The paying contractor that just finished the Highway 80 project between Baird and Abihas submitted a bid on paving streets in Baird, and their report was made to Callahan County Club Wednesday noon when the club met in the basement of the First Methodist 113 Church. The paved streets will 46 cost property owners \$1.50 per 11 front foot. Property owners 6 for 58 around the courthouse block 5 for 170 have previously agreed to pave 3 for 15 their streets, and many more 3 property owners over the town are expected to ask for the paying. # - EDITORIAL

HARRY BERRY GAVE BAIRD ITS FIRST GARAGE

As the scenes of life's story are flashed on and off the great screen of time, characters move across the stage, make their bow and find the exit and more players enter to enact other scenes, it is sometimes difficult to remember just what took place in the earlier pages of the story. So it is in the early days around Baird. Now and then someone brings to our attention a leaf out of Baird's history book and we see more of the play with Baird as the stage and local people as the characters. How we wish we could have come into this theatre and seated ourselves on the front row when the curtains were first drawn back on Baird's history. Now in sketches from this one and that one we piece together many of the pages of this interesting story that tell of the joys and sorrows, laughter and tears of a wonderful people.

Harry Berry is a natural born engineer and craftsman. In the October 18, 1928, issue of The Baird Star we read an advertisement headed "Baird's Garages." The ad went on to say "Forty years ago there wasn't a garage in Baird! And it took the greater part of a day to go from here to Abilene with a horse and buggy. But in this year of 1928 A. D. Baird has seven good garages. It is an astounding growth from the time when Harry Berry opened the first garage here — but there's a real reason for that growth.

So we learn that it was Harry Berry who gave Baird its first garage. Some uninformed writers have in the past bestowed this honor upon other individuals, but the Baird Star ad which ran back there in 1928 was published by the garage men in business here at that time. They must have known the facts.

Harry Berry has not made his exit from Baird's business stage. He operates his own machine shop at his home in west Baird, and when folks have a tough mechanical problem to solve, they run to Harry Berry, and the thing always turns out all right. Among the items Mr. Berry has made with his own hands and whatever material was available is a miniature car. The car is a cute little trick, but it is as practical and sturdy as any of the big new models that are so popular today. Two people can ride with ease in his home-made car.

We salute Harry Berry as Baird's first garage man; a man who has applied his ability to become more skilled in his handiwork even until this day.

### 1881

Seventy years ago women wore hoop skirts, bustles, petticoats, corsets, cotton stockings, big bottom shoes, ruffles cotton drawers, flannel nightgowns, puffs in their hair, did their own cooking, baking, cleaning, washing, ironing, raising big families, went to Church Sunday, were too busy to be sick.

Men wore whiskers, square hats, ascot ties, red flannel underwear, big watches and chains, chopped wood for stoves, bathed once a week, drank ten cent whiskey and five cent beer, rode bicycles, buggies, or sleighs, went in for politics, worked 12 hours a day, and lived to a ripe old age.

Stores burned coal oil lamps, carried everything from needles to plows, trusted everybody, never took an inventory, placed order for goods a year in advance, always made money.

Today wowen wear silk stockings, short skirts, low shoes, no corsets, an ounce of underwear, have bobbed hair, smoke, paint, cuss and powder, drink cocktails, play bridge, drive cars, have pet dogs, and in for politics.

Men have high blood pressure, wear no hats and some no hair, shave their whiskers, shoot golf, bathe twice a day, drink poison, play the stock market, ride in airplanes, never go to bed the same day they get up, are misunderstood at home, work five hours a day, play ten, die young.

Stores have electric lights, cash registers, elevators, never have what the customer wants, trust nobody, take inventory daily, never buy in advance, have big overhead mark up, mark down, quota budget, advertising, stock control, annual and semi-annual, end of month, dollar day, founders day, rummage, economy day sales and never make any money.
