

Deferred Grazing Produces Lush Range South Of Baird

"It's hard to believe unless you see it with your eyes. And then you wonder whether or not you're seeing things."

So spoke D. C. Cox, work unit conservationist with the Baird Soil Conservation Service, in describing the lush carpeting of grass on Blain Odom's ranch south of Baird.

Deferred grazing and light stocking rates have enabled Odom to build up a dense growth of grasses during four years of drought that is nothing short of astounding.

"I think deferred grazing is the secret to any successful ranching operation," Odom said. "Any fairly good range will make a mighty growth of grass if it's not overstocked."

Odom has not had a single animal grazing his native pastures since early May. He plans to buy stocker cattle about the first of November, winter them, and sell them next spring.

This is the method Odom has used to put more grass on his rangeland than can be found in

some areas of higher rainfall. He gives his pastureland six to seven months rest every year.

The rest period is paying off in additional forage in those months when Odom does use his range. His calves weigh about 275 pounds when he buys them in the fall. By the following spring, they tip the scales at an average of about 500 to 525 pounds.

But rest isn't the only means Odom is using in putting his range in such excellent condition. He has cut and pushed cedar and post oak on 250 acres and plans to continue brush clearing operations until his range is comparatively free of the moisture-sapping plants.

Odom leaves a heavy litter of brush on top of the ground to afford protection for the grass and to add organic matter to the soil. The litter also shades the ground, reducing soil temperature and cutting down on moisture evaporation.

Odom utilizes the small acreage of cultivated land on his 3,200-acre ranch for supplemental grazing to take part of the load off his native pastures. He plants his cultivated land in wheat, vetch and rye.

A wide variety of good grasses, many of which came back due to Odom's efficient management, can be found on his range. Predominant grasses include side-oats grama, little bluestem, buffalo grass, Texas winter grass and Canada wild rye, with small amounts of Indian grass and big bluestem.

Blain Odom is preserving his rangeland for posterity.

Beginning this week there will be a Junior Band organized in the grade school for fifth, sixth, and seventh grades. Instruments for the Junior Band can be obtained at student prices and considering the facts that the band pupil is given access to over one hundred dollars of music equipment, fifty dollars of uniforms and the finest of instruction, it is easily seen that the price of an instrument is the smallest item on the list.

Mr. Aldridge makes it clear that Junior Band members, regardless of age, will be advanced to Senior Band status as his ability increases. One of the chief reasons for the Junior Band is to have replacements for graduating members and to have at all times, a well trained band ready to serve your school and your community and one which you will acknowledge with pride as "Our Baird Bear Band."

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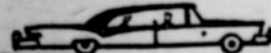
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Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

There is an election coming up next week — in which the "candidates" are not known.

It is the election of Texas' new Democratic national committee man — to replace ousted Wright Morrow.
A nominating committee will make a recommendation on Sept.

21. Its choice will be revealed at a meeting of the State Executive Committee in Ft. Worth on Sept. 22.

Discussed for the place have been former Cong. Lloyd M. Bentzen, Jr., of McAllen; Cong. Joe Kilgore, also of McAllen; Rep. J. O. Gillham of Brownfield; and James E. Wheat of Woodville. Wheat now is secretary of the State Executive Committee.

Possibility that State Chairman George W. Sandlin might get the nod also has been discussed.

Gov. Allan Shivers has indicated his desire that the new committeeman be someone who will work with the National Committee.

National Chairman Paul M.

Butler said that the new member must have voted for Adlai Stevenson in 1952 and be acceptable to Governor Shivers, House Speaker Sam Rayburn, and U. S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson.

State Chairman Sandlin will address a meeting of the Democratic Club of Ft. Worth on the same date the committee meets. He will reply to the speech made to the same group by Morrow just before the state committee voted Morrow out. Morrow had severely criticized Sandlin. The invitation to speak was extended Sandlin in order to show that the club, while conservative, was not dominated by the ultra-conservative backers of Morrow.

Candidates Active Friends of Agri. Commr. John

White met in Austin over the weekend to encourage his entry into the governor's race. White is one of several under consideration by the Loyalist forces.

Brown Bailey, Midland attorney and leader in the effort, said the group conferring with White was not allied with any political faction. "We simply want White to run," he said.

Reuben Senterfitt of San Saba is the only announced candidate for governor so far. He's busy building his fences. Active also is State Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton, although as yet unannounced. Another possible is James P. Hart, former chancellor of the University of Texas. And Will Wilson, associate justice of the supreme court.

Not to be overlooked is Coke Stevenson, former governor. It appears there may be a build-up urging him to enter. Stevenson has been inactive politically since his 87-vote defeat by Lyndon Johnson in the Senate race seven years ago.

Look for House Speaker Jim Lindsey of Texarkana — in the attorney general's race. Also being talked for that job, if Hart runs for governor, is Will Wilson. He would not run against Hart.

New Veterans Land Plan Texas' veterans land program is off to a fresh start.

Under new laws the board places responsibility for administration squarely on the shoulders of the land commissioned. Ex-officio members, the governor and attorney general, are charged only with policy-making functions.

Commr. J. Earl Rudder said he was ready to accept the responsibility.

Local advisory committees, blueprinted in the 54th Legislature's reform laws, are already being formed. These committees, appointed by commissioners courts, will provide a check on findings of state appraisers.

Land purchasers who are delinquent in their payments, have been notified to pay up or forfeit their land. Many delinquencies involve block deals believed to be of questionable nature.

Rudder indicated the board should be able to start considering loan applications again soon. All the original \$100,000,000 was exhausted under the administration of his predecessor, Bascom Giles. Some, however, has been recovered by court action.

Giles has been sentenced to the state penitentiary on charges of complicity to theft and consenting to accept a bribe.

Representatives Appointed

Ten appointments to the Texas Legislative Council, an interim research group, have been made by House Speaker Jim Lindsey.

Named were Reps. Ben Glusing of Kingsville; Tom King of Dallas; James W. Yancy of Houston; Joe Burkett, Jr., of Kerrville; E. F. Crim of Henderson; Pearce Johnson of Austin; Obie Bristow of Big Spring; Gus-tin Garret of Raymondville; W. G. Kirklin of Odessa and William S. Heatly of Paducah.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey will select five senators to complete the council. Its duty will be to

study pressing legislative needs prior to the next session.

Lindsey also appointed Wade F. Spillman chairman of the house investigating committee. Its tasks include further land office inquiry.

Other members are Reps. Reagan R. Huffman of Marshall; Jesse M. Osborn of Muleshoe; Jack Welch of Marlin and Scott McDonald of Ft. Worth.

Named to the water resources committee were Reps. Stanley Banks, Jr., of San Antonio; Leroy Saul of Kress and Bill Wood of Tyler.

Largest storm-warning net in the world is being installed in 16 Texas cities.

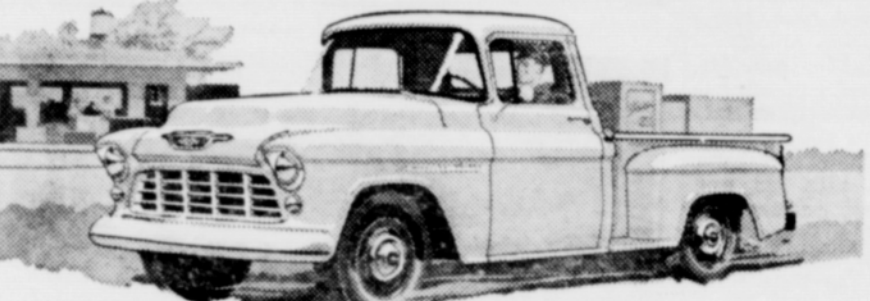

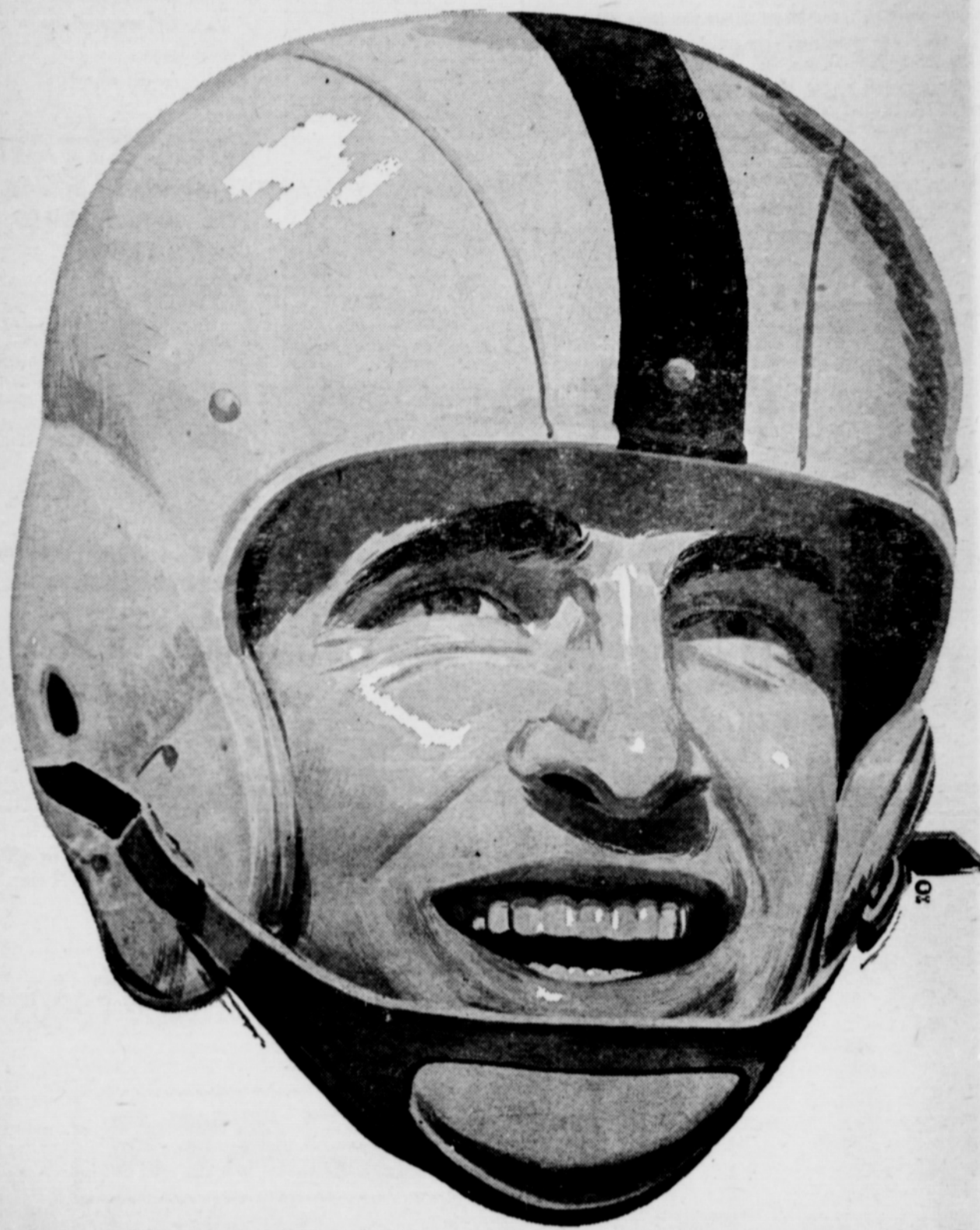

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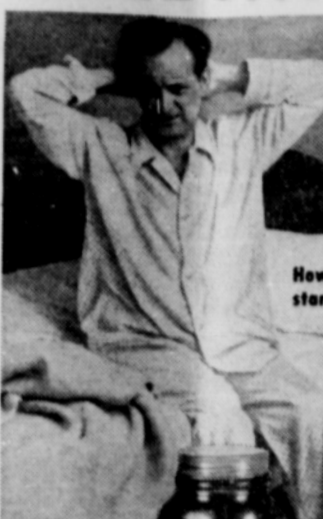
