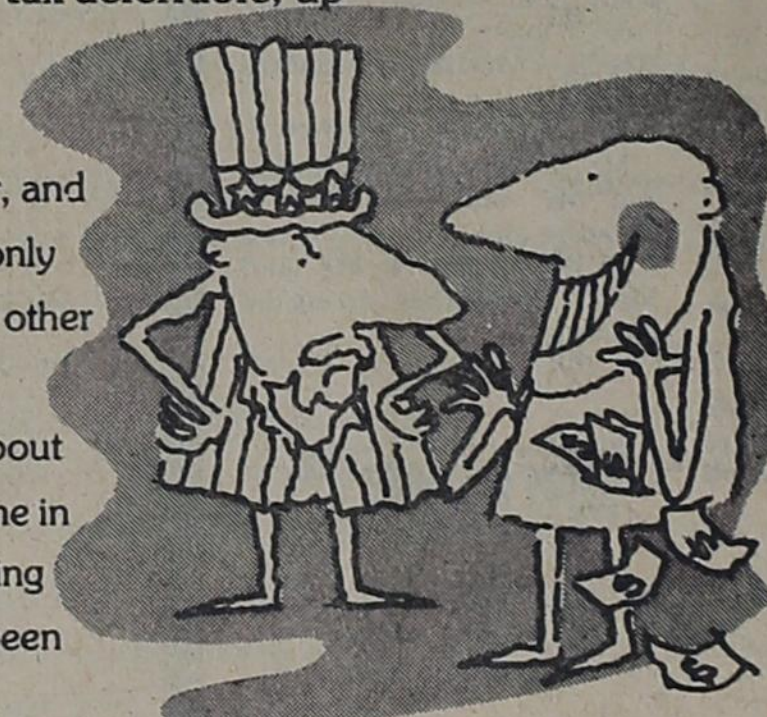
