Driver Safety Lesson Taught CHS Students

Good attitude, courtesy, and moral responsibility were stressed as the most important attributes of drivers in a safety promotion program presented to Cisco High School students Monday morning by W. F. Leonard Jr., vice president of the Texas Safety Association in Austin, and manager of the insurance department for Oak Farm Dairies in Dallas.

A veteran promoter of traffic safety, Mr. Leonard has presented 1,042 such programs during the past ten years for schools, conventions, service clubs, Boy Scout meetings, and other organizations. He assisted the Jaycee Club in inaugurating the annual Labor Day Rest Stop in Cisco in 1959.

Using charts and a wealth of humor, Mr. Leonard captured the interest of students with the caption on the first poster — "It's Wonderful to be Alive!"

The importance of responsible driving was emphasized by charts and statistics, even as the speaker gave humorous accounts of human behavior behind the steering wheel.

"In Cisco during 1964 there were 85 persons injured in

automobile accidents, with 20 total losses, one fatality and \$44,000 property damage," Mr. Leonard said. Reminding students that each was his brother's keeper, Mr. Leonard said that safety includes freedom from harm, self protection, protection of others, and protection of property. "Cars are power, and they grade a man on his reach of maturity of handling his power," the safety expert concluded.

The program was sponsored by the Cisco Jaycee Club, and Al Anderson, president, introduced the speaker. Other Jaycees present were Al Evans, James Cotton, and Paul Huffman. Highway Patrolman Dan Nowlin of Abilene also attended.

White Auto Loss Placed At \$700

A police investigation was underway today after two Cisco business firms were hit by burglars last Saturday night. Victims of the robbery were the White Auto Store, owned by John H. Webb, and Ray's Trading Post, owned by Ray Thompson.

Police Chief S. E. Parkinson issued a reminder to all teenagers today that the city's curfew, which calls for them to be off city streets by 10 p. m., would be strictly enforced beginning immediately.

The White Auto Store had a loss of between \$700 and \$800, Mr. Webb estimated. The sum of \$110 was taken from an unlocked safe along with some 40 wrist watches, 40 to 50 pocket knives, six transistor radios and other items.

Mr. Webb said the burglars used paper sacks from under the checkout counter to sack up their loot. An 8x10 photograph of the late President Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson was torn from a frame that also had two Kennedy half-dollar coins mounted inside. Two old pistols were also missing.

Mr. Webb said the burglar apparently used a ladder to climb on top the Dixon Auto Store building next door. They then removed two skylight panels and entered the White building.

This was the third time the White store has been robbed since Mr. Webb went into business here in 1946. The loss was not covered by insurance, Mr. Webb added.

The Ray Thompson store was also entered through a skylight, police said. The loss there included several wrist watches, pocket knives and small tools. An estimate of the value was not available, but it was expected to be \$100 to \$200.

Chief Parkinson said they hoped to use the curfew to keep the number of potential prowlers to a minimum. He believed the two jobs were the work of the same group.
