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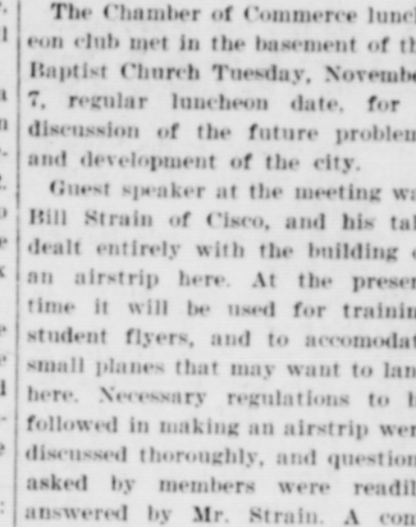
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COUNTY QUOTA SET AT \$285,000, CROSS PLAINS GIVEN \$78,000

Rally Set For November 25; Military Band From Camp Barkeley To Be Present

A representative group of citizens made plans in a meeting at the courthouse at Baird Monday night to wage a campaign to meet Callahan County's quota of \$285,000.00 in the 6th War Loan which officially opens November 20th.

In the meeting, presided over by Judge B. H. Freeland, it was voted to hold bond rallies in each of the Callahan county towns. Major D. J. Evans and his military band of Camp Barkeley will be invited to attend the rallies to assist in the bond-selling campaign. Other speakers will also be asked to appear before the various gatherings which are to take place at Baird, Saturday night, December 9; Clyde, the afternoon of December 9; Putnam, Friday night, November 24; Cross Plains, Saturday, November 25; and Opalin, date to be announced later.

All precinct chairmen were re-elected and the various quotas were set as follows:

Baird: \$173,000. Hugh W. Ross Jr. Cross Plains: \$72,000. Fred Tunell.

Putnam: \$20,000. L. G. Mobley. Clyde and Eola: \$35,000. to elect chairman.

Opalin: \$20,000. Frank Windham. Marvin Hunter, editor of The Baird Star, was elected publicity chairman. F. R. Anderson of Cross Plains served as secretary of the meeting.

Communities that are in with Cross Plains in raising the designated \$72,000 are: Driessy, Cottonwood and Caddo Peak.

Date for a rally here has been tentatively set as November 25, on main street at about 3:30 p. m. Major D. J. Evans and his military band from Camp Barkeley will be here for the bond-selling rally.

RATION NOTES

MEATS, FATS: Red stamps AS thru ZS and A5 thru P5, good indefinitely. The four red stamps validated October 29 totaling 40 red points will have to last for at least a 5-week period. No new red stamps until December 3.

PROCESSED FOODS: Blue stamps AS thru ZS and A5 thru W5, good indefinitely. No new stamps until December 1.

SUGAR: Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33, each good for five points indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for five points of canning sugar thru February 28, 1945.

GASOLINE: In 17 East Coast States, A-11 coupons, good for three gallons each through November 8. In States outside the East Coast area, A-13 coupons in new "A" book, good for four gallons each thru December 21.

SHOES: Airplane stamps 1 and 2, good indefinitely. Airplane stamp 3 becomes good November 1 and remains good indefinitely.

Shoe Rationing Still Needed. Present inventories and the present rate of production of shoes show the necessity for continued shoe rationing, the OPA and the War Production Board report. The statement pointed out that over-all production of civilian shoes of rationed types in the first half of this year was 134,065,000 pairs contrasted with 154,125,000 pairs in the like 1943 period, which was also short of needs.

OPA Guards Gasoline Quality. Gasoline sold at service stations and other retail establishments at ceiling prices set for premium grades must meet a minimum octane specification of 87.5. OPA announces. This action has been taken to protect buyers from any attempts to sell lower grade gasolines at the higher ceiling prices established for premium grades. OPA said most sellers are offering premium grade gasoline having an octane rating not lower than 75. The announcement pointed out that at present the Petroleum Administration for war does not permit manufacture of gasoline for civilian commercial channels as premium grade to exceed 70 octane a step necessary to maintain military supplies of higher octane fuels.

December 1 Gift Mail Deadline. December 1 is the deadline requested by the Post Office Department for mailing Christmas gifts inside the United States. Every citizen who is playing Santa Claus for loved ones and friends in other towns is urged to get that present in the mails by that date to assure proper delivery. The reason, say postal officials, is that Americans are expected to mail domestically

25 percent more gifts than a year ago—and at a time when the Post Office has fewer employees and less well-trained holiday help than ever before. In addition, the fact that more people have moved to different addresses to do war work is expected to mean that the average distance traveled by each gift will be greater than before the war.

PRODUCERS ATTEND TURKEY MEETING IN BAIRD RECENTLY

A report comes from W. M. Mendor, Callahan County Agent, stating that twenty five producers attended a recent turkey meeting in Baird, at which time a turkey egg contract offered by Root's Hatchery of Worthington, Minn., was explained fully by the hatchery representative, Ed Burdick of Coleman. The contract specified that the turkey hens be of the Broad Breast Bronze type, approved by a State Testing and Selecting Agent. Each producer should have 100 of such hens. Eggs would be bought from January 1, 1945, to May 31, 1945 at 24 cents per egg. The producer was allowed the privilege of keeping as many eggs as needed for next year's hatching.
