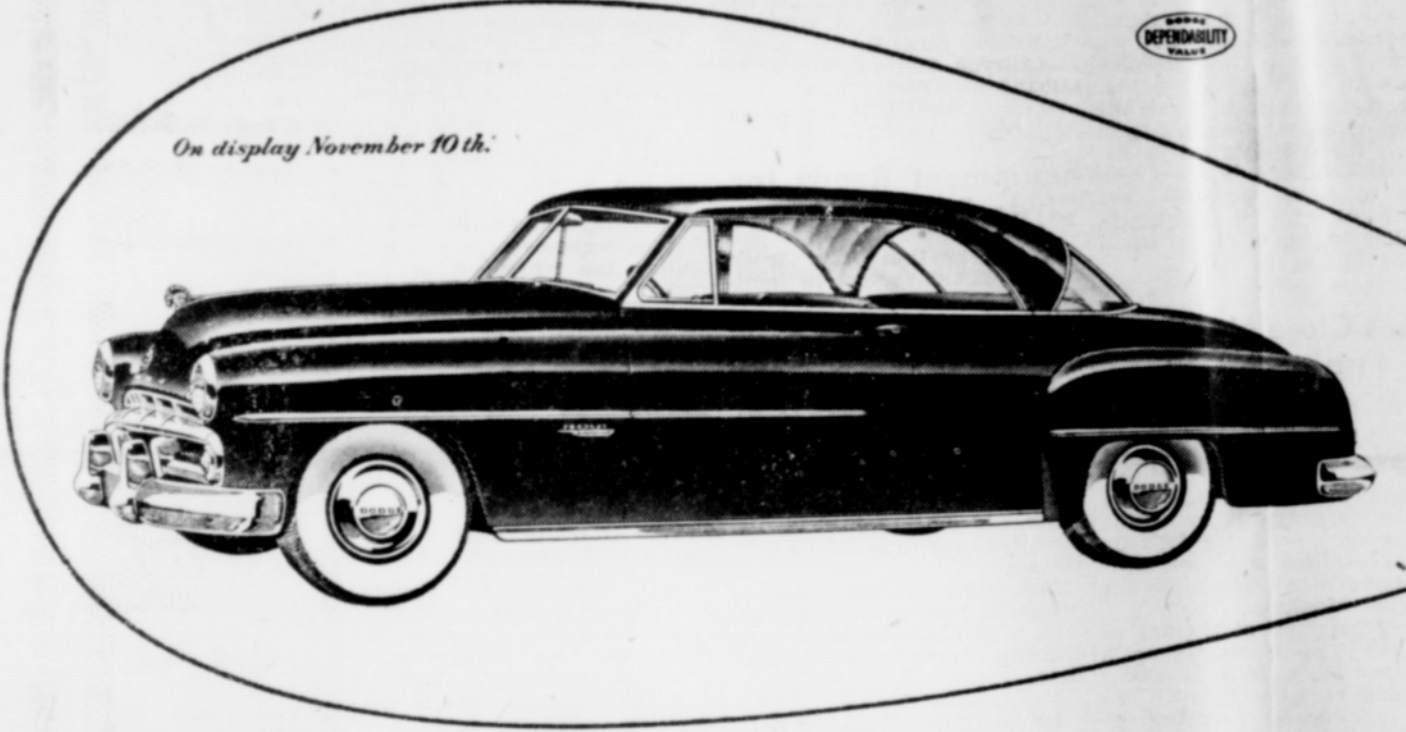

HARRY BERRY GAVE BAIRD ITS FIRST GARAGE

As the scenes of life's story are flashed on and off the great screen of time, characters move across the stage, make their bow and find the exit and more players enter to enact other scenes, it is sometimes difficult to remember just what took place in the earlier pages of the story. So it is in the early days around Baird. Now and then someone brings to our attention a leaf out of Baird's history book and we see more of the play with Baird as the stage and local people as the characters. How we wish we could have come into this theatre and seated ourselves on the front row when the curtains were first drawn back on Baird's history. Now in sketches from this one and that one we piece together many of the pages of this interesting story that tell of the joys and sorrows, laughter and tears of a wonderful people.

Harry Berry is a natural born engineer and craftsman. In the October 18, 1928, issue of The Baird Star we read an advertisement headed "Baird's Garages." The ad went on to say "Forty years ago there wasn't a garage in Baird! And it took the greater part of a day to go from here to Abilene with a horse and buggy. But in this year of 1928 A. D. Baird has seven good garages. It is an astounding growth from the time when Harry Berry opened the first garage here — but there's a real reason for that growth."

So we learn that it was Harry Berry who gave Baird its first garage. Some uninformed writers have in the past bestowed this honor upon other individuals, but the Baird Star ad which ran back there in 1928 was published by the garage men in business here at that time. They must have known the facts.

Harry Berry has not made his exit from Baird's business stage. He operates his own machine shop at his home in west Baird, and when folks have a tough mechanical problem to solve, they run to Harry Berry, and the thing always turns out all right. Among the items Mr. Berry has made with his own hands and whatever material was available is a miniature car. The car is a cute little trick, but it is as practical and sturdy as any of the big new models that are so popular today. Two people can ride with ease in his home-made car.

We salute Harry Berry as Baird's first garage man; a man who has applied his ability to become more skilled in his handiwork even until this day.

1881

Seventy years ago women wore hoop skirts, bustles, petticoats, corsets, cotton stockings, big bottom shoes, ruffles cotton drawers, flannel nightgowns, puffs in their hair, did their own cooking, baking, cleaning, washing, ironing, raising big families, went to Church Sunday, were too busy to be sick.

Men wore whiskers, square hats, ascot ties, red flannel underwear, big watches and chains, chopped wood for stoves, bathed once a week, drank ten cent whiskey and five cent beer, rode bicycles, buggies, or sleighs, went in for politics, worked 12 hours a day, and lived to a ripe old age.

Stores burned coal oil lamps, carried everything from needles to plows, trusted everybody, never took an inventory, placed order for goods a year in advance, always made money.

Today women wear silk stockings, short skirts, low shoes, no corsets, an ounce of underwear, have bobbed hair, smoke, paint, cuss and powder, drink cocktails, play bridge, drive cars, have pet dogs, and in for politics.

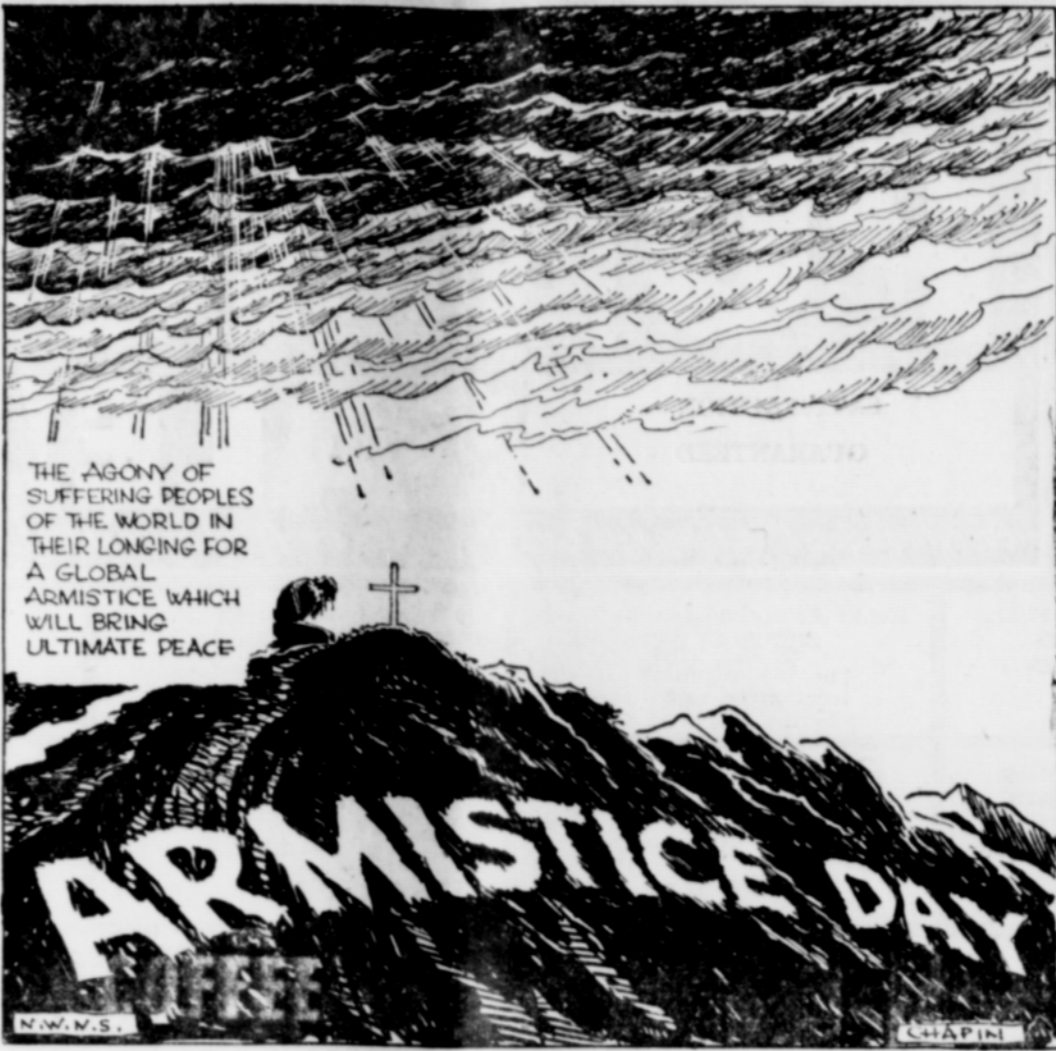
Men have high blood pressure, wear no hats and some no hair, shave their whiskers, shoot golf, bathe twice a day, drink poison, play the stock market, ride in airplanes, never go to bed the same day they get up, are misunderstood at home, work five hours a day, play ten, die young.

Stores have electric lights, cash registers, elevators, never have what the customer wants, trust nobody, take inventory daily, never buy in advance, have big overhead mark up, mark down, quota budget, advertising, stock control, annual and semi-annual, end of month, dollar day, founders day, rummage, economy day sales and never make any money.

Star Editor Will Speak At Annual Meeting Of Texas Editorial Association In Galveston

The Star editor, Marvin Hunter, will attend the thirty-fifth annual meeting of the Texas Editorial Association at Galveston, November 15, 16, 17. He will appear on the program Friday morning to speak on "Reader Interest in Local Historical Sketches or Stories."

A member of the executive committee, Hunter has been attending this association's conventions every year for thirteen years. Members do not pay dues to belong to the Texas Editorial Association. There is no registration fee at the conventions. The host city furnishes the entertainment and pays the bills. The only membership requirement is that a person must have been actively engaged in editorial or publishing service for twenty years.

The Star will be published earlier than usual next week to enable the editor to leave on the Eagle for Galveston at noon Wednesday. Therefore, we are requesting our advertisers and those who wish to send in news to let us have your copy as early as possible so next week's paper may be printed before Wednesday noon. You will greatly assist your home town editor in this way, and all you do shall be sincerely appreciated.

Last November the Texas editors held their convention in Laredo and Monterey, Mexico. That was a wonderful meeting and we gained much from the joys of fellowship with the newspapermen who made that trip. It is indeed enlightening and uplifting to sit at the feet of the senior members of the Fourth Estate and hear them tell of their experiences while blazing new trails in the jour-

nalistic frontier when Texas was young. The editorial buddies greet each other with open arms upon arriving at the meetings, and when the three-day course of events come to a close, their good-byes are bathed in tears. Each year the list of the deceased members grows longer, and the pioneer newspapermen are fast fading into the great beyond. Perhaps there shall be some of the younger set of editorial writers who have associated themselves with this organization to carry on the traditions set forth by our beloved pioneer editors. It is, to say the least, inspiring to spend three days with this group of editors; to hear them talk over old times, to get their views on current problems, and enjoy the glow of those happy hours for many a day thereafter.

Among speakers on the three-day program will be: Thomas A. McCarthy, president Galveston Chamber of Commerce; Calvin Clyde, Jr., of the Tyler Courier-Times-Telegram, who will speak on "Some Day I want To Be An Old Newspaper Man, Too." O. J. Wilkerson of Port Neches Chronicle, will tell of "Importance of Forthright Editorial Interpretation and Comment." "Informational Services from A & M College," will be told by R. Henderson Shuffler. Franz W. Zieske of Bellville Times, will give "Experiences As A Representative in the Legislature." Russell W. Bryant of the Italy News-Herald will explain "A Way Weekly Publishers Can Obtain Pictures." "Joys of the Editorial Profession," will be spoken by George Carmack, editor, Houston Press. Don H. Hinga, roving editor of the Houston Chronicle, will tell

"What an Editor is Up Against." W. R. Beaumier of the Lufkin Daily News will speak on "Newspaper Publishers' Stake in Proper Forest Conservation." A. J. Brown, assistant editor The Gulf Coast Lumberman, Houston, will speak on "Trade Publications." T. C. Richardson, Texas editor The Farmer-Stockman, Dallas, will conduct a Round Table discussion. LeRoy M. Anderson, Denison Press, will tell "As I See It."

Jiffy Plum Pudding

- Grease a baking dish holding about 3 cups.
- Mix { 1 1/2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon allspice, 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Blend in a mixture of { 1 well-beaten egg yolk, 1 tablespoon cooking molasses, 1/2 cup Fat Milk
- Mix in { 1 cup seedless raisins
- Fold in { 1 stiffly beaten egg white
- Put into baking dish. Cover and bake in moderately slow oven (350) 45 min., or until firm.
- Let stand in baking dish 5 min., before turning out. Serve with hard sauce if desired. Makes 4 servings.
