**SCARLET FEVER IS DISCUSSED BY STATE HEALTH OFFICER COX**

AUSTIN—Scarlet fever, now five times higher than the year median in Texas, is one of the more disabling and dangerous diseases usually associated with childhood, although actually it is said to no age limit, according to Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The doctor described scarlet fever as a acute infectious disease, onset of which is sudden. The symptoms including sore throat, chills, fever, and headache, may set in three to five days after exposure. These are followed by a red rash which gives this disease its name, Dr. Cox stated.

Complications may cause prolonged disability or death. Children being with scarlet fever may develop sinusitis and middle-ear infections which can lead to mastoiditis. As the germs spread through the child's system, the joints, kidneys and heart may become involved, causing life-long invalidism or crippling.

A child with any kind of a sore throat should be seen by the family physician promptly," Dr. Cox stated. "If scarlet fever is present, the treatment recommended is to do much to alleviate discomfort and reduce the possibility of serious complications."

Dr. Cox stated that children under ten years of age are most susceptible, and that those persons who fail to contact scarlet fever will grow, stand an excellent chance of never having the disease.

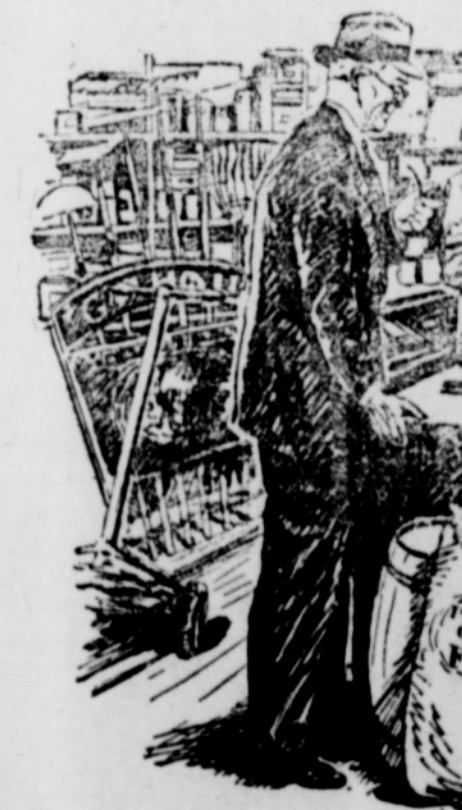

FAMILIES OF MARINES MAY INCLUDE BIRTHS IN OVERSEAS MESSAGES

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Families of U. S. Marines overseas now may include births or even urgent business matters in messages which Marine Corps headquarters will transmit abroad by radio. It has been announced here.

In making public the more generous policy of handling personal messages for Marines overseas from their families in the States, it was pointed out that the messages must be concerned with the welfare of the immediate family.

The overseas service may be obtained by filing messages at any Red Cross chapter, or by sending them direct to Marine Corps Headquarters, Washington. It was stressed, however, that messages must be confined to matters of a definite emergency nature.

For example, should the mother or sister of a Marine who is overseas become dangerously ill, the family might advise the Marine of her state by filing a message to him with the Red Cross or with Marine Headquarters at Washington. The message should be addressed the same as his letters are addressed.

The C CROSS PLAINS, CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS 5TH WA 16 Texas Se ONLY FIVE STATE MEN UNOPPOSED DUE TO LATE FILING ENTRIES

Five Texas Representatives face no opposition in their campaigns for reelection in the democratic primaries this summer, but each of the other 16 seats in the national house will be contested for by from two to seven candidates. Filings just ahead of the May 15th deadline for district candidates has added a fourth candidate, for congress for the 17th district, which includes Callahan county. Joe E. Fitzgerald, 67, a farmer and nurseryman of Stephenville filed his announcement just before the deadline. Also on the ticket will be Robert M. Wagstaff of Abilene, Sam Russell of Stephenville, and Clyde Garrett of Eastland.

Apparently unopposed, in a survey of late filing of candidates, for representative in congress will be O. C. Fisher, San Angelo; Paul Kilday, San Antonio; Eugene Worley, Shamrock; R. Ewing Thomson, El Paso; and Milton West, Brownsville. The second Texas district is the only one assured of a new congressman, the result of Martin Dies' announcement last week that he would not run again. In this district Judge J. K. Combs of Beaumont and Sgt. Hugh A. Wilson, who is stationed near Bastrop, filed for the place held by Dies for six years.

At least four servicemen are candidates. Sgt. Hugh A. Wilson filed opposing Martin Dies; Capt. John E. Lyle, who is overseas, petitioned through friends for a place on the ballot opposing Rep. Richard M. Kieberg of the 14th district; Capt. D. S. Meredith, Jr., who is on duty in the Southwest Pacific, opposes Rep. Lindley Beckworth in the third district.

In addition to congressional races, Lt. Col. Gordon Simpson of Tyler was entered by petition, opposing Richard Critz for a place on the ballot for associate justice of the Supreme Court.
