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RATION NOTES

MEATS, FATS: Red stamps AS thru ZS and A5 thru G5, good indefinitely.

PROCESSED FOODS: Blue stamps AS thru ZS and A5 thru L5, good indefinitely.

SUGAR: Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32, and 33 each good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of canning sugar through February, next year.

GASOLINE: In 17 East Coast States, A-11 coupons, good thru November 8. In States outside the East Coast area, A-12 coupons, good thru September 21.

SHOES: Airplane stamps 1 and 2, good indefinitely.

INCOME TAX: Quarterly payments due September 15.

Blue Tokens, Farewell If you've got some blue tokens in your purse, better use them now, because after September 30 they will be good only for the kids to play with. Until next Sunday, the Office of Price Administration says, you can use them just as you always have used them. Beginning Sunday, September 17, retailers will cease giving blue tokens to consumers as ration change, and shoppers will be able to spend them only in groups of 10. If necessary, shoppers may pool tokens to make up groups of 10. Removal of practically all canned and bottled vegetables and fruit spreads and specialties from rationing September 17 makes use of blue tokens unnecessary. Beginning September 17 point values on canned fruits, canned juices, canned tomatoes, catsup and chili sauce will be designated in multiples of 10.

These Tire Inspection Records Keep those tire inspection records until you get your new mileage rationing record form along with your new "A" book. OPA says. Since discontinuance of periodic tire inspection last April, tire inspection records have been kept primarily as a record of gasoline rations issued each automobile, and will no longer be necessary when the new form is issued. Under the East Coast States, the new "A" book will go into use September 22, and in the 17 East Coast States, February 9.

Loosen Lid on Stove Rationing The rationing of coal and wood stoves to consumers will end October 15, the War Production Board and OPA have announced, although rationing of oil and gas stoves will continue. Supplies of coal and wood

stoves have grown sufficiently since rationing started in August, 1943, to make continued rationing unnecessary.

County Agent Column

Callahan County was well represented with livestock owned by 4-H club boys and livestock producers in the West Texas Fair, held at Abilene from September 1st to 9th. A total of 22 ribbons were won by participants, including six first places, 3 grand champions, two seconds, six thirds, two fourths, two fifths and one sixth place.

In the general county agriculture exhibit, Callahan County was the only exhibitor thereby winning first place and a cash prize of \$15.00. The products in the exhibit were produced by Frank Browning, Baird, Billy Sol Estes, Bobby Frank Estes, Bernard Dugan, and W. C. Shofner, Clyde.

In the swine division the 4-H club boys were the largest winners of any of the counties participating. Billy Kennard, Clyde, had the 3rd place Duroc gilt, and the first place Duroc Junior boar. This boar was also the Grand Champion Junior boar of all swine breeds. Calvin Lee Britton, Denton club boy, exhibited the champion Poland China boar which later won Grand Champion Senior boar over all breeds.

Bernard Dugan, Clyde, owned the fourth place Duroc gilt, and Bobby Pyatt, Clyde, placed fifth with his Duroc gilt.

In the Poland China sow division, Ersal Lee Johnson, Eula 4-H club member, placed third in the Poland China gilt class, Knox Waggoner, Clyde exhibited the third place gilt, fourth place going to Bobby Gene Johnson, Eula club member, and fifth place won by Howard Johnson, Denton club boy, with 6th and 7th place going to Bill and Don Clemmer, of Eula.

In the Sears Roebuck Swine show, Knox Waggoner of Clyde placed first with Poland China gilt, and

was awarded a registered Jersey heifer. Second place went to Bobby Gene Johnson, and a prize of 125 baby chicks, or 63 turkey eggs, or 31 points. Third place went to Howard Johnson, Denton, who receives 100 baby chicks, or 50 turkey eggs or 25 points.

Mack Woods, Putnam, had the fourth place gilt and received the same prize as No. 3. Fifth place going to Bill Clemmer, of Eula, who will receive the same prize as 3 and 4. A total of \$35.50 was received in prize money from the hogs exhibit.

In the Angora goat division, Billy Kennard of Clyde carried 4 goats, winning two firsts, one second, one third, and the Grand Champion in the yearling nanny class. Billy received \$17.50 in prize money.

In the Palomino horse division, A. H. Gatlin of the Hamby community placed second in the 1944 stud foal, winning \$10.00 in war stamps. This colt was shown in competition with the best Palomino breeders in the State.

In the quarter horse division, Fred Cutbirth, Cross Plains, placed third in the 1944 foal class. This colt took the eye of many quarter horse breeders at the show. C. A. Dittmore of Putnam placed third in the two year old mare division and his quarter horse stallion, Gold Digger, placed 5th in his class. W. W. Shults, living in the northwest part of the county, also exhibited quite a number of palominos that placed in every class shown.

The results from the placements made by Callahan livestock raisers, show that we compare very favorably with other counties in the production of good quality individuals.
