Plans called for raising approximately \$10,000 to finance the undertaking. Members of the committees got busy with their ordinary zent for bettering the community, and within ten days \$7,300 of the amount had been subscribed. Balance of the required amount followed within a short time. Subscriptions were in the form of shares
