The adjutant general announced Monday that the units in Stephens and Eastand Counties were slated for bandonment next year if the National Guard-Army Reserve eorganization plan goes through as presently scheduled. Both units have some 50 men and armories worth about \$120,000 apiece. The rmories were built with state (25 percent) and federal (75 ercent) funds. If abandoned, is assumed that the buildngs will be turned over to he cities or schools.

A bill to create an Eastland County Juvenile Board has been introduced in the Texas House of Representatives as H. B. 986 by Rep. Wayne Gibbens of this district, according to word from Austin to-

Under the measure, the county could hold an election on the question of creating a juvenile board, which would be composed of the county judge, the judge of the 91st District Court, and a third member to be selected by the two judges,

The bill would empower the Commissioners' Court to decide whether board members should be paid a salary; and, if so, they could be paid a maximum of \$100 per month. It was understood that the

bill would be on the Legisbill."

The proposed act follows: Section 1. There is hereby created, subject to a majority of vote of the qualified electors in the county, the Eastland County Juvenile Board. The Board shall be composed of the county judge of Eastland County, the judge of the 91st Judicial District, and a third member who shall be
