## 20,000 Watch Fill Kill At Lake Sweetwater

AUSTIN - West Texas fishermen saw 47,000 pounds of fish taken from Lake Sweetwater over last weekend, but only one percent by weight represented edible fish.

Through a cooperative arrangement between the City of Sweetwater and the Game and Fish Commission, a complete kill was undertaken on the lake. It was treated with more than eight tons of chemicals.

Some 20,000 persons witnessed the treatment, and more than 1,000 boats belonging to fishermen of the area were on the lake Saturday and Sunday. Most of the kill was shad and carp, with quite a few bullheads, according to Marion Toole, director of inland fisheries. The program was developed and handled by biologists Larry Cambell of San Angelo and Leo Lewis of Wichita Falls and their staffs.

The workers said they saw two fairly large catfish, one weighing 17 pounds, and another 12 pounds, taken from the lake.

Practically every bass taken out weighed more than 2 pounds, indicating that there were no yearling bass stock in the lake. Only two crappie weighing more than one pound were observed.

The treatment was applied by a barge, which spread the dry chemicals on the water surface. Work boats with spray tanks got into the covers where the barge could not work. Previously, some 18 miles of the watershed had been treated in hopes of stopping rough fish infiltration with the next flood waters.

The lake is now to be restocked with game fish produced from Game and Fish Commission hatcheries.

## Baird Grade School Shows Increase

Baird Grade School has an increase in enrollment over last year, with a total of 288 enrolling the first of school. This is an increase of 13 over last year's enrollment.

Enrollment by classes is as follows: First, 37; Second, 38; Third, 37; Fourth, 30; Fifth, 27; Sixth, 37; Seventh, 44 and Eighth, 38.

Grade School Principal H. R. Jefferies wishes to remind the parents of children who must get to school at 8 o'clock each morning, to make arrangements with the grade school office. Other students should not arrive at school each day until 8:20.

The first three primary grades get out of school each day at 2:30 and only those who ride the bus will be permitted to stay until 3:30. To be permitted to ride the bus, a student must live at least 2 miles from school, according to state law. Only in case of extreme necessity will a student be permitted to remain at school until 3:30, and these arrangements must be made with the grade school office.

## Car Inspections Begun Sept. 1st

The Texas Public Safety Commission has designated September 1 as the beginning of the 1961 Motor Vehicle Inspection period in Texas. The period ends on April 15, 1961.

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that 4,700 inspection stations were ready on Thursday, September 1, to attach the new 1961 inspection stickers to the windshields of more than four and one-half million vehicles coming under the provisions of Act. All such vehicles must display the new stickers on April 16, 1961.

Garrison said, "We feel that the vehicle inspection program in Texas has proven a deterrent to vehicle accidents on our streets and highways." He urged all motorists to get their vehicles inspected before the bad weather of winter begins.

"It takes just a few minutes to have a vehicle safety checked," Garrison said. "Yet those few minutes thus spent today could mean the saving of someone's life tomorrow."

Garrison noted that the percent of accidents in which vehicles defects were causative factors has been cut approximately in half since the program was started in Texas.

The fee for each vehicle is \$1.00 plus any repair or adjustment necessary. The average cost for inspection in 1960, including the \$1.00 fee, was \$2.00 per vehicle.

**TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:**

The Internal Revenue Service has 85 fine young Texans going to several tax schools in Dallas. Internal Revenue recruits outstanding young men and women each year, mostly from the graduating college classes in North Texas, to enforce our tax laws.

They carefully train new employees to not only understand the complexities of the tax law but how to deal fairly and justly with taxpayers. The tax training program has the theme that it is more important to administer the tax laws fairly and justly than it is to carry out the letter of the law. When these young tax men and women assume the duties of auditing tax returns, collecting tax payments, they will be able to deal with the many tough problems. We can all be thankful that these young tax people will be trained to be fair and just in working with taxpayers. It certainly helps when the people charged with law enforcement try to be human.

In Texas . . .

**DIVISION OF ESTATES EXPLAINED**

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property - cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate - is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is

divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and descendants, the full one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

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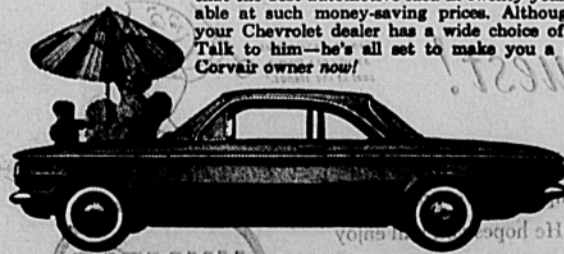

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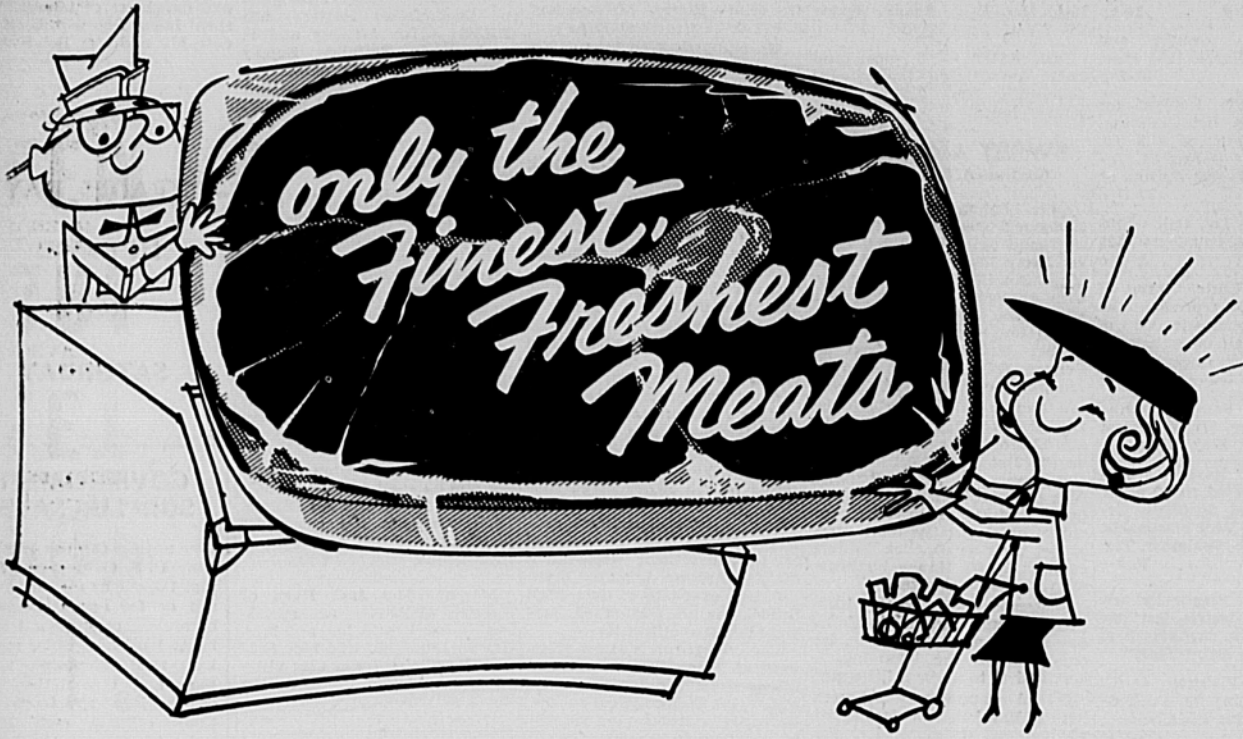
