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ARMY SPECIALIZED TRAINING PROGRAM FOR VETERANS

LUBBOCK—The president's office at Texas Technological College has issued the following statement regarding the government college training program for those who have been in the service.

"Men and women who were in service in any branch of the Army or Navy serves on or after September 16, 1940, and whose term of active service was 90 days or more, exclusive of any period he was assigned for a course of education or training under the Army Specialized Training Program, or Navy College Training Program, may apply for at least a year of college training under the Veterans Administration and at government expense if such person was discharged for any reason other than dishonorable and if under the age of 25 years at the time of entrance to service, according to information received by Texas Technological College.

"Such persons may select the course of study they wish to pursue and the college they wish to attend, whether within their own state or another state. The Veterans Administration is authorized to pay all tuition fees and other college charges and to provide books and board and room, travel expense, etc. These latter are provided for by monthly payments of \$50.00 per month to single students or \$75.00 per month if the student has dependents. Payments of tuition, fees, etc., are made directly to the college.

"Applications for such school training may be made to the Veterans Administration at Waco, Texas, or in the case of persons wishing to enter Texas Technological College, applications may be made to Registrar W. P. Clement who will provide proper forms to be forwarded to the Veterans Administration. Applicants who go directly to Mr. Clement should bring with them transcript of high school credits and evidence of graduation if they have not been admitted to college. If they have attended another college they must bring a transcript from that college also.

"In addition to the academic records, they must also bring their discharge certificate and record of military service for prompt action.

"Solve men and women who wish to take advantage of this opportunity must apply for such school training within two years of the date of their discharge. Those who were in active service for more than 90 days may qualify for more than one academic year of training."

SUGAR: Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32, and 33, each good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of canned sugar through February, next year.

GASOLINE: In 17 East Coast States, A-11 coupons, good for three gallons each thru November 8. In states outside the East Coast Area, A-13 coupons in new "A" book, good for four gallons each thru December 21.

SILOES: Airplane stamps 1 and 2, good indefinitely.

PLENTIFUL FOOD: Onions, Overseas Christmas Package Mailing: October 15, last day.

Not a Man In The Plant

The women have it all their own way in one Melbourne, Australia, war plant. Now entering its fourth year of operation, this plant is run entirely by women, ages 25 to 40.

Most of the women had never worked outside their homes before they took their present jobs. Among other things the women turn out steering gears for Breen gun carriers and telescope holders for 25-pounders. Miss Irene Scaries, general manager, is now in the U. S. studying latest production methods.

Aid For War Victims

Since Poland was invaded in 1939, Americans have given more than \$175,000,000 to war victims of more than 20 countries, the President's War Relief Control Board reported in calling attention to the second National War Fund Drive to be conducted during October. Before the War Relief Control Board was established, 700 agencies were appealing to the public separately for support. Now only 110 agencies are authorized to engage in foreign and domestic war charity—including United Seaman's Service, War Prisoners Aid, and local Community Chest services. The \$250,000,000 fund sought this year is expected to bring aid to 60 million persons.

Tobacco Consumption Near Record

While domestic tobacco consumption has declined in recent months, this decline has been offset by shipments to armed forces abroad, so that overall consumption is at or near the highest in the history of the industry, the Department of Agriculture reports.

New Ration Book for Canadians

Between October 14 and 21, each of Canada's 11,500,000 consumers is expected to get his fifth new ration book. Sugar, butter and preserves are the only foodstuffs now rationed. Rationing of tea, coffee and meat has been suspended for some time.

THE Army Answers

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. My husband has been listed by the Army as "missing in action." Today I received all his personal effects. Does this mean that he is dead?

A. No. Your husband will be considered to be alive for at least a year following the date he was first listed as missing in action, unless the War Department secures evidence that he has died. The return of his personal effects does not change his status as missing in action.

Q. My husband is a corporal in the Army overseas. Our first child has just been born. Would it be possible for me to get the family allowance increased without bothering him?

A. Yes. From a nearby military installation secure a War Department AGO Form Number 641 and send it to the War Department Office of Dependency Benefits, Newark 2, New Jersey, with a certified copy of the child's birth certificate. If you are not located near a military post, you may write the Office of Dependency Benefits for an application.

Q. I have heard that the Eighth Service Command is hiring some automobile mechanics. What kind of a job is this and how can I apply for it?

A. It is a civil service job with a high priority granted by the War Manpower Commission. Application may be made at the nearest Army camp, civil service office, or United States Employment Office.

Q. Why can't my son who is with the Army Service Forces in this country get a furlough?

A. Because of a heavy work load on the Army Service Forces in this country, the commanding general of that unit of the Army has, until further notice, cancelled leaves and furloughs of military and civilian workers, except under exceptional circumstances.

Q. My husband who was just home from overseas writes me now that he is at a redistribution station. What does this mean?

A. It means that your husband will spend approximately two weeks at the redistribution station, where the Army will study his record, training and Army experience. This study will be used as a basis for reassignment. While at the station, he will not have to stand military formations, and will be given every opportunity to relax and rest before taking up his new duties.

DR. COX EXPLAINS NEED FOR SECURING BIRTH CERTIFICATES

AUSTIN—Explaining the need for all Texas births to be registered through the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas State Department of Health, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said in Austin today. There are many reasons why every person needs a birth certificate. It is necessary for entrance into school, for the right to vote, for work in Federal Defense projects, to prove American citizenship, for entering military service, to prove legal age for inheritance of property, for proving claims of widows and orphans, for settlement of insurance, for right of admission to certain professions, for collecting compensation from the government, and for many other important activities.

In Texas whenever a birth is attended by a physician, it becomes the physician's responsibility according to law to file a certificate of birth. There are, however, children born in the state without medical attendance, and it is the parents' responsibility to have this birth registered through the regular channel.

The tremendous load of work done in the past two and one-half years by the Bureau of Vital Statistics in effecting delayed registration and furnishing copies of birth certificates needed because of the war and its resultant changes in occupation and way of living has demonstrated conclusively that the registration of births at the time they occur is of great personal benefit to every individual.

Each of the delay and embarrassment to people in search of a delayed birth certificate could be entirely avoided by general recognition of the value attached to each individual having his own certificate of birth.

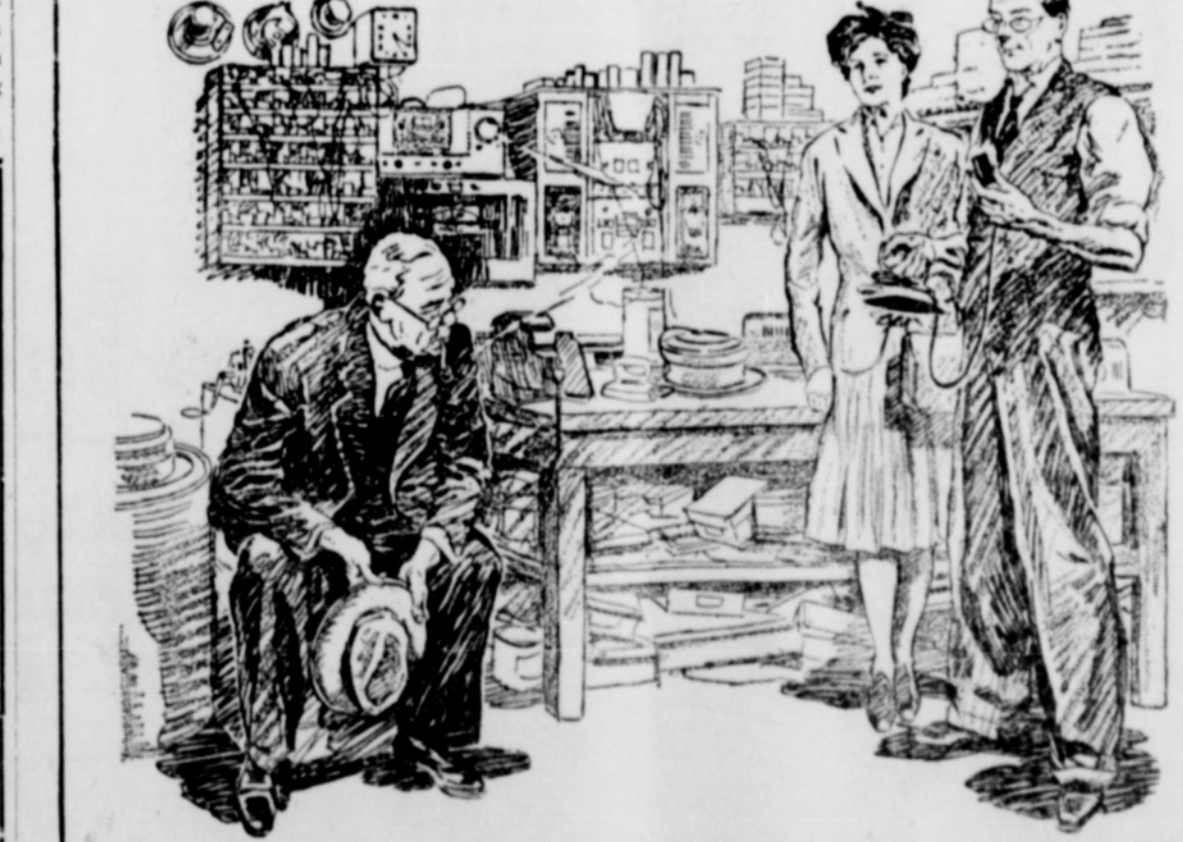

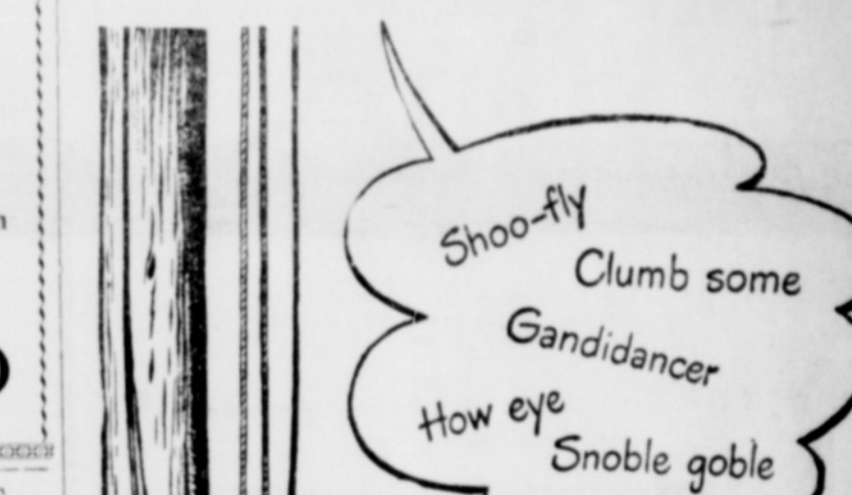
