Mrs. Fannie Maltby Gives Family Reunion To Callahan Museum

Mrs. Fannie Maltby recently made a most valuable contribution to the Callahan County Museum by donating to the County Library a large collection of the county's historical articles belonging to her parents, the late Capt. and Mrs. W. J. Maltby, prominent citizens of Callahan county. The collection includes a muzzle loading rifle, weighing fifteen pounds, let molds, powder horns, caps, belts, and hunting knives owned by Capt. Maltby in the frontier.

A spinning wheel, rare old one on which much of the wild and woolly life of the frontier was lived, and a pair of iron handled carvers set, a number of exquisite hand carved articles made by Mrs. Maltby in the early days. Many books, Webster's fine Book of Days, Bay's second part antique McGuffey's 2nd, 4th, and 5th readers, Colton's Map of the West made from maps in Library "Congress" in 1872. Among other documents are two official appointments of Capt. Maltby to Ranger service. In Texas, which is written in long hand signed by Gov. Richard Coke, Governor of Texas, May 2, 1871.

There were also two rare prints (Carrier and Tree) of "Texas Traveler" and "Turn of Tune" companion pictures which have been framed and hung in the library.

Captain Maltby died in 1867, wife had preceded him in 1864 several years. Jimmy Maltby, youngest son died a few years ago leaving Mrs. Price, the only surviving member of the family. He is also a member of grandchild Mrs. Price, a widow, lives on old Maltby farm hidden in shadows of the Spring Gap mountains near Rowden, Texas, about fifteen miles south of Baird.

The County Library and Museum which is sponsored by the W. J. Maltby Club of Baird, is one of the best in this section.

In addition to the Maltby there are many other gifts to pioneer families of Callahan County, including branding irons, made bridle bits, shovels and household utensils used by settlers. There are several bits of barbed wire, that bring memories of the wire cutting around Baird in the early 80's, a pair of forelegs used by Dr. D. Windham, the first doctor to settle in Callahan county in early 70's.

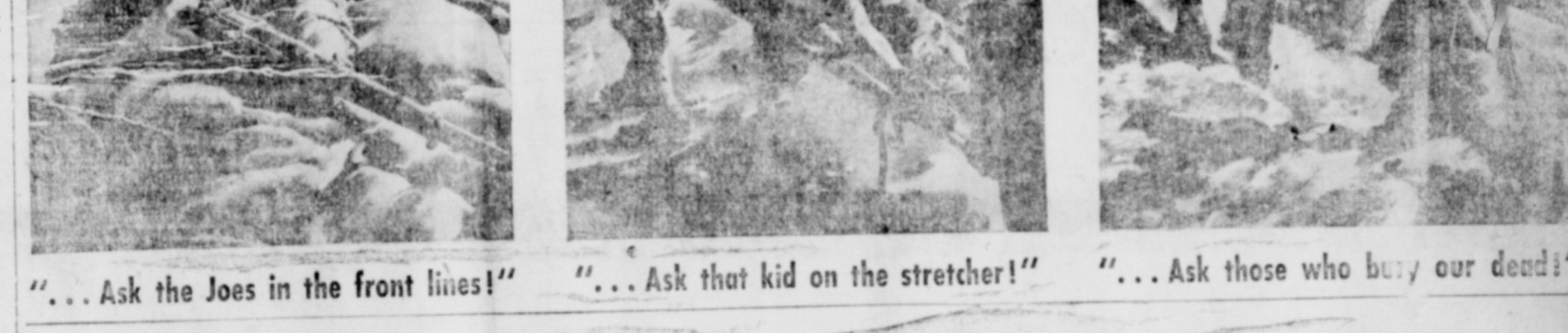

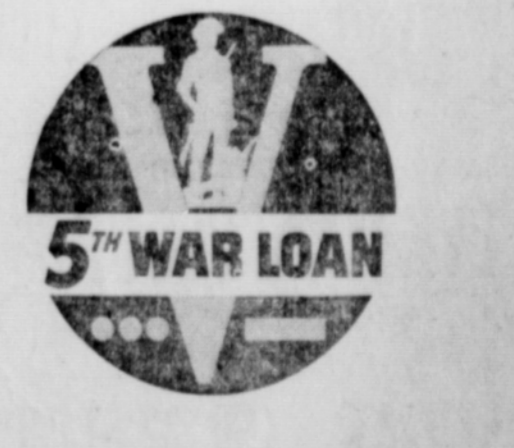

Sugar—Sugar stamps 30 and 31, each good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar stamp 32 becomes good for five pounds, June 16. Sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of canned sugar thru February, next year.

Gasoline—In 17 East Coast states, A-10 coupons good thru August 8. In states outside the East Coast area, A-11 coupons good thru June 21, A-12 coupons good June 22 thru September 21.

Fuel Oil—Periods 4 and 5 coupons, good thru September 30. New Period 1 coupons for the 1944-45 heating year may be used as soon as they are received from local boards.

FLIER NETS TWENTY GALLONS ICE CREAM

That is the pay-off for rescued aviators in the South Pacific. Each flier from the U. S. S. Saratoga who is shot down and subsequently picked up by a destroyer and returned to the carrier nets a reward of twenty gallons of ice cream.

The ice cream goes to the destroyer crew which rescues the aviator. According to Lt. Commander Kenneth Chapman of Everett, Wash., there is keen competition to perform the rescue service. The veteran of service on the Saratoga states further that flier morale is boosted by the eagerness of rescue crews.

"Throughout the entire fighting forces ice cream is proving its value both as a nutritious food and as a morale builder," adds Milton Hilt, president of the National Dairy Council. "As a part of the mess the men are given ice cream at least once a week whenever possible. In addition, ice cream is available in post exchanges and ship service stores and often the ingenuity of the men is responsible for still other supplies of their favorite food."

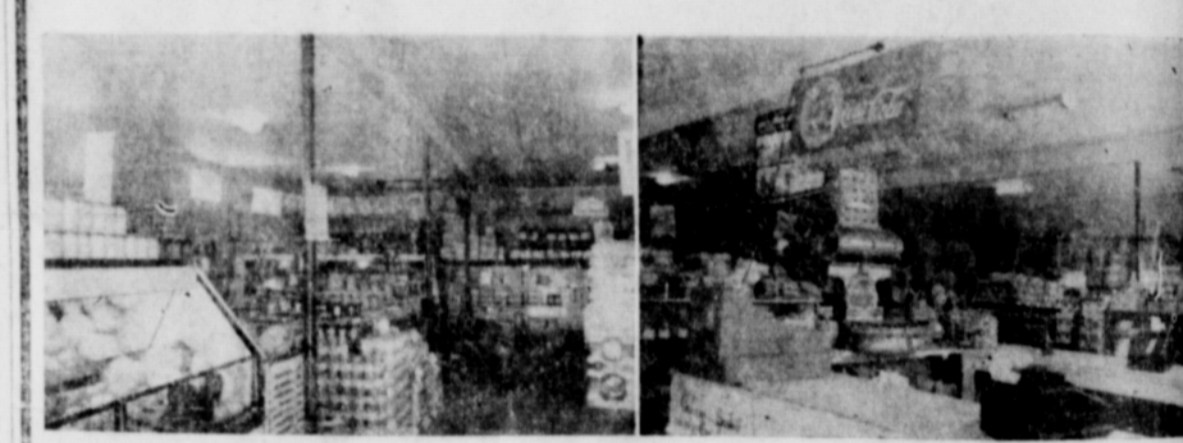
