With a seating arrangement to accommodate some 400 people, the local Legion Hut fairly bulged with 531 persons crowding in to see the show.

The master of ceremonies was Baird T&P Section Foreman "Cully" Gunn. Invocation was given by Rev. Riley Fugitt, pastor of Baird Baptist Church, and an address of welcome was made by Mayor Jim Lawrence. A few brief talks were made by Superintendent W. C. Foster, Assistant Supt. J. G. Tucker, General Roadmaster L. R. Stevens, Road Foreman of Engines Roy Stanley, and R. A. (Al) Malone, public relations representative.

Entertainment was provided by "Pop" Whitaker and the Young "Uns, a quartet of musicians from Baird; the "Sand Dunes," popular barbershop quartet from Big Spring; Jackie Stanley, daughter of T&P employe at Baird, who rendered a couple of numbers on the accordion.

A tremendous ovation was accorded Yvonne Caldwell, T&P "Pin-up" Girl of Baird, who was presented a lovely corsage by M/C "Cully" Gunn.

Two motion pictures were shown. One was an Abbott and Costello short; the other an excellent safety film entitled "A Day In Court."

Refreshments included sandwiches, cold drinks, hot chocolate, coffee and cakes decorated with the T&P Red Diamond.

Baird FFA Poultry Judging Team Win At Coleman Last Week

Charles Mosley, first year student in FFA, placed eighth in a group of 75 boys who judged poultry at Coleman last Saturday. Charles Barron, first year student also, placed eleventh and Glen Kerby rounded out the three man team who tied for third place.

The ten high individuals were awarded a certificate of recognition. Banners were awarded the four high teams. Baird FFA tied Comanche for third place. The winner, by a toss of a coin, was Comanche. Baird had to be satisfied by bringing home the fourth place banner. Baird placed third in poultry at Coleman last year. Baird FFA had a total of 2,600 points out of a possible 2,800. Curtiss Alphin and Robert Lambert were alternates in poultry.

Floyd Lee Woods, Jr., placed sixth in a group of 90 livestock judges at the same contest. Livestock judging included range cows, show bulls, rambouillet, delane, and merino sheep; swine; class of 10 feeder calves, and a class of breeding heifers.

The hogs were O. I. C. and the cattle were polled and horned herefor. The livestock judging team consisted of Floyd Woods, Frankie Carroll, and Cecil Barron. Charles Brame was alternate.

Red Horse Field Due Extension

The Red Horse Moran Sand Field in Northern Callahan County apparently has been extended a half mile at the Jones & Snyder Estate, Section 140, BBB&C Survey, six miles north of Baird.

Top of the Moran Sand was picked at 2,687 feet. A drillstem test was taken at 2,687-2,700 feet. Tool was open 22 minutes. Gas appeared at the surface in one minute and oil flowed in six minutes. There was no water on the recovery.

Pressures were unavailable. Operator then ran casing to 2,698 feet.

The same operator staked No. 2 Snyder Estate as a south offset to No. 1. It will be 330 feet from the west and 990 feet from the north lines of Section 140.

Tower Oil Co., No. 1 W. O. Kemper, et al, Section 4, Block 7, SP Survey, wildcat 16 miles southeast of Abilene, was drilling below 3,908 feet at last report.

Operator took a drillstem test in the Palo Pinto at 3,280-90 feet, with tool open 40 minutes. Recovery was 60 feet of mud and 60 feet of salt water cut mud. Shut in pressure in 15 minutes was 1,130 pounds.

Proposed depth is 4,300 feet.

We are grateful for the very fine response we have gotten in our efforts to bring our subscription list up to date. For many years weekly newspapers did not give much attention to keeping the subscriptions current. However, in recent years the cost of all that goes into a paper has increased around 300 per cent while advertising rates and subscription price have been increased only 25 per cent. Under such circumstances the weekly newspapers have been forced to adopt the system used by the dailies of terminating subscriptions when they expire.

Two of our neighboring cities have passed ordinances this week to conserve their water supply. Cisco and Albany city councils prohibited use of water except for essential purposes. Clyde residents can be grateful for their water supply and for the low rate they have to pay for it. A water rate of one dollar per thousand is not at all uncommon in Texas.

Ervon Brown's Ship Earns Battle Stars

In an issue of All Hands, from a letter from one of the crew, we find that the ship USS Brinkley Bass (DD8 887) sustained hits twice in Korean waters, the second being in the same area in which the first occurred.

On May 20, 1951, Brinkley Bass was fired upon by coastal batteries and returned fire. During the firing, Bass was hit on the starboard side beneath Mount No. 1, killing one crewman and injuring nine others.

In March, 1952, during the ship's second tour in the Far East in the area of Wonsan, Bass suffered a hit amidships on 01 level, 15 feet from the spot of the first hit. No one was killed but six men were injured.

One other time Bass had five batteries firing on her and sustained the attack without assistance. During the first two weeks in Wonsan harbor, she received counter battery fire 14 times, and 11 times during the first cruise.

The ship has rendered assistance to other ships that met with mishaps, those being the cruiser USS St. Paul and a R. O. K. frigate, the Apnok Bass has rescued several pilots forced down at sea.

The Brinkley Bass has top engineers for not a day was lost on either cruise due to mechanical difficulties.

Ervon Edward Brown enlisted August 15, 1951, and was assigned to the Brinkley Bass. He is stationed at San Diego, Cal., at the present time but will soon return to Korea in April, 1953. He is quite proud of his ship that has won two battle stars. Ervon is the son of Mrs. H. E. Wagley of Putnam.

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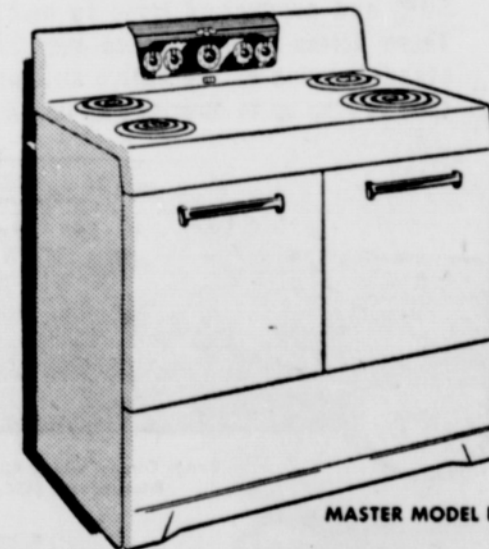
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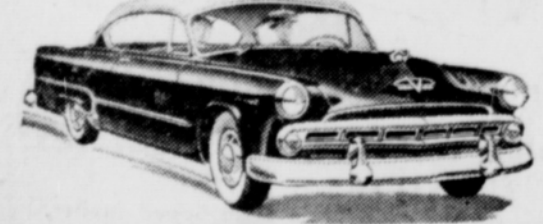

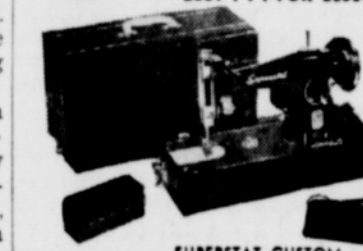

1953 AGRICULTURAL LEGISLATION

Legislative action now brewing in Austin includes laws which will eventually affect every person in the state. Chief among these are some amendments and acts which directly concern the Texas Department of Agriculture—and therefore, every farmer and rancher.

One of the announced policies of the department last year was the promotion of an ambitious program to overhaul many of the outmoded agricultural laws. Progress this far has been good.

An important law now receiving consideration for revamping by the legislature is the Texas Seed Act. This act first came into existence in 1924 and was last amended in 1941. Over the years, its weaknesses have become increasingly apparent. It doesn't provide for adequate enforcement of its desirable features and it fails to specify adequate penalties when violations occur.

A case in point was the "Paris Texas Incident" of last year. Some farmers were sold bad seed under the protective labels issued by the Department of Agriculture. But in several of those violations, the state's hands were tied due to loopholes in the law.

The Texas Seed Act specifies, in part, that samples from each bag of seed will be inspected and the bag must be properly labeled as to content and seed quality. It doesn't necessarily guarantee the "best" seed—it merely says "what kind" and lets the purchaser be the judge.

Activities of the Department of Agriculture have been handicapped by a lack of adequate funds for providing enough inspectors to keep a check on seed

sales and prevent switching of tags.

Instead of completely re-writing the TSA, some amendments have been offered. One of them provides that the project will become self-financing and that revenue will be derived from sale of seed tags. Last year, 3,600,000 tags were sold at one cent a piece, bringing in \$36,000. This was not enough, considering that the cost of printing the tags has increased from \$700 a million two years ago to nearly \$2,000 per million tags.

This year, the Legislature has been asked to raise the price of seed tags to two cents which will double the revenue. The additional money will be used to expand the force of inspectors, increase the amount of certification and provide adequate double-checks on selling activity.

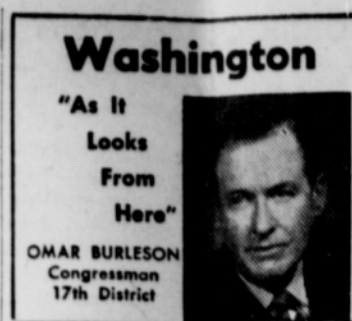
An equally important amendment would allow the department to put any noxious weed seed on the Texas quarantine list as soon as it becomes a threat to farmers and ranchers. Instead of having to wait until the Legislature comes in session before taking action, the amendment will permit a quarantine to be slapped on the seed when it occurs in another state. This would immediately prevent its entry into Texas.

These proposals of course, are subject to review of local courts and will not give the Department of Agriculture any dictatorial powers. They merely help to put some "teeth" in the present program.

It is rather a peculiar thing that most of us in public life cannot refrain from appearing on a radio or television program when invited to do so. The same thing is also true in talking to newspaper reporters.

About the only conclusion to be reached is that it is an appeal to the ego and not many can overcome the temptation. It seems I am able to do so only occasionally.

Some of you may possibly have heard the program from San Antonio last Sunday night, on which I appeared in a discussion particularly related to the death of Stalin and its consequences. The fact that no one can intelligently estimate the situation in Russia or behind the Iron Curtain at this time should be reason enough not to discuss the subject in very great detail. I know of no speculation on events which could prove more wrong in the future than the new Communist regime.

In addition to talking when one should be silent are the hazards of being partly quoted which changes the meaning intended. These hazards are always present in any type of utterance on radio, television, statements to newspaper reporters, and even in columns such as this.

A couple of good examples have developed here in Washington in the last several days.

General Van Fleet appeared before my committee the other day and testified that there was a shortage of ammunition in Korea. Top generals here in Washington say that the statement standing alone is not true. They say that at all times it is necessary to ration ammunition, depending on the place and circumstances. These generals also say that they must take a global view and not just the one spot in Korea.

This sort of talk strikes most of us as an excuse rather than as a reason. Of course we must be prepared for other military actions in other places but the shooting is in Korea.

As between the generals, it seems to be a matter of what constitutes a shortage. It seems also to be related to the degree of action at a given place. Mainly however, I think it is a requirement that the full text of their statements, rather than one simple sentence standing alone, should be carefully considered. We expect to get a clearer understanding of the true situation.

Possibly the same lifting of context, partial quotations, and misinterpretation could be applied to Senator Taft's statement a few days ago regarding the investigation of Communists in colleges and universities. Several Senators and Congressmen

have pretty well gotten their "foot in their mouth" on talking about investigating schools and churches. Some have said they did not mean what they said and perhaps they do not.

However, Senator Taft has said that he would not be willing to discharge a university or college professor just because he was a Communist. If, however, the teacher taught Communism in the classroom that would be a different thing. He would favor discharging such a teacher.

Just how anyone, who should understand the fanaticism and the conspiracy of World Communism, could reach such a conclusion is beyond my understanding. Plainly it was a shock to many of us who know Senator Taft.

I still favor banishing convicted Communists from the shores of this country. Of course those who are citizens of the United States cannot be deported. But they could be placed on some small remote island out in the Pacific where they could practice all the Communism they wanted to without contact with anyone except themselves. I introduced such a bill in the 81st Congress but never received a hearing on it. I may reintroduce it in this Congress.

The head of the Bureau of Federal Prisons says that the convicted Communists who are now in the Federal penitentiaries continue to carry on their rotten work by the underworld. Where could they find a more fertile field to impart their cancerous doctrines than with their fellow prisoners.

They should be deported and not allowed to enjoy the good air, the good earth, and the covering sky of this land of ours.
