Revamping Of 4 County Precincts Discussed By Commissioners Court

A special meeting of the Callahan County Commissioners Court may soon be called to take official action in the redistricting of four commissioners precincts.

The proposed plan for redistricting, which Baird and Clyde are reported to support, would place Clyde alone in Precinct 1, put Baird, Putnam and Adair in Precinct 3; leave Eula, Oplin, Denton Valley and Rowden in Precinct 2; and leave Precinct 4 as it is which includes Cross Plains, Cottonwood and Atwell.

Proponents of redistricting have requested the change to equalize population figures and distribution of tax money. At present, Precinct 1 receives 30 percent of the county funds, Precinct 4 gets 25 percent and Precincts 2 and 3 each get 22½ percent.

It is expected, if the plan is adopted, that justice precincts will also be revamped along the same lines, having one justice of the peace for each precinct. Consolidation of some voting boxes is also expected.

Although Baird and Clyde are reported to be generally in favor of the redistricting, there has been some opposition reported in the area of Putnam. The

Eula, Oplin, Denton Valley and Rowden areas have shown very little concern so far.

In the last meeting of the Commissioners Court, the idea of redistricting was barely touched, but it is reported to be scheduled for action the latter part of this year or early in 1967.

Baird Bears were defeated by the Roscoe Plowboys at the Bears Den Friday night by a score of 34-14.

County Oat Fields Infested With Worms

The County Agent's office at Baird has received several reports of Army Worm infestation in oat fields, particularly in the Southwest part of the County, according to Jerry L. Lackey, Agent.

There are five species of the Army Worm, and the one noted in the county is very similar to the Corn Ear Worm, a green striped color, and ranging in size up to one inch in length.

This insect can be very destructive, depending on the intensity of infestation. Lackey said that the best control measure is ½ pound of parathion or methyl parathion per acre on fields that will not be grazed within the next 15 days.

If the field will be grazed within two weeks, then Seven is the recommended insecticide, Lackey stated.

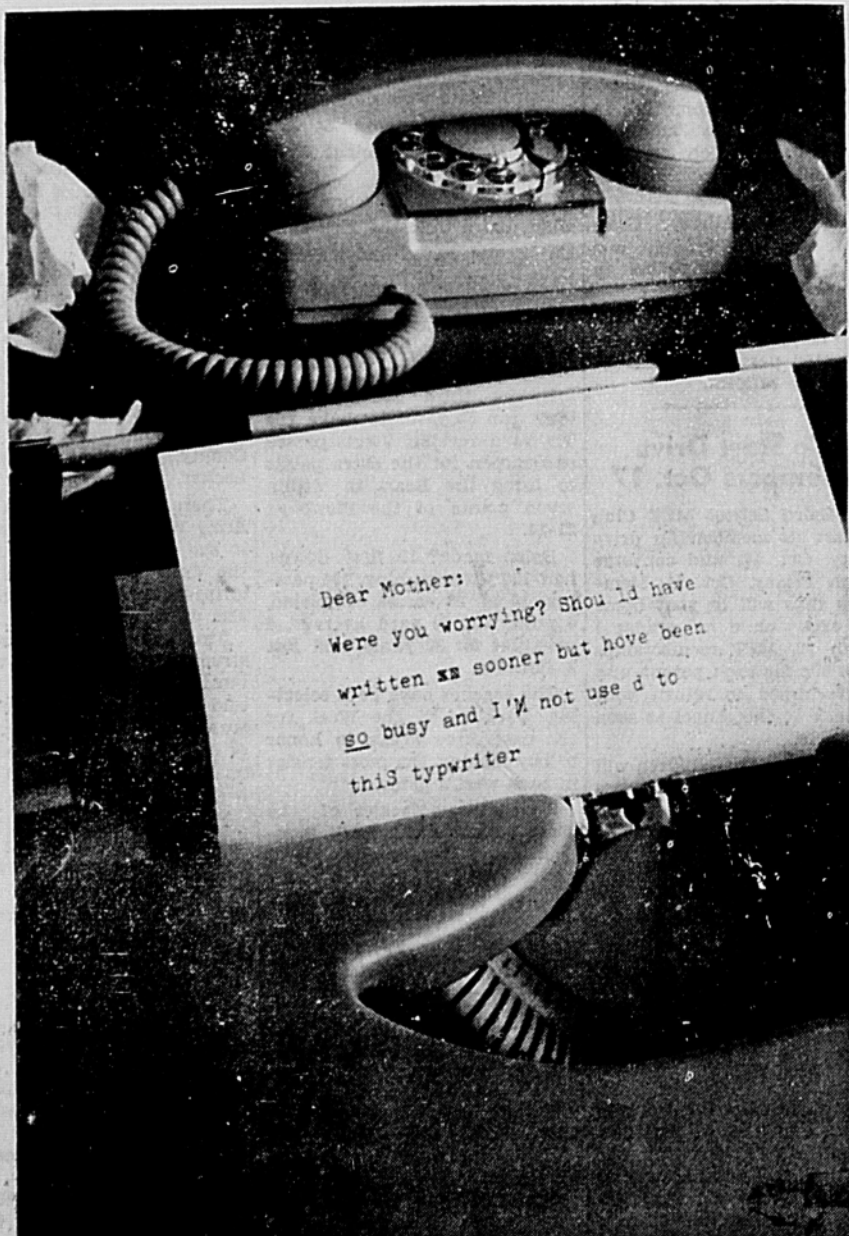

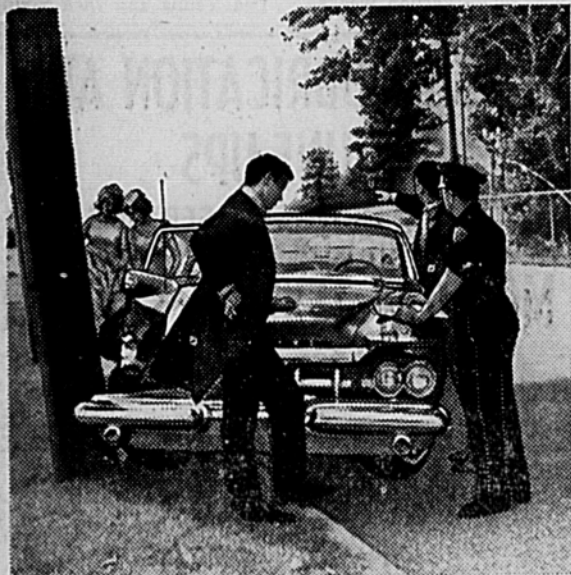

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Shape of Governor Connally's major legislative goals is beginning to emerge.

He gives high priority to his proposal for a constitutional convention to rewrite the state's basic laws.

Modernization of local governments is essential to state progress and effective management of local affairs. "Functional government by federal guidelines" is the likely alternative to a "renaissance of local responsibility," Connally warned.

Governor outlined a tough, seven-point traffic safety program including driver education for all youngsters, severe penalties for violations of driving laws and a minimum licensing age of 16.

"Without question," he acknowledged, "the 60th Legislature is looking at a raise in our state taxes, but it is impossible to tell exactly how large or how small."

He also ticked off these subjects from his lists of legislative "essentials":

Revision of the penal code and code of criminal procedure; additional sources of revenue for growing cities; substantial salary raises for state employees; continuation of progress in education, tourist and industrial development, community services for the mentally ill and mentally retarded and park system development and improvement.

In discussing streamlining of local government with county officials, the governor declared: "We cannot progress on a pre-conceived notion that modernization is politically impossible."

SCHOOL STRETCHOUT URGED — Texas children ought to start to school younger and stay in school longer, So concludes the State Board of Education in its 16-point legislative program.

Board proposes schooling for five-year-olds, state-supported summer school for all grades, a study of feasibility of a 10-months school year and seven-hour day, and higher salaries for teachers.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has ordered a new trial for Jack Ruby, who faced a death sentence for the murder of Lee Harvey Oswald the man the Warren Commission said assassinated President John F. Kennedy on November 22, 1963.

Court said Ruby must be tried elsewhere than Dallas, scene of the crime, and concluded that testimony of a police officer concerning statements indicating premeditation were improperly admitted at Ruby's first trial.

Supreme Court handed down a record 137 orders. Among its decisions were:

November 30 date was set for arguments on Humble Oil and Refining Company's suit to recover \$73,302 in franchise taxes paid under protest.

State Board of Insurance rule requiring insurance companies to charge at least six per cent interest on installment premium payments was thrown out.

Transfer of two small sections of land from Friendship Rural High School District to Shallowater Independent School District of Lubbock County was upheld.

Court will reveal dispute of Rio Grande Valley residents over possession of half of a winning \$34,000 Mexican national lottery ticket.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held that a county may provide ambulance service for its citizens under the authority given counties to spend public money on public health services.

In another opinion, Carr said that the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation may join forces contractually with the Texas Education Agency to initiate and supervise "half-way houses" to help restore mental retardates to society.

Carr also held that children with only a language skill deficiency do not legally qualify as "exceptional children," so no special classrooms may be set up for them.

EPIDEMIC CONTAINED

Texas' screwworm epidemic still is present in the Southwestern and South Central part of the state. However, Dr. S. B. Walker, director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, says the end may be in sight.

Texas' worst infestation since the screwworm eradication program began reached its height two weeks ago. Number of cases levelled off last week. Federal, state and private resources are being used to battle the worm.

MOTION FILED — Attorneys General for Texas and New Mexico have filed a motion with the U. S. Supreme Court for permission to file a complaint against Colorado for insufficient releases of Rio Grande water.

Motion was filed by Attorneys General Carr of Texas and Boston Witt of New Mexico for alleged violations of Rio Grande Compact providing for releases of water to the two states to the South. Proposed complaint says Colorado has withheld 939,900-acre-feet of water, as of December 31, 1965.

Attorneys General asked the Supreme Court to require Colorado to deliver the agreed upon amounts of water at the Colorado-New Mexico state line, and to eliminate Colorado's accrued debt under the Compact.

SHORT SNORTS

Texas Railroad Commission has scheduled a hearing for December 6 so oil and gas operators can show why a statewide ban to open salt-water disposal pits shouldn't be ordered.

Parks and Wildlife Commission has granted two extra weeks for quail hunting in Aransas, Bee, Cameron, Dimmit, Frio, Hidalgo, Jim Wells, Live Oak, Starr, Webb, Willacy and Zavala Counties.

Agriculture Commissioner

John C. White announced that the lower Rio Grande Valley has been free of Mediterranean fruit fly infestation for 60 days and the quarantine can be lifted if no additional insects are found in the next two months.

Governor Connally named James R. Meyers of Austin as interim judge of the 126th District Court to succeed Judge Jack Roberts, elevated by President Johnson to a federal bench.

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OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

BY VERN SANFORD

I'm sure that it is disconcerting to many so-called "weekend fishermen" to note the same names being published in and again in the local newspaper when catches of big bass are reported.

Many readers dismiss such feats as luck. Well... catching one trophy bass could be attributed to luck. But when an angler consistently brings in big fish, he knows something many other fishermen don't know. What's his secret?

One fact about fishing reports that many casual observers overlook, is that the same angler usually catches his fish from one or two lakes or streams near his home. He doesn't let wanderlust beckon him to way places. He fishes these "home" waters regularly.

When an angler travels to a strange lake or stream to fish, the odds are against him. That is, unless he hires a professional guide who knows the water and how to fish it.

Bass have certain spots where they prefer to hang out. Perhaps one weed bed or a submer-

ged tree on a lake is such a spot.

A sprawling man-made impoundment has so many spots, so much water, that it takes a long time before the fisherman finds these hotspots.

These are discovered by trial and error, by fishing regularly, by being observant and keeping tabs on spots which produce.

These same places pay off with fish time and again. There is something about the water and environment which bass prefer. When a big one is taken out, another lunker most likely will move in and set up house-keeping.

Once a fisherman has learned of several such spots, he frequents these often. True, he may go through "dead" periods when the fish are not biting, but when they do begin foraging, he knows his bait is in waters where he stands that best chance of getting one to hit.

There's an old saying that no lure will produce unless it is presented close enough for a bass to hit. Far too many fishermen spend time casting in places

where there are no fish.

Through experience and study, the angler also has learned which particular baits the fish prefer and at what seasons. Perhaps in early spring a plastic worm bumped right along the bottom will pay off. A month later a shallow running bait might be the secret. And in early summer a topwater plug could be the best bet.

There are many unpredictable pieces of the bass-fishing jigsaw puzzle that must fall into place before the angler is assured of success. He doesn't get this information haphazard. He has learned it by talking to other fishermen, by reading and by observing. Knowing a lake and the spots to catch fish, knowing what bait the bass prefer, all are important to success in fishing.

Every successful angler knows that if he cast a proven bait into proven waters, and if he sticks with it for long periods, sooner or later he'll prod a grandpappy bass into striking.

He knows too that tenacity is important to angling success and to catch fish you gotta keep the bait in the water... not in the tackle box.

Furthermore, he knows that big bass feed only occasionally. Thus he might cast for hours without a strike. But if he stays with it, somewhere, someplace, he'll hit the jackpot.

When preparations meet opportunity, that's luck — not fate. But it's planned success.

SOUL POLLUTION

Bible Thought: "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans 6:23)

The Pharisees and scribes were concerned with the pollutions or filth of the bodies. Jesus was not only concerned about this but was more concerned about the filth of the soul by sin. Sin is a transgression of God's law (1 John 3:4). It is by sin that men are separated from God, but it is through Christ and the gospel that we are brought into a covenant relationship with God.

Consider these facts of sin:

1. Sin originates in the heart (mind, Matthew 9:4), of man. Jesus said, "O generation of vipers, how can ye, being evil, speak good things? for out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh" (Matthew 12:34). Jesus again said, "For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies: These are the things which defile a man; but to eat with unwashed hands defileth not a man" (Matthew 15:19-20). Man's "evil thoughts" leads him to grievous sins. The biography of sin is told in James 1:13-15. James in order to warn the Christians in the first century wrote, "Let no man say when he is tempted, I am tempted of God: for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth he any man: But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed. Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin; and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death".

2. When man sins he cannot deny his responsibility. Some believe that man behaves as he does merely because of his environment and external stimuli. This stimulus-response is present in one's conduct but this does not free him from personal responsibility. "The soul that sinneth, it shall die..." said Ezekiel. (Ezekiel 18:20).

3. Sin is universal. Souls of all men are polluted. Only Christ can cleanse. "... I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me", said Jesus. (John 14:6). Yet, the apostle Peter wrote to the Christians in the first century, "Seeing ye have purified your souls in obeying the truth..." (1 Peter 1:22), which emphasizes that sin is removed through ones obedience to the truth.

4. Sin overtakes a person gradually. It has been said that we enter sin like an animal that slowly enters a pond and not like a bullfrog that enters the pond suddenly and with a big splash!

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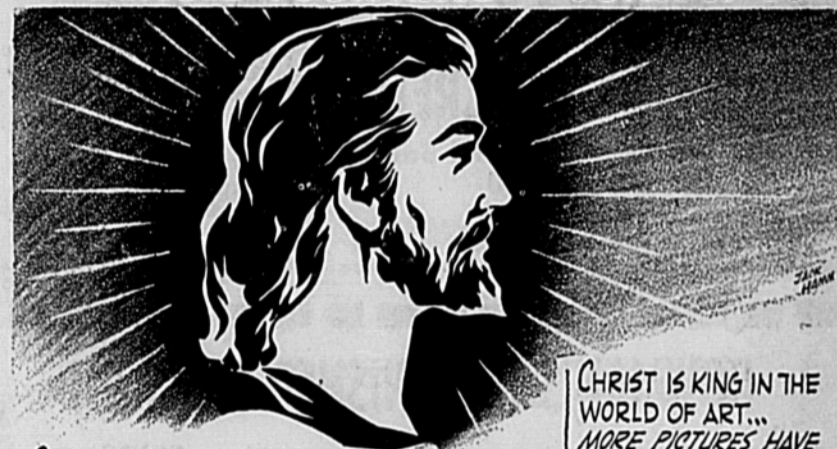

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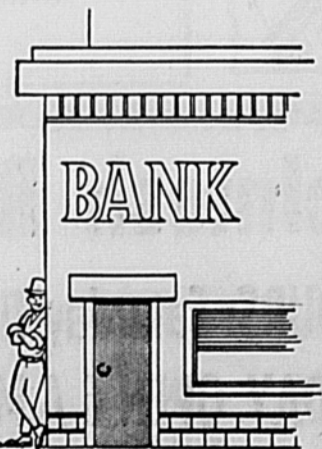
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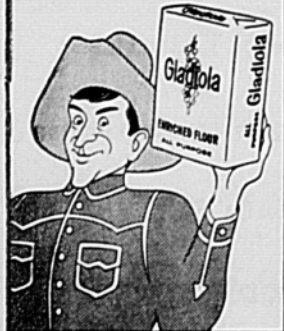
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
