"In compliance with the demands of the government of the United States, two of the murderers of Major Imbrie, whose execution had been delayed, were put to death this morning."

That made three Persians in all, executed for the tal a few weeks ago. All had been condemned to death, and one had been shot by a firing squad. The remaining two, however, had their sentences commuted to life imprisonment. Thereupon the American government protested, declaring that "from past experience it knew that life sentences are not effective in Persia," and expressing the fear that "unless those found guilty and sentenced to death by the court are executed, they will ultimately escape.'

This action, as seen, was effective. But doesn't the whole business seem like mockery, in view of what goes on in our own country right along? The hand of American justice, which can reach out half way around the world to punish foreign slayers of an American citizen, is usually powerless to inflict effective punishment at home, when the killers are Americans.
