From Sgt. Samuel Norris Ramey, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Ramey, came a letter saying:

"Dear Mother: I am getting along okeh. Hope you can send me some cigarettes, chocolate and fruit cake. Please send as much as the Red Cross will allow, also pictures of the family. Give my love to everyone. Hope to be with you soon."

"Your loving son, (Signed) Samuel Norris Ramey, stationed in Camp No. one Tokyo area."

The other message from a Cottonwood boy being held as a prisoner of war, was from Junior Ivey, whose parents have recently moved to West Texas, however, Junior apparently had no knowledge of their having moved. He wrote a postcard saying:

"I am well, in good health. Not being treated for anything" The last five words were underscored.

SPOTTED SHOWERS BEGIN FALLING IN SECTION THURSDAY

Million Dollar Rain Is First Moisture Received Here In Nearly Three Months

Intermittent showers which began falling Thursday afternoon of last week and continued for several days netted more than four inches of moisture in Cross Plains and broke a drought that was beginning to reach serious proportions. The moisture was the first in nearly three months.

The rainfall as recorded by a government weather gauge kept by S. F. Bond in Cross Plains was as follows:

Peanut crops are expected to benefit materially from the rain as are pastures, however, it is believed to have come too late to aid cotton yields.

Although the rain put out very little stock water, tanks were so low that even the small help that it afforded was particularly appreciated. Farmers who have been hauling water from Cross Plains were granted a respite, however, if more rain is not forthcoming within the near future, tanks will be inadequate to furnish livestock for many months.
