

# **Palo Pinto County** Jury Gives Keel 20 Year Sentence

Dr. L. C. Keel on his plea of guilty, was given a sentence of 20 years in the Texas penitentiary by a Palo Pinto county jury last Friday, on charges of robbery in connection with the robbery of a filling station at Metcalf Gap, Jan. 12, 1935.

Last year, Keel became more or less active in organizing the local bodies of the Workers Cooperative league, being placed under arrest at one time for unlawful assembly, but this charge was never prosecuted, and he later was held for robbery of the national guard armony at Ranger. This charge was also dismissed when members of the Hamilton gang were arrested, and arms taken from the armony were found in their possession. His implication in the series of robberies was a surprise to those who knew him while active in the workers organizations here.

Keel, who had been missing from Ranger since the night of the robbery, was arrested a week previous to his trial in Oklahoma City, and was returned to Eastland county by Steel Hill, deputy sheriff. He was transferred to Palo Pinto county for trial on the robbery charges there last Friday and entered a plea of guilty.

Two companions of Keel, who had previously been tried in the district court at Breckenridge and one of whom was reported to have signed a written confession implicating Keel. were also tried in Palo Pinto and were given five years each.

farm families and that the general caseload will be reduced by approximately 100,000 cases when all of them have been included in the rural plan.

"We want to include all of our rural cases in the rural habilitation program and get away from further outright relief grants," said E. A. Baugh, assistant director of the Texas Relief commission. "Under the rural plan, we analyze the needs of the family, set up an operating budget and farming plan for a year and provide management to enable the family to maintain a sufficient income to meet the notes given for all advances made from relief modern wheat and other cereals; 3860. funds.

#### **Claims Waivers**

Since many of the families affected by the new order are tenants located on farm plots, landlords will be required to waive claims on this year's crops before any further advances will be made by the relief commission. If the landlord, or other lien holder, refuses such waivers, the client family will be removed from the relief roll and the lien holder so notified in writing, according to instructions issued by the relief commission.

Mrs. Val M. Keating, director of social service, said national relief officials have already criticized the state of Texas for the size of its caseload.

"The major portion of the increase has been in rural areas," she said, "and we believe that many landlords have taken advantage of the relief organization in refusing to finance tenants.'

# **Failures** Decline **During Last Month**

AUSTIN. - The number and liabilities of Texas commercial failures declined sharply during February, according to the Uniersity of Texas bureau of business research. There were only nineteen failures during the month, a decline of 21 per cent from the previous month and 41 per cent from February last year. Liabilities of the bankrupt firms totaled only \$184,000, a drop of 52 per cent from the month before and 61 per cent from a year ago. Average liability per failure was \$9,684, down 39 per cent from the month previous and 34 per cent from the corresponding month last year.

# **Can This Be** Answered?

On page 16 of an audit of the accounts of the City of Cisco, prepared under date of October 31, 1929, during the administration of J. M. Williamson, as mayor, appears the following:

#### **REFUNDING BONDS — SERIES 2, 1928.**

Number 1-226; Maturity, 1944-68; Amount, \$226,000.00; Sold, \$20,000.00; Unsold \$206,000.00; Outstanding, \$20,000.00.

Authorized: Minutes 2-32, November 13, 1928, by Ordinance to refund unsold warrants of 10-22-28, Minutes 2-32.

Below this, on a copy of the audit among the records at the city hall, and over the signature of P. H. Lambert, a member of the firm of Allred, Lambert and Nichols, which made the audit, is the following note:

"According to the records available at the close of this audit the above \$206,000.00 were not issued or outstanding at October 31, 1929 and were, therefore, not included in the outstanding bonded debt.'

Yet, in spite of the fact that the audit shows only \$20,000 of the issue were sold, \$99,000 of the issue appeared among the bonds upon which the city was sued infederal court at Abilene, in which suit the bondholders committee obtained a judgment against the city. Later more bonds of this issue appeared from other sources until records at the city show that \$154,000 of these bonds were presented for payment of the one per cent agreed upon under terms of the settlement now being consummated between the city and the bondholders.

Will Mr. Williamson explain why the sale of these bonds was not recorded, and if no sale was made, why they appeared among the bonds sued upon or otherwise outstanding against the city?

# **Two Theories And A Choice**

#### (Editorial From Citizen-Free Press)

THE statement of Mayor J. T. Berry as published in Thursday's edition of the Citizen-Free Press is as clear and forceful a wording of the reasons why the present administration should be continued in office as it is possible to make. If, after reading this statement, the voters of Cisco want to repudiate the Berry administra tion at the polls and return to the leadership that produced the conditions he described, it will be upon their own responsibility and they must accept the opinion of the rest of the world.

**F**VEN as I write this there lies upon the desk at my elbow the official record of a \$500,000 effort to mortgage the entire waterworks system and practically all of the public utility property owned by the city. Fortunately, by the prompt action of certain citizens to whose ears came news of this effort, the transaction was prevented and another half million dollars spared the conscience of this community. It could not have paid it, no more than it could pay the more than \$6,000,000 in accumulated debts that the present administration is now refunding upon a basis of 25 per cent of the whole. Consequently, it strikes the thoughtful person as amazing that, in the face of the obvious impossibility of meeting the obligations already incurred, an effort should be made to add an additional half million dollars to the debt. Perhaps it was reasoned that the city could not repay the money, after all, and it might as well get all it could while the getting was good.

THERE are two ways to look at this thing. In the first place, success of the mortgaging effort would merely have continued Cisco for a brief spell in the enjoyment of a fools' paradise at the expense of innocent investors. Certainly, the people of this town do not have the predatory instinct to employ their corporation privileges and powers to do the very thing that has sent the Mitchells and the Insulls into discard.

AGAIN, if I read aright the provisions of the deed of trust incorporated in the instrument taken from the county records, these provisions, in the event of a foreclosure, would have conferred ownership of the water and sewer systems of the city upon the mortgagees with authority to operate these under obligatory franchise from the city. Thus, in addition to increasing the burden of the municipal debt and the seriousness of

for a great inter-city system, because no utility would invest so much money in a single community service, but it would have been a mighty grave step to surrender the community ownership and control of these systems to the mere prospect. The resources of Lake Cisco can be used to greater advantage at home in the development of industrial possibilities, etc.

THE significant question at issue in this case is not whether the attempted borrowing was right or wrong. Let those who demand "action at any cost" take due heed of the fact. The issue is whether or not it is right or safe to recognize in the election of public officials a democratic delegation of authority so absolute that the citi-zens may be indebted without their knowledge. Will not that sort of philosophy lead eventually to the destruction of the rights of the individuals and the very concept upon which it is itself imposed? If the people of Cisco, the tax-payers and property owners and every person who buys a bill of goods from Cisco merchants or uses the public services must pay the public debt, is it not right that they should be permitted to assume the obligation with open eyes? Is it right to force an obligation upon the citizens, whether that obligation is good or bad, in a good cause or a poor cause?

THE past is tutor to the present, and if the people of Cisco, in the knowledge of the policies of the past, are ready April 2 to elect the antiadministration ticket and repudiate the present municipal administration, it is their privilege to do so. They have in this case a choice between two different theories of local self-government. Both of them have been tried. The results of both are known. It is their choice.







Cement was produced in the amount of 3,091,071 barrels, valued at \$5,268,605; clay products valued at \$2,000,000 were produced; 1,215,820 tons of stone valued at \$1,140,589 was mined, and gypsum totalling 112,106 tons valued at \$1,058,869 was produced. Other minerals produced in Texas in 1933 included the followng: Asphalt, 126,069 tons, valued at \$353,847; coal and lignite, valued at \$833,000; Fuller's earth 45,395 tons, valued at \$411,350 lime, 36,286 tons, alued at \$339, 305; and miscellaneous minerals valued at \$925,596.
