Funeral Services For Fred Helberg Held At Burkett, Sunday

Funeral services for Fred Helberg, 69, were held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 at the Burkett Baptist Church. Mr. Helberg was killed by gas in efforts to save the life of a comrade while working on a well near Echo.
R. H. Halford of Thrifty was in the well cellar loosening a clamp and was at work on an eight-inch casing in the water-filled hole. He came to the floor once, but returned and it was soon evident he was overcome with gas. Stanley Phillips, 32, went in after him and was overcome also. Helberg went in after the two men, and was also overcome by the gas.
Bill Murray, drilling contractor, almost overcame himself attempting to rescue the men, ran to a nearby field for aid. Returning with two men he used a rope to drag Halford from the cellar, gave him artificial respiration and carried him to a Coleman hospital where his condition is reported as serious. Phillips was recovered next, but found dead. Helberg died in the cellar.
Mr. Helberg is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Wayne Gilliam of Oklahoma and Mrs. Raymond Smith of Coleman; two sons, Sgt. Don Helberg, stationed in Italy, and Coxswain Louis V. Helberg, who is somewhere in the South Pacific.
Pastor of the South Baptist Church of Coleman officiated with interment in the Burkett cemetery.

REA URGES BUYING OF WAR BONDS FOR FUTURE ELECTRIC INVESTMENTS
During the first five years of peace the rural Electrification Administration expects to extend its power lines to 3,500,000 country homes including nearly every farmstead not now electrified. Today approximately 43 per cent of the farm homes are on the high lines.
But to enjoy and profit by the magic of electricity the REA estimates that these farms and rural homes must invest \$4,500,000,000 in wiring, plumbing, electrical appliances and equipment. That averages more than \$1,200 per farm. Many farms should spend much more.
So that farmers will have the funds to invest in electricity's "working tools" REA is urging them to buy War Bonds now. They point out that a War Bond investment today will "speed the victory and hurry the time when material and labor will be available to construct rural lines. At the same time war bonds will assure the farmer's ability to make the necessary investment in electrical equipment when the time comes to do it."
REA says, "Farmers who have already experienced the help and comfort of electricity will want to increase their investment in electrical equipment and appliances." It is estimated that added investment in electrical equipment by farms already on the power lines will total \$2,500,000,000. "For this purpose," REA adds, "many farmers have been earmarking war bonds bought from the extra income which electricity is already making possible for them."

Q. My son was taken as a prisoner of war at Corregidor. What is the remainder of his pay after his allotment to me is paid?

A. The Army will keep the pay for him and give him all allowances due when he returns to Army control.

Q. My brother was wounded in the Pacific and was hospitalized for eight months. Is he eligible for the Purple Heart?

A. It would appear so, awarded the Purple Heart if he must receive in action the enemy a wound which entitles treatment by a medical officer.

Q. Does a soldier's wife get hospital bill paid in case of birth or any hospital need?

A. Maternity or infant confinement, is included in the soldier's pay. Such aid is provided by the government through states having programs approved by the War Relocation Authority, Department of Labor, and other agencies. Information regarding such aid may be secured through own doctor.

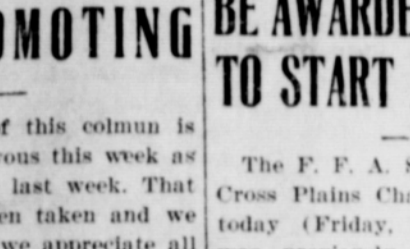

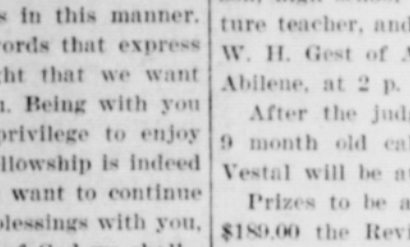
