Sugar loaf and Smooth Cayenne seem to be the best varieties of ineapple ofr canning. The fruit is ipe when it is orange colored and the spines are readily pulled out. If pineapple is sun ripened before gathering, it yields a better product in flavor, and it contains more fruit sugar. Unripe fruit not only lacks flavor, but may be irritating to the lining of the stomach. If the fruit is gathered before it is ripe, it should be wrapped in thick paper and kept a few days at even temperature about 65 to 70 degrees S. H. Thomas, Sunday, Fahrenbeit. If fruit is soft and overripe, there is much waste, and the
