

Plans Now Being Made For Early Construction; Site Location Still Indefinite

Assurance of the construction of Cross Plains and McCamey, out of five aplications in the western area of the state, had been aproved for

The idea for this plant for Cross Plains had its inception at the Chamber of Commerce and Business Men's Luncheon Club meeting on February 15, when committees were formed and work begun on the subscription of shares to raise \$10,-000 and sell 60 per cent of some three or four hundred locker rentals, all of which had to be complete before application could be

made with the WPB. The heads of the committees for raising the money rose to their task with the customary zeal and within two weeks one hundred shares at \$100.00 had been sold, and the selling of rental boxes begun. These boxes selling for \$12 and \$15 lived virtually all his life in Cross per year; the \$12 box being the Plains. It is expected that the remainder of the boxes will sell rapidly. now that the plant is definitely assured, and soon there will be a waiting list as has been the experience of surrounding towns who have installed locker plants.


