The machine takes a spool with about three miles of the tape on it, cuts and puts it on the menus.

Another addition to the huge Cornelius building was completed recently. They turn out theatrical advertising cards and folders and restaurant menus that are shipped throughout the nation.

Assembly Of God Plans Service Of Dedication

The Assembly of God Church will dedicate their church building in a special dedication service Thursday, April 22, at 7:30 p.m., according to an announcement by Rev. Miss Thelma Hostetter, pastor.

The North Texas District Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, Rev. E. R. Anderson, will deliver the dedication sermon. Master of ceremonies will be Rev. Guy Burton was elected pastor and soon began construction in the present building which has been recently completed and is debt free.

Ministers that have served the church as pastors are Rev. Fuston, Rev. Burton, Rev. Miss Maurine Short, Rev. Howard, Rev. A. M. Harrington, Rev. E. W. Way, and the present pastor, Rev. Miss Hostetter.

Ciscoan's Truck In Road Mishap East Of Albany

Carson Holdridge of Cisco, driver for Gulf Oil Company, was taken to Eastland Memorial Hospital Friday morning for observation and possible treatment as the result of a car-truck collision at 6:30 p.m. Thursday about seven miles east of Albany on U. S. 180.

Wilma Woodby White, about 46, Lamesa High School librarian, was killed when her car and the 8,000 gallon tandem trailer-tractor driven by Mr. Holdridge collided. It was believed that the accident may have resulted from a tire blow-out.

Mrs. White's 12 year old son was taken to Shackelford County Memorial Hospital for treatment of minor injuries and overnight observation. Mr. Holdridge was taken there for treatment of leg lacerations suffered when he was trapped in the truck and got out by breaking a window. He was released from the hospital, and his hospitalization Friday morning was the result of a possible shoulder injury.

The highway was flooded with gasoline for about 200 yards and an Abilene firm dispatched a truck with remaining gasoline from the wrecked truck. It had turned over on its right side in the barrow ditch.

Leo Hatten Is Hired As Registrar At College

Lt. Col. Leo A. Hatten, who will retire July 31 after more than 20 years on active duty with the U. S. Army, has been employed by Cisco Junior College as registrar and assistant to the president for the 1965-66 school year, according to an announcement by President G. C. Hogue.

Col. Hatten, 45, will assume his duties at the college Sept. 1, Mr. Hogue said.

A native of Eastland, Col. Hatten is a 1937 graduate of Eastland High School. He was graduated from Tarleton State College and holds a BBA degree from the University of Texas and a Master's degree from George Washington University. In addition, he is a graduate of several military schools.

During his military career, Col. Hatten has seen service in virtually every theater of operations — from the Normandy landing in France during World War II to the Pacific and duty at Okinawa and, recently, a tour in Viet Nam. His decorations include the Commendation Medal for Viet Nam service, the Bronze Arrowhead and the Purple Heart for duty in Normandy, and others.

Col. Hatten is married to the former Reda Clark, a native of Cisco. Mrs. Hatten and their two daughters, Patricia, 18, and Lynn, 16, have been making their home in Cisco for the past two years with their mother and grandmother, Mrs. Leila Clark. They came here for the girls

to attend high school while Col. Hatten was in Viet Nam. He has been on duty in the Pentagon, his present assignment, for the past year.

The Hattens are members of the First Methodist Church of Cisco. He is a member of the Masonic bodies.

Mr. Hogue said that the Col. Hatten's contract was approved at a meeting of the board of regents of CJC at their regular meeting last week.

Several others will be hired for the college faculty before the new school year begins, he added. The increase in enrollment and the growing vocational school at CJC are necessitating the addition to the staff, he said.

EC-65 Seminar Is Planned May 4th

The next EC-65 Seminar in the Eastland County program to find job opportunities will be held in Cisco on Tuesday, May 4, according to an announcement Friday. This will be the 5th in a series of five training meetings being sponsored by the county civic organizations in cooperation with the Texas Industrial Commission.

The EC-65 project, which was set up last winter, is the pilot industrial development program which is being conducted by the state Industrial Commission with the aim of training community leaders in the techniques of attracting new industrial payrolls to the county.

Theme of the May 4th seminar will be "where to find industrial prospects." It will include talks on existing industries, home-grown industries, and working with professional industrial development personnel employed by utilities, railroads and banks.

Texas manufacturers and how to organize an effective program of obtaining prospects will be discussed, Harry Clark, director of the Texas Industrial Commission, and Larry Milner, his assistant for West Texas, will be in Cisco for the meeting.

Outstanding industrial development professionals from around the state will be on the program, which will be announced soon.

Local arrangements for the meeting are in charge of A. R. Kuttnerord, Cisco member of the county steering committee, and Gene Abbott, chairman of the Cisco CoC industrial committee, assisted by Manager Jim Smothers of the chamber.

Contract Due To Be Let May 13th

The board of regents of Cisco Junior College will open bids at 3 p.m. Thursday, May 13, for contracts to erect two new buildings — a men's dormitory and a student union — on the school's campus.

Plans to call for bids on the two buildings were approved at the regent meeting last Tuesday night and the notice was prepared and sent here Friday by Architect Raymond Thomas of Sherman, according to Dr. H. C. Brown, the board president.

According to the notice, which is being published elsewhere in this edition of the Press, the plans and specifications are available to contractors in Abilene, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth and Dallas at bidding centers.

Interested contractors may obtain copies of the plans and specifications by writing Mr. Thomas in Sherman, according to the bids notice.

Dr. Brown said the dormitory would house 80 men students and would be entirely modern with central air and heating equipment. It will be erected west of the present two men's dormitories.

The student union building, which will be erected between the science building and the main building, will have a snack bar, a bowling alley, a post office, ballroom, rest rooms and book store. It, too, will have central heating and cooling.

Financing for the two buildings has been arranged through the Public Housing Administration. The plans and specifications were approved by this agency in final form last week, Dr. Brown added.

The college hopes to have the buildings ready for use sometime next winter.

REPRESENTATIVE FOR CSC SPEAKS TO CJC AG CLUB

The importance of soil conservation and care of natural resources was emphasized by E. E. McAllister, representative for the Eastland County Soil Conservation Service, at the Cisco Junior College Spring Ag Club Banquet last Tuesday night at the Victor Hotel.

World population is expected to increase to 300 million people by the year 2,000, said Mr. McAllister, and two and one-half times more water, crops, and meat will be consumed. Between 1950 and 1960 there was a 38 percent decrease in the number of farms in the United States, and over one million acres of land has gone for highways, towns, roads, and urban developments, he continued.

The speaker stressed that conservation practices save crops, soil, land, buildings, bridges, roads, and even lives. It beautifies our countryside and provides and protects recreations such as hunting and fishing; and with the population explosion the need for more recreational facilities is seen, he reminded those present.

Mayor Morris Newnam was elected to head a delegation from Ringer.

Others were expected to attend from Rising Star, Gorman and elsewhere in the county as well as the district.

Gov. John Connally, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith,

will be out of the state Tuesday, resulting in Sen. Creighton's elevation to governor.

In assuming the responsibilities of the governor's chair, Sen. Creighton will carry on all routine duties for the day. Following a brief ceremony in which he will take the oath of office, a reception is to be held for friends and guests during the morning at the governor's offices in the capitol building. A press conference is scheduled with the capitol press corps, and for some 50 visiting newsmen, television and radio representatives are expected for the event from all major areas of the state.

The Eastland County Bar Association has issued a proclamation honoring Sen. Creighton, as has Mayor Frank Deaton of Eastland.

At the noon-hour, Governor Creighton will join his family for luncheon at the executive mansion. Later, he will resume his official activities in the capitol offices, where a number of conferences and meetings with constituents and other state and district leaders will be held as a part of the day's official program.

A dinner honoring Governor and Mrs. Creighton will be held at the Commodore Perry Hotel in Austin.

Indications are that the day's various functions will involve a number of prominent officials from industry, as well as political and judicial posts, at both the state and national levels and that most of these personages will be present for the evening festivities and banquet program.

Sen. Creighton has taken an active role in numerous community and state-level projects since his graduation in 1950 from the University of Texas School of Law.

As a partner in the Creighton & Creighton law firm with his father, the late J. R. Creighton, and brother, John R. Creighton, he was in 1952 and again in 1954 honored as one of the outstanding men in Mineral Wells. He served as local president and later as state vice president of the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce, and a national director of the U. S. Jaycee organization.

Creighton is past president of the Mineral Wells Lions Club. In 1959, he was named president of the Palo Pinto County United Fund, and has served as district commissioner of Boy Scouts and regional vice president of the Texas chapter of the Association of the U. S. Army.

Prior to his election in 1960 to the office of Senator for his 10-county district, Creighton served eight years as county attorney for Palo Pinto County. Married to a Mineral Wells girl, Sue Sparks, they are the parents of three sons, Thomas William Creighton, Jr., 13, Kenneth Roy Creighton, 11, and Mark Creighton, 8. Many friends in Mineral Wells recall that Tom and Sue were married on a national network program, known at the time as "Bride and Groom."

As a member of the state senate, Creighton served as chairman of the Interim Election Law Study Committee of the 58th Legislature, prior to election to his present post as head of the senate body.

About 1,300 County Families Eligible For FHA E-O Loans

Approximately 1,300 rural families in Eastland County are potentially eligible for Economic Opportunity Loans under the provisions of the Economic Opportunities Act of 1964.

Darrell G. Cooper, Assistant County Supervisor with the Farmers Home Administration, stated these loans are for the purpose of helping low-income individual farmers and rural residents raise their income level.

Mr. Cooper stated low-income families are those which have insufficient income to meet their basic needs. A typical low income family in Eastland County may be one that has only 40 or 50 acres of farm or pasture land and has limited or no outside income. The head of the household may lack the education, skill, or physical strength necessary to hold down a steady off-farm job. People in this income group are there through no fault of their own, in most cases, stressed Mr. Cooper, and want to better themselves.

Economic Opportunity Loans to farmers may be made to improve their farming operations; to buy a small tract of land; to purchase livestock; machinery, and equipment; to construct or repair needed farm buildings.

These loans may be obtained by farm and rural families to finance non-agricultural enterprises that will develop and additional source of income or expand existing enterprises to supplement their earnings. Examples of non-agricultural enterprises are farm machinery repair shop; beauty shop; a small rural washateria; saw and lawn mower sharpening shop; rural grocery store or service station; post and wood cutting business; custom garden work; tree and shrub spraying business; small fruit stand, etc.

Rural families who need a small amount of capital to improve their incomes may borrow up to \$2500 for 15 years at 4-1/2 percent interest, Mr. Cooper emphasized that

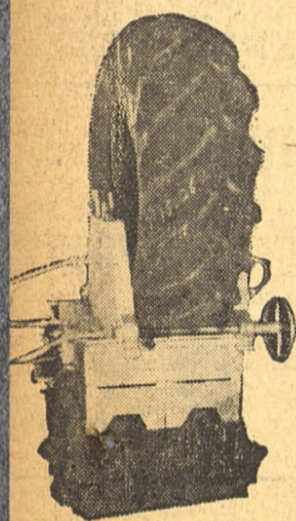

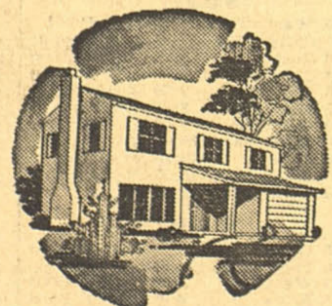
Christian Men To Hold Supper

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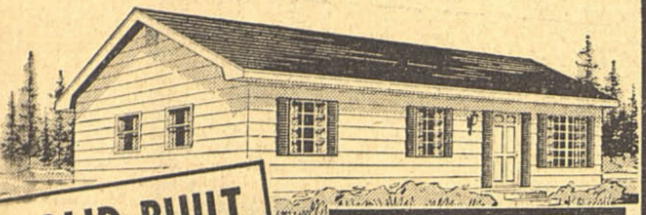
