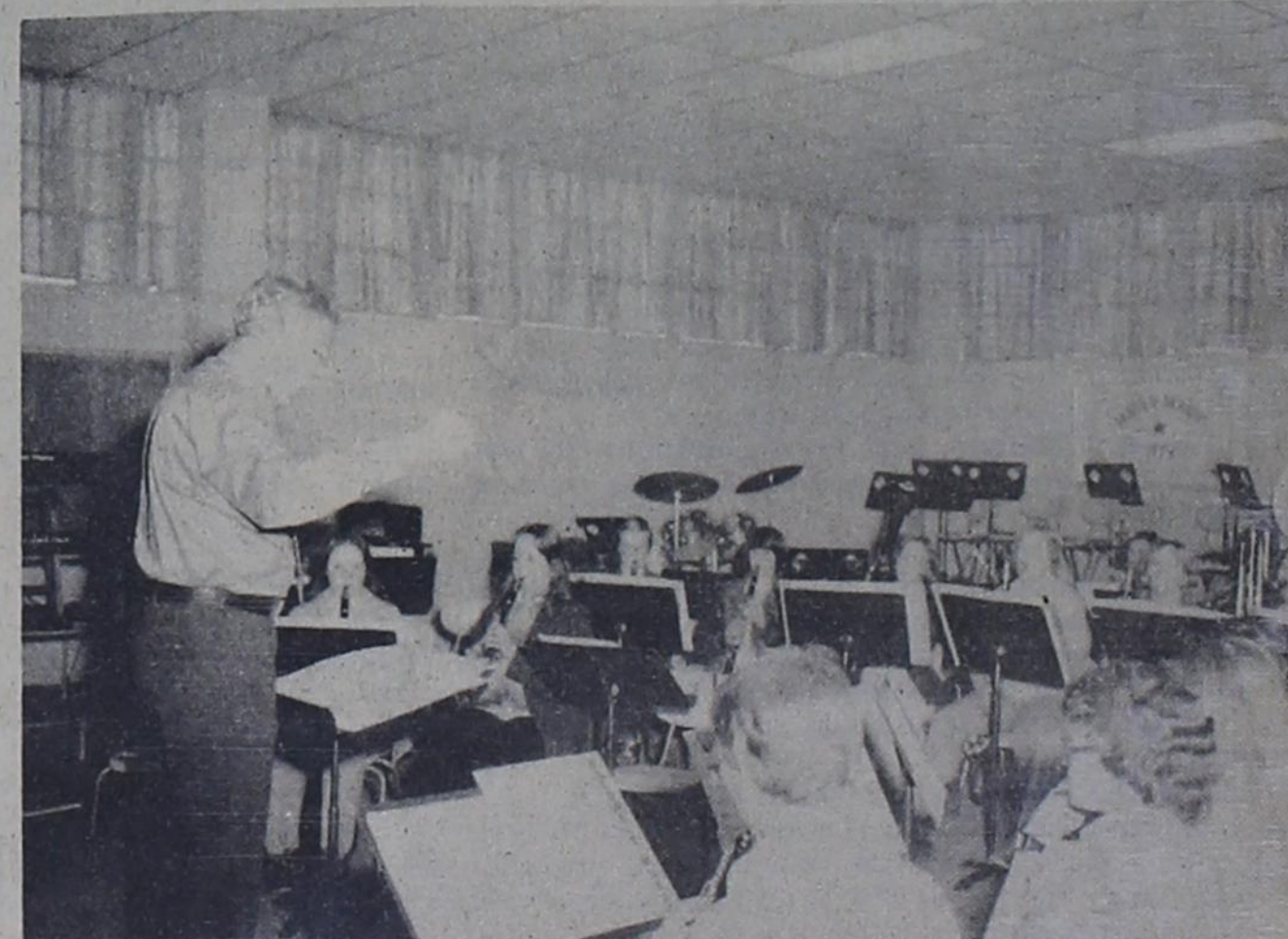

"Few people realize the ordinary Christmas tree can be one of the most inflammable objects that is known. It is filled with pitch and resin. Once ignited, it is almost impossible to put out."

This data is from the National Board of Fire Underwriters, and it is no exaggeration. Every year sees news reports of horrendous fires resulting in death and injury when the evergreen catches fire.

The town of Hyndman, Pa., had its entire business district burned out, along with 23 houses and apartments, when a Christmas tree caught fire. Thirty-six people died when a tree burst into flame in a one-room school in Oklahoma.

The evergreen, as the NBFU notes, not only catches fire easily -- but it also burns unbelievably fast. Underwriters Laboratories, the organization that tests items for safety, demonstrated that a Christmas tree will burn in less than two minutes.

Evergreens have burst into flame when a careless smoker flicked cigarette ashes when a spark from a child's toy train landed on a branch. Further, there is no chemical yet known that will render a tree fireproof and still leave it looking like a tree.

Keep the tree outside the house until a few days before Christmas, take it down at least by New Year's Day.

Place the base in water. Never use lighted candles. Make sure that no electric lights touch branches or needles.

Don't let kids play with electrical toys near the tree. Use only fireproof decorations.

Turn off tree lights when you leave the house or go to bed.

Fashion 'n' Fabrics

By FANNIE GLEESON
GATHER UP A WRAP SKIRT
This year, fashions are more fanciful, fresh and flattering. An example is the wrap skirt illustrated. The waistband is fastened at the front with two buttons, and the overlap is generous enough to be comfortable. Wear the skirt and new-style lined and braid-trimmed vest with a blouse or jersey sweater. There are just enough gathers in the skirt to provide elegant shaping. With fuller gathers, it would revert to peasant-type skirts. As the skirt is wrap style, you are simply gathering an oblong of fabric. For efficiency in gathering, measure off the skirt in eighths and mark each at the waist seamline with a firm stitch in bright color thread. These are your guidelines.
Set machine for a wide stitch. With fabric right side up, machine stitch along seamline. Start and stop at the beginning and end of each one-eighth section. Leave thread ends about three inches long.
Follow same procedure for a second line of gathering stitches placed one-fourth inch away from the first within seam allowance.
Measure a piece of twill tape equal to the length of the finished waistband. Mark twill tape in eighths as you did with the skirt. Match sectional guidelines of tape and skirt with long pins placed in the perpendicular direction.
At end of each section, hold bobbin threads and push fabric into evenly spaced gathers. Fasten threads at the beginning and end of each section by winding around a pin in a figure-eight. It will help in attaching skirt to tape if you pin one end of the tape to the end of your ironing board.
Baste Gathered waistline to tape. Flatten gathers in seam allowance by pressing with long edge of iron. Machine stitch along seamline and through center of twill tape. Apply to waistband in the usual way. This method avoids the hassle of gathering a full skirt to a finished waistband, which usually makes you feel as though you were all thumbs.

Assistance was provided to 1522 farmers, ranchers and other landusers. Of the landusers contacted 366 had applied a practice which had been previously planned." Practices applied include: Brush Management-2431 acres.

Critical Area Planting-10 acres. Conservation Cropping System-2417 acres. Crop Residue Mgt.-2379 acres. Deterred Grazing-6917 acres. Diversions-6360 feet. Ponds-90 feet. Fencing-46,902 feet. Pasture planting-2,828 acres. Proper Grazing use-11,455 acres. Range Seeding-977 acres. Cropland converted to Pasture, 1,901 acres.

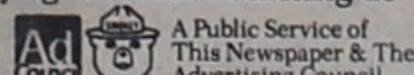

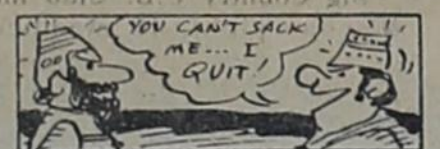

Following the tour of the Diaroma, music and fellowship will be held, and refreshments will be served.



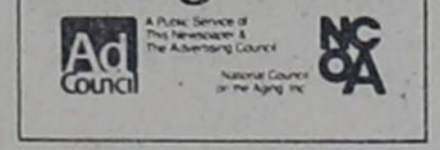

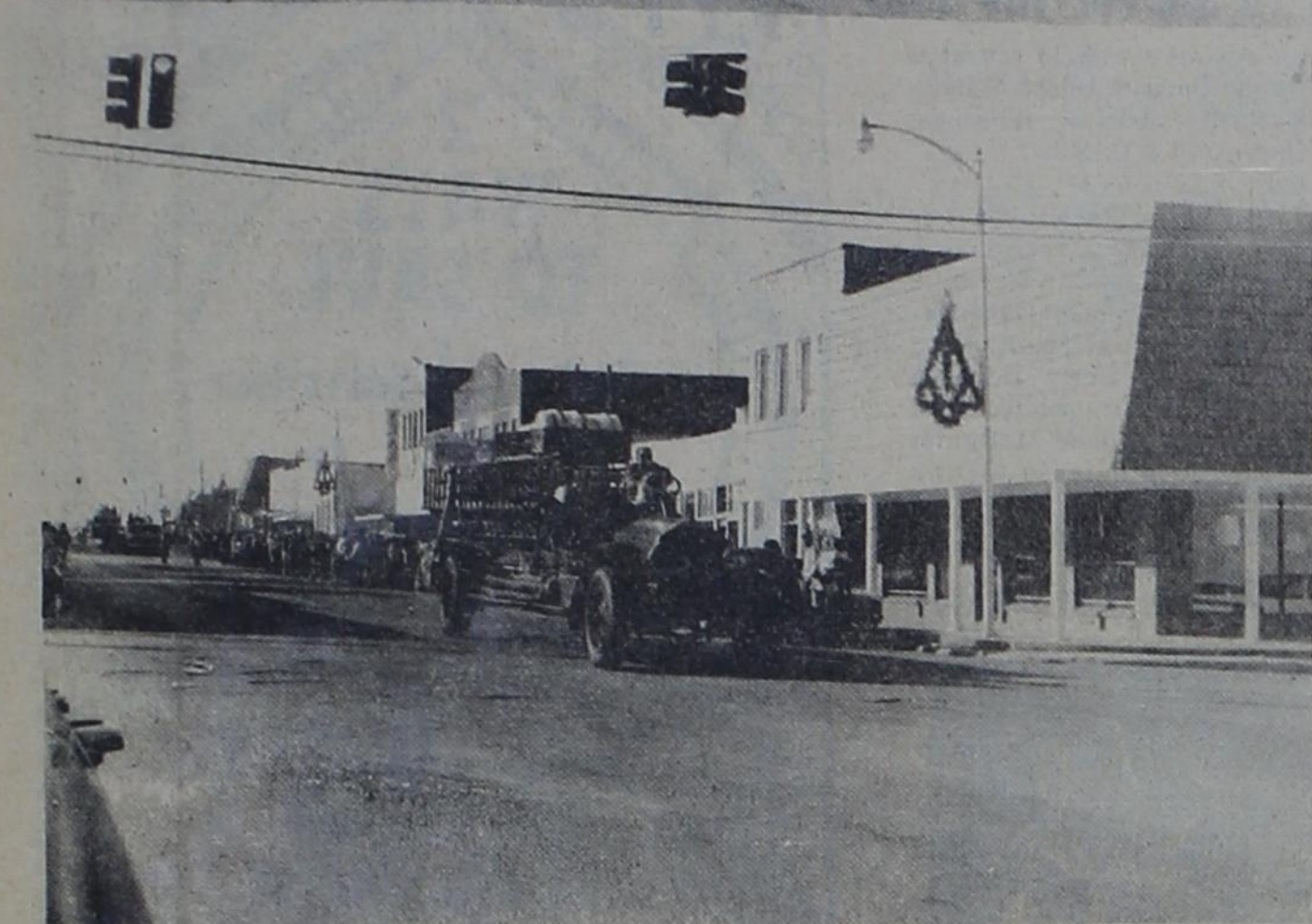
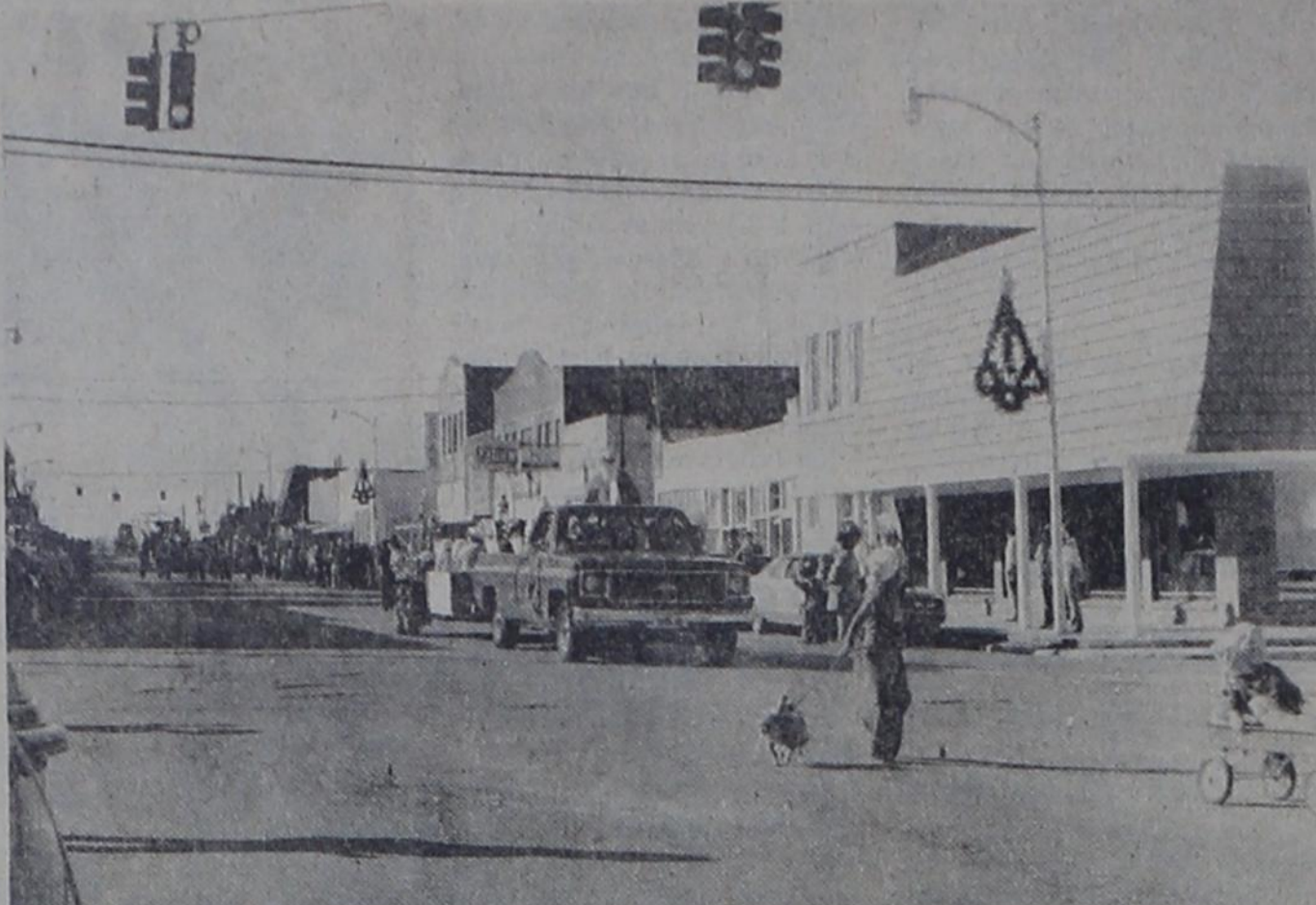

Pecan And Bake Show To Be Fri.-Sat.

The Eastland County Pecan and Pecan Bake Show will be held for the 24th consecutive year next Friday and Saturday. The show will be in the country courthouse in Eastland. The announcement was made jointly by the County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the event.

James Wright, Manager of the Chamber of Commerce, says the pecan show will include about 200 entries of top quality pecan exhibits, a pecan baked show and pecan centerpiece show. He says the show will give recognition to one of the county's most important crops. The pecans, baked goods, and centerpieces will be displayed in the first floor lobby of the courthouse on December 10 and 11.

Chamber of Commerce members and pecan growers will weigh and shell ten pecans from each entry Friday morning. The ASC office will then compute the shelling percentage and number of nuts in one pound. The pecans will be judged Friday afternoon and will be on display until noon Saturday.

good. He urges all growers to prepare entries for the pecan show.

Forty three nuts of any variety may be exhibited in the show. The pecans must have been grown in 1976 and interbred by the family who grew them. Everyone who owns at least one pecan tree is invited to enter and exhibit pecans. The entry deadline is 5:00 p.m. Thursday, December 9. Entries may be brought to the courthouse Thursday afternoon or may be left at the county Extension agent's office at anytime. They may also be left at the Chamber of Commerce offices in Ranger and Cisco any time before December 9.

Pecans are judged on the basis of size, percent kernel, quality of kernel and attractiveness of the pecan.

Natives, variety seedlings and named varieties may be entered in the show. A grower may enter one entry of each named variety and as many different entries of natives and seedlings as he chooses. Entries winning first, second, and third will be sent to the regional pecan show in Dallas. Ribbons will be awarded to exhibitors who have first, second and third place entries. Plaques will be awarded to the exhibitors of the champion shelling pecans, champion in shell pecans and champion natives. Rosettes will be awarded to reserve champions.

Ribbons will also be given for the smallest pecans and the largest pecans entered.

The chamber of commerce and pecan growers invite everyone to come and see the exhibits Friday and Saturday morning. Pecan judges will be Sammy Helmers, Extension Horticulturist at Texas A&M, and David Moore, County Entomologist from Comanche.

Pecans that are not sent to the regional show will be sold by the association to pay expenses of the show. Shelled pecans as well as the inshell pecans will be sold after the show closes at noon Saturday.
