EXAMINATION FOR NIMROD POSTOFFICE

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at Cisco, Texas, on Nov. 4, 1922, as a result of which it is expected to mak certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Nimrod, and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interest of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$556 for the last fiscal year.

Applications must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements. Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a state where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at eighteen year, women eighteen years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Application blanks, Form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can

be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

The accident occurred near the city limits in the southwest part of the town and Mrs. Stallings was immediately removed to the home of her sister, Mrs. C. O. Hamilton.

ROSS COPELAND SERIOUSLY SHOT AT COLEMAN

Ross Copeland, the young son of Jess Copeland of Burkett, was the victim of an unusually sad tragedy in Coleman Thursday night of last week. The young man was formerly employed at Coleman and during the time had roomed at the home of Mrs. Peak. He left Coleman recently and went to the Western part of the State, returning to Coleman and arriving there Thursday night. Mrs. Peak, not expecting his return, had rented the room to another man, who was occupying the room and had retired when young Copeland arrived at the home. Copeland made some efforts to arouse Mrs. Peak, and after failing to do so, it is stated, attempted to enter the room through the window opening on the front gallery, when he was shot by the party from the inside of the room. It is stated that the party who fired the shot had formerly killed a man and believed the disturbance was the efforts of an enemy attempting to do him an injury. The ball entered young Copeland's right arm, passing through the body and lodging in the left arm, and he is reported as being in a very serious condition and it is not believed that he will recover. Young Copeland is about 19 years of age, is a grandson of Uncle F. B. Helms and a nephew of Wade McDaniel.

FINDS RELICS OF EARLY DAYS OLD BUSK RANCH

While picking cotton last week on the Stewart farm west of Gouldbusk which is the old W. M. Gould Busk ranch. Hubert Kenley picked up a small rusty tin box. Upon opening it was found to contain three gold coins of \$2.50 denomination each, also one brass pistol cap which, in days ago, was used in firing an old cap-in ball pistol, the most modern side-piece of firearms during the years of the early sixties.

The gold coins bore date of 1850, 1852 and 1853. The rusty tin box bore the lettering, "Ely caps, London," such Caps being a vintage of the early sixties.

J. F. Godon of Coleman has in his possession an old Colt's cap-in ball pistol that was plowed up in the same field about four years ago. The lever ramrod used in loading the weapon shows to have been stuck or hung in the loading process, indicating that the owner was in the act of hurriedly reloading the gun when attacked by Redskins, and probably lost his life on the spot.

W. W. Hunter is perhaps the last surviving veteran of the eventful sixties in Coleman country. He may be able to throw some light on the incident.—Coleman Democrat.

CATRIDGE IS FOUND IN BROWNWOOD BOY'S APPENDIX

Raymond Son, the fourteen-year-old son of Mrs. Edna Son, underwent an operation in a Brownwood hospital last week when a cartridge which he swallowed a few days previous while attending the Brownwood High School, was removed. The cartridge had worked into the large bowels but in the operation it was pushed back into the appendix. The Brownwood Bulletin reports the boy doing as well as could be expected following such an operation.

The Sheppard No. 2, of T. B. Slick 5 miles east of town in the Pioneer north extension came in Tuesday evening for a natural flow estimated at 150 to 200 barrels. The pay was encountered at 2512 feet, the unusual depth being accounted for by the surface elevation. The well is located on one of the highest hills in the district and its depth therefore does not indicate any dip in structure.

No. 1, Sheppard of the same owner is reported on the pay at 2484 feet and gassing heavy with a good showing of oil though the sand has not yet been touched. The big pipe was being pulled Wednesday and the well will be drilled in within the next few days.

A good well was reported for the Drury Petroleum Co. at Pioneer on Friday of last week but taken as a whole the field has been very quiet the past several days.

McCamey et al, are reported to have three wells shut down for lack of water and several others are shut down for the same reason, but it is hoped the recent rains will in a measure overcome this difficulty.

South of town in the Cross Cut country, Crabb et al, Elsberry No. 1, is shut down at a little below 1,300 feet, and the Byrd No. 1 of the Junior Oil Co. is still shut down, not having succeeded in obtaining water with which to drill. Several new locations are reported in this locality, but it is doubtful if any extensive drilling will be done until further rains increase the supply of water. Leonard et al, Prater No. 2, have a rig up and are moving in tools. It is understood that they will begin operations at once, as they will obtain water from the Pecan Bayou. This well is about one-half mile east of the same company Prater No. 1 which was completed a gasser a few weeks ago.

The McDermott No. 1 of F. W. Stone & Co. is still shut down for lack of water, the recent rain not having been sufficient to replenish the supply.

Seventy-five extra veniremen were summoned by Sheriff Corn, from which to select a jury to try the case, but the case was continued until Thursday, February 15, 1923 and the veniremen were discharged.

MAYFIELD WINS IN SUPREME COURT

TWO OF THE SEVEN QUESTIONS CERTIFIED DISCUSSED AT LENGTH. EXPECT ACTION IMMEDIATELY

Austin, Texas.—The Texas Supreme Court answered that the parties bringing suit against Earle B. Mayfield to keep his name off the general election ticket were not the proper parties. The motion for order to stay the Corsicana injunction was granted. The court held that the Thirteenth District Court of Navarro County was without jurisdiction to hear the injunction suit and that Section 9 of the anti-corruption law was not violative of the Constitution. The court ordered that a certified copy of the opinion be immediately sent to the Court of Civil Appeals at Dallas and also a copy to the Judge of the District Court of Navarro County.

U. S. NOW ALLEGES INCOME TAX FRAUDS

Believe Number of Business Men Are Defrauding United States Government. Washington.—Preliminary investigations conducted by Internal Revenue Bureau officials have led them to the belief that a number of business men over the country have undertaken to defraud the Government of taxes by crediting to themselves in their income returns fictitious or unjustifiable losses, running in some cases to huge amounts. Machinery to uncover such instances has been set in motion. It was said at the bureau, and its operation will be widespread. It is the view of revenue officers that the supposed delinquents have taken advantage of a regulation with respect to the audit of tax returns in the hope that their attempted evasion would escape ultimate detection. Under this regulation, returns on the special forms provided for those having net incomes of \$5,000 or less a year, have been audited in the offices of the local collectors without reference to the special audit bureau in Washington, to which are sent returns covering incomes in excess of \$5,000. It was stated that preliminary examinations indicated that some taxpayers by crediting themselves with sufficient losses, could keep the net income within the figure enabling them to make their returns on the special forms audited in the collectors' offices.

FASCIATA ARE SEIZING ITALIAN TOWNS

Rome is to Be Scene of Dramatic Struggle of Intense Moment. London.—A "message from Italy" without naming the source, says: "The Fascisti at 11:30 o'clock Friday night began a concerted action on several towns. They are now masters of some of the chief towns like Florence, Pisa and Cremona. Communications between North, South and Central Italy have been interrupted. Everywhere in these towns they deposited the authorities and assumed command. It seems there was no resistance and no conflict, except in Cremona, where six Fascisti were shot. Everything is quiet in Milan, where there is a great display of troops. There is no news from other centers." Benito Mussolini, head of the Fascisti, remained in Milan and had numerous conferences with Fascisti leaders and also a talk with a local prefect, says a dispatch from Milan.

Uster Will 'Contract Out'

Belfast.—The Ulster Parliament adjourned until Dec. 12, when Uster, Premier Craig announced will "contract out" of the Irish Free State. He added the Ulster Parliament is anxious to sit at the earliest possible time in order to prove to the world that it had no hesitation in the course it proposed taking.

Austwell Branch Inspected.

Austin, Texas.—Railroad Commissioner Gilmore is making an inspection of the Austwell branch of the Gulf Coast Lines, the service on which had been the basis of complaints received by the commission. The Austwell branch is south of Houston, near Victoria.

Colombia Will Float Loan.

New York.—Senator Enrique Clays Herrera, Colombian Minister to the United States, announces that Blair & Co., bankers of New York, had signed a contract to act as fiscal agents for the floating of a \$5,000,000 Colombian loan in the United States. Interest was fixed at 5 1/2 per cent, the loan being amortizable five years from Oct. 1, 1923, the final payment to be made before Sept. 1, 1926.

ANDREW BONNER LAW OUTLINES POLICIES

This Will Be One of the Acts of the Unionists If They Are Given the Power.

London.—Andrew Bonar Law, as leader of the Unionist party, in a manifesto issued, declared of the tasks of that party if it is returned to power will be to make good the Anglo-Irish treaty, both in letter and spirit and to co-operate with the Irish Government. The manifesto declares it will be the Government's earnest aim, if returned, to give whole-hearted and practical support to the League of Nations, to fulfill the obligations Great Britain has undertaken abroad, but not to extend her commitments but preferably to curtail them, and to maintain friendship and good understanding with the United States.

Mr. Bonar Law in the manifesto said it was the Unionist party's purpose if the self-governing Dominions approved, to summon an economic conference in an effort to discover how the vast trade which the resources of the Empire made possible could best be developed by mutual co-operation. The King at Sandringham signed a proclamation dissolving Parliament which had lived four of its constitutional five years and summoning the new Parliament to meet on Nov. 20. The country is now without a Parliament, but has plenty of candidates for the next one. The Prime Minister made his first campaign speech recently at Glasgow where being of Scotch extraction he had an enthusiastic welcome. He reaffirmed the points of his manifesto.

ENFORCEMENT OF DRY LAW AT SEA IS TO BE HELD UP

Brandeis Declines To Act Pending the Supreme Court Decision

Washington.—Enforcement of the national prohibition law with respect to foreign shipping within American territorial waters will await a final interpretation of that section of the statute by the Supreme Court, it was indicated by administration officials. This interpretation is expected by Government officers late next month or in December.

Boy Leads With Corn Exhibit.

Shreveport, La.—For the fourth consecutive year Oalf Hallie or Linville, La., was awarded grand championship ribbon for all classes of corn at the Louisiana State Fair. Last year young Hallie was awarded a loving cup for winning the grand championship for three consecutive years. He also won first prize for the champion ten ears of corn displayed in the boys' corn club classes this year.

\$25,000 Fire Loss.

Ellisville, Texas.—Fire which started in the Odd Fellows Hall destroyed that building and damaged the Commercial and Ellisville Hotels and Auto Supply Filling Station. The loss is \$25,000, with insurance figures unavailable.

Orders Cars Returned At Once.

Washington.—Railroads in the eastern half of the United States were called upon by the car service division of the American Railway Association, to return at once to roads in the western half of the country all box cars on their lines which belong to the Western carriers. The step has been taken to relieve car shortages, which has been occasioning hardships in the Western agricultural and stock raising territory.

TARIFF IS BARRIER TO WAR DEBTS PAYMENT

Economist Says There It Will Stimulate Buying Power, but Not in United States Vaults.

New York.—Insistence by the people of all nations that statesmen change their political and economic policies is the only means of averting an approaching world catastrophe, Sir George Paish, English economist and former adviser to the British Treasury, said in an address prepared for the thirteenth annual convention of the American Manufacturers' Export Association.

"The statement of all nations," he declared, "are engaged in a common effort to prevent the nations from meeting their obligations to each other and thus reducing the whole world to bankruptcy. 'Already the policy of the statesmen of Europe is fast bringing the strongest nations of Europe to ruin and before long the statement of the other nations of the world, if permitted to do so, will bring their countries into similar condition. Radio Equipment of Airplanes.

There has been installed on one of the huge Goliath biplanes engaged in the Paris-London aerial service a complicated radio telephone and telegraph equipment of 35 watts antenna output, with a sending range of about 180 miles at 900 meters' wave length. The complete radio equipment, according to Radioelectricite, weighs only 125 pounds. An air-propeller-driven generator for six volts and a six-volt storage battery supply the necessary current. A three-bulb amplifier is used for receiving on all wave lengths between 300 meters and 1,000 meters.—Scientific American.

ADMINISTRATION SO THINKS

President Harding and Cabinet Considering Proposing Economic Meet and Conference on European Armament and Atlantic Questions.

Washington.—The Harding administration is now fairly well convinced that the people of the United States are looking with more favor on the League of Nations than at any time since the senate refused to ratify the Versailles treaty.

(1) An international economic conference called by the United States to follow the European economic conference which has been called to meet in Brussels on December 1.

(2) A conference on limitation of armaments in Europe and on Atlantic questions.

The situation with respect to the treaties agreed on at the Washington conference on the limitation of armaments and on Pacific and Far Eastern questions is influencing the administration to give serious consideration to these two proposals.

What the Proposals Mean. The two steps that have been proposed, if taken, it is said in administration quarters, would presumably bring about immediate ratification of all the Washington conference treaties.

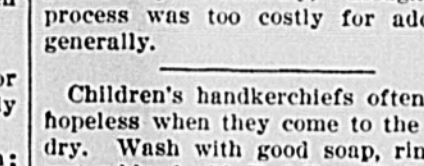

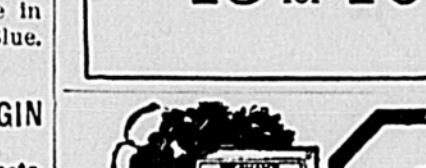

FORD MAKES OVER 5,000 CARS AND TRUCKS DAILY

According to a statement recently issued by Edsel B. Ford, president of the Ford Motor Co., the general reduction of \$50 a car was made two weeks ago applies to Ford Model T cars and the Ford 1 ton truck. This reduction was effective Oct. 17 h.

"The revision in prices," said Mr. Ford, "is the result of the increased volume of business which our company has enjoyed during the present year, and also the fact that we now own and operate many of our own sources of raw material, which enables us to continue increasing the quality of our product and at the same time keep the price so low that Ford cars are in the reach of everybody.

"Our production for 1922 is already in excess of a million, which has been an important factor in bringing down costs. Our present daily output is averaging better than 5,000 cars and trucks, which means a complete Ford car or truck every 51.2 seconds of each eight-hour working day. It is in anticipation of this continued demand that price adjustments are again being made in order to keep in effect the policy of selling Ford products at the lowest price consistent with quality.

"Quality, as usual," said Mr. Ford, "will continue to be a prime consideration in the building of Ford cars. As our business has increased we have constantly increased our equipment and manufacturing facilities, so that this price reduction merely reflects the progressive methods which come as a result of increased volume.

"This reduction, which is the sixth since March 1920, brings the price of the Ford touring from \$5.75, the price in effect early in 1920, to the present extremely low level of \$2.98, which is nearly 50 per cent loss. Corresponding reductions have been made on all other types.
