County Agent's Column

PECAN WEEK

November 28-December 4

For the third year Governor Allred has proclaimed a "Pecan Week". Governor James Stephen Hogg made the pecan a most noted tree in Texas by designating it to be planted on the capital grounds and then upon his own grave, which subsequently led it to be designated as the state tree.

In 1935 the crop amounted to one hundred million pounds and was sold out in two years under adverse business conditions. This year it is estimated that about 74 million pound will be harvested. A pound of pecan meats are valued as the equivalent of five

pounds of steak. Pecans are one of Texas' natural resources; they are more nearly adapted to the soils of Texas than in any other states and Texas does produce the most wonderful nuts in all the world. So, let's buy pecans this week, grown in Texas for our own people and help our own producers.

PIG NOTES

Do you know that the average litters for Texas are showing about six pigs? It is estimated by the United States Department of Agriculture that 40 percent of the pig losses are caused by improper bedding arrangement. Very few farrowing pens are provided with a rail around the wall which prevents the sow from laying down on the pigs. This rail is erected about eight inches from the wall and at a height of about eight inches from the bed or the ground. Thus as the sow lays

down the pigs may run back under the rail and avoid being crushed.

Do you know that the average farmer farrows 100 pigs for each 65 that live to be weaned? And that each pig at birth represents an investment of 100 pounds of sow feed? A fair estimate of the value of such feed would be not less than 2 cents a pound which means that each pig is worth about \$2.80, today's market. Pig culture is as important and as essential to the hog grower as the saving of a sheep, a calf, or colt is to the growers of these animals.
