About Your Health.

Our forefathers proclaimed Thanksgiving Day for the purpose of expressing thanks, not only for the bountiful harvest but for the sturdy health and endurance that has permitted them to survive the hardships and exposure, that first vigorous year in America.

Texans, this Thanksgiving Day, have much to be thankful for in the way of personal and community health.

Increased standards of living and improved hospital facilities have given our infants a better chance for survival, our children and adolescents a healthier happier life and our grownups longer life and usefulness.

Figures revealed by State Health Department show what strides have been made toward keeping our population alive and healthy. A few developments for which we should be particularly thankful are:

Nearly one-half million normal babies were born to Texas parents during the two year period between September 1, 1958 and August 31, 1960. This adds up to an average of 682 babies born each day.

Only 151,000 Texans died during the same period; a ratio of more than three babies to every death.

The excess of births over the deaths during this two year period added some 347,000 to the State's population. That increase combined with newcomers now making their home in Texas swelled the population to 9.5 million.

During the last 25 years, deaths during the first year of life have dropped from 71 per thousand to less than 29 per thousand. And maternal death have dropped from 6.9 per thousand to a ratio of 0.3 per thousand.

In addition to pointing out that our infants and their mothers have a better chance of surviving than ever before, these figures bring to light one other important development. Man's longevity has been greatly increased. We now live longer and have the opportunity to see more life giving and life saving developments in the health and medical fields. And for this we should be thankful.

Bob Robinson of the Roysse City American present a good case on behalf of the newspaper as a tool of democracy and, at the same time, provokes a little thought on the individuals, part in civic affairs, by taking the negative points in human nature. Have you ever been guilty of these attitudes?

1. Don't pay taxes. Let the other pay his. Vote against taxes. Then fuss because the city doesn't offer all the conveniences a city should.

2. Never attend any of the meetings called for the good of the town. If you do, don't have anything to say. Wait till you get outside, then cuss those who made the suggestions. Find fault with everything that was done.

3. Get all the city will give you and don't give anything in return. Write unsigned letters to the editor demanding more for your tax dollar.

4. Talk cooperation, but don't do any work for your city unless you get paid for it. And by all means refuse to serve unless they make you chairman.

5. Never accept an office. It's easier to criticize than to do things. Accuse everybody who serves in an elected office of being a publicity seeker.

6. Don't do any more than you have to. When others willingly and unselfishly give their time to make a better town, howl because that town is run by a clique.

7. Don't back your fire department or your police department or even thank them for endangering their lives that you might have a safer town in which to live. Demand special treatment, raise Cain if anybody expects you to obey traffic and parking laws.

8. Look at every proposition in a selfish way. If you are not the one who gets the most good out of it, vote against it. Never consider what it will do for the town as a whole.

9. Don't do anything for the youth of your town. Criticize them as potential delinquents. Keep your feet on them. Encourage them to move away when they grow up.

Wheat, Barley Deadlin

Tommi Callahan County Stabilization Conservatio. Farmers that only a few days remain in which growers may file applications to take part in the 1962 winter wheat stabilization and the 1962 feed grain program for winter barley.

The deadline is December 1, 1961, the Chairman declared, which means that producers may sign up in either program at any time through Friday, December 1.

Farmers who take part in the programs will be eligible to receive special payments for diverting a part of their acreage from the production of wheat (or barley, as the case may be) and devoting that acreage to an approved conservation use, and they will also qualify for price support on their 1962 crop.

The 1962 wheat support is at a maximum national average of \$2.00 a bushel. While the 1962 barley price support has not yet been announced, it will be at a level not less than for 1961. The national average support price for 1961 -- crop barley was 93c per bushel.

Virtuoso of the Koto at Carnegie Hall



Kimio Eto, one of Japan's foremost musical artists, recently gave a brilliant recital on the koto before a captivated audience in New York's famed Carnegie Hall. Mr. Eto has been totally blind since the age of five, but has become renowned as a composer and a master of the koto. The koto is a 13-stringed instrument made of paulownia wood. It is placed in front of the musician and is played with three ivory plectras attached to the thumb, first and second fingers of the right hand. After its introduction to Japan in the eighth century, it was played for court music for about 400 years. Since then it has found its niche as an instrument for many young Japanese ladies.

County Agent By TRAVIS ALLEN

The new sales tax is concerning everyone and its effect on agricultural products is being felt. Some items have not yet been acted on by the Comptroller's office, but here are a few items that may be of general interest. Articles exempted under Ruling No. 13, include "the sale of, storage, use, or other consumption of any form on animal life of the kind which ordinarily constitutes food for human consumption." This includes beef cattle, poultry and swine. Also exempted is feed for these animals. Dog food, horse feed and bird seed are examples of items not exempted. Seeds and annual plants which produce food for human consumption, and fungicides, insecticides and fertilizers applied to them are also exempted under the ruling. Trees, bedding plants, household insecticides and lawn fertilizers are examples of commodities not exempted.

Farm machinery or equipment exclusively used or employed on farms and ranches in the production of food for human consumption, feed for any form of animal life or other agricultural products to be sold in the regular course of business will be exempt but that parts for farm

She also knows that a teen age daughter may suddenly acquire an uncanny ability to sense, and to tiptoe out of sight and hearing, when the words kitchen, canning and cooking are about to be spoken. Just what can a six year old do other than get in the way? Many things! Shell peas, snap beans, ruff cookies, squeeze grapes to separate skins from pulp, and run fruit for sauce or butter through a colander or food mill.

When she is three or four years older, she will take pride in doing the whole butter making job on her own. This simple, but flavorful recipe will be one she'll cherish in those future years.

Peach Butter
A wholesome, delicious, inexpensive and easy-to-make spread for toast and other hot breads.
8 cups peach pulp 1/2 teaspoon salt
6 cups light brown sugar 1 teaspoon pure vanilla
Wash, scald, drain, pit and peel ripe peaches. Put peaches into kettle with 2 or 3 cracked pits; if needed to start cooking, add about 1/4 cup water. Cook peaches until soft; put them through colander or food mill. Measure peach pulp, add sugar and salt and boil until thick. Add vanilla. Pour boiling hot butter to within 1/4 inch of top of pint or half pint fruit jars. Put lid on jar; screw band tight.

THE CASE OF THE MESSY TENANT
Joe Dogood and his wife rented their home to Joe's cousin, John Messmaker. The Dogoods were planning to be out of town for several months, and since Mr. Messmaker was temporarily out of work and in need of a place to house his family, Joe rented their home at a very reasonable figure. The Messmakers were very grateful and promised to pay back Joe and his wife.

When the Messmakers finally moved out, they left the house in a shambles. There were holes in the walls, the furniture was torn and broken, windows were broken, doors were off of their hinges, and the house looked as if had never been cleaned.

The Dogoods asked the Messmakers to clean and repair the house and furniture, but they refused. They said they were only tenants, and such repairs were the responsibility of the property owners.

Can the Messmakers be made to pay for the damages they caused?

The courts have generally held that the tenants can be made to pay for damages in such a case. A tenant, even though bound by no express agreement as to the condition in which he is to leave the premises at the end of his tenancy, is nevertheless under a certain implied obligation. He is impliedly obligated to so use the rented premises that it will be returned to the landlord in the same general condition in which it was rented, subject to such general deterioration as is caused by a reasonable amount of use and lapse of time.

If, by the negligence of a tenant, the rented property is materially injured, he is liable to the landlord for the resulting damages.
