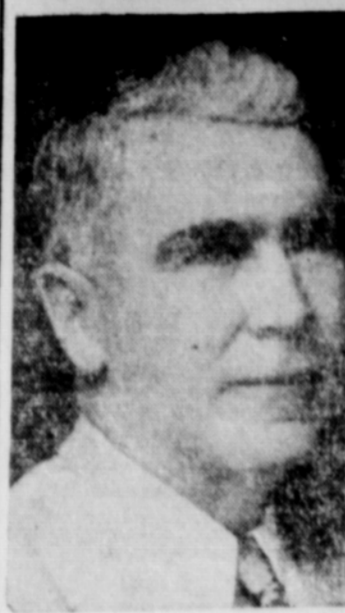

Tooth extraction, absolutely two weeks.

Menstruation: Refect during first two days of menstrual period.

Pregnancy: Nine months after any type of termination.

Menopause: Refect if subject to excessive bleeding or flooding attacks. Also if mildly nervous or subject to fainting or severe hot flashes.

Hay Fever: Refect for one month before, during and one month after expected season. Refect during treatment for one month following completion of shots.

Other allergic conditions such as asthma, hives or similar skin manifestations should be treated likewise. Any history of severe allergy should be reported.

Poison Ivy: postponed if eruption is active. May accept two weeks after eruption has healed. If donor has had poison ivy shots, postpone for two weeks from date of last shot.

Balls: Infected area, skin infection, infected cuts or wounds, postponed for one week to one month following complete healing, depending on severity of infection.

Sinusitis: Refect if recent origin or if an acute flare up. History of remote attacks should not be cause for rejection.

Small Pox Vaccination: two weeks from last scab or redness, i. e. this is four weeks from date of vaccination on those that take.

All other vaccinations and immunizing injections, refect for two weeks after the last inoculation.

Sulpha Drugs: consult doctor regarding sulpha drugs.

Temperature: Refect if temperature is 99.4 or above always check temperature before leaving donor.

Pulse: refect if over 120 or below 50.

Blood Pressure: Refect if systolic pressure is above 200 or below 100. Refect if diastolic pressure is above 110 or below 90.

Hemoglobin: refect if below 80 per cent Talquist method.

Rheumatic Fever or rheumatic heart disease: refect for 10 years.
