## CLEAN-UP OF GRAVEYARD STARTED

### SEXTON EMPLOYED TUESDAY; WORK BEGAN WEDNESDAY; FUND IS BELOW AMOUNT NEEDED TO OPERATE; DONATIONS STILL BEING TAKEN

The committee selected to handle and supervise the business of the local cemetery for this year met Tuesday and hired a caretaker. At the meeting Fred Tunnell was elected to serve as treasurer and V. C. Walker was elected to serve as secretary, and liaison official for the committee. Members of the committee present were F. V. Tunnell, V. C. Walker, S. N. Foster and Clyde Bunnell.

Applications that have been submitted were reviewed by the committee and Clyde Slaughter was called in for a personal interview by a request of the committee. A discussion of the duties and other details followed, and an understanding was reached whereby Mr. Slaughter was employed. A salary was agreed upon and Mr. Slaughter began work Wednesday morning.

To date \$855 has been donated and is on deposit at the local bank. The amount of \$115 has been pledged to come in monthly. Thus making a total of \$970 for the year this is not enough to carry on the work for the balance of the year so don't fail to make your contribution soon as possible.

### Funeral Services for J. H. Shackelford Held Monday at 3:30

J. H. Shackelford of Kilgore, and a former resident of Cross Plains, died about noon Monday, February 5, of injuries received in a car accident. He was born at Blossom, Lamar County, Texas, on February 13, 1879. He was married to Miss Ruby Gilbert of Cross Plains on June 4, 1913, and at one time owned and operated a lumber yard here. Mr. Shackelford united with the Methodist Church at Weatherford, Tex., in 1926 and had been an active member of that church until the time of his death.

Survivors include his wife and two sons, John Franklin Shackelford a pilot in the Ferry Command in the European Theater of war, and Victor Gilbert of Kilgore; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Thomson and Mrs. Wilda Thomas of Glen Dale, Calif.

One other child was born to this union but died in infancy.

Mr. Shackelford was employed by the Railroad Commission of Texas. The body was brought from Kilgore Tuesday and funeral services were held at the local Methodist Church Wednesday afternoon at 3:30 with Rev. D. L. Barnes officiating and assisted by D. E. Simpson Baptist pastor.

Interment was made in the Cross Plains Cemetery with Higginbotham Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

### Eisenhower Waste Paper Drive Gets Underway Here

The Cross Plains Scout troop is requested by Mr. J. A. Kreh, chairman of the War Production Board, to join in a new paper drive to be known as the General Eisenhower Waste Paper collection program. A quota of 1000 pounds is assigned to each member of the local troop. Each scout who meets this quota will receive a "General Eisenhower Waste Paper Campaign" medal. On one side of this medal is inscribed, "Awarded for extraordinary patriotic achievement in the Gen. Eisenhower Waste Paper Campaign". On the other side is a picture of Gen. Eisenhower. If each member of the troop meets his quota the local troop will be awarded a 75 mm shell or larger from the Eisenhower battlefield. It will have a message on it from the American general.

This drive will begin March 1st and extend through April. But, since the waste paper is becoming a more and more needed item in supplying the army, civilians of Cross Plains and its trade territory are urged to save all paper, and either bring it to the scout but, or plan to have the scouts pick it up. To those out of town the scouts request you to throw the paper in the car and bring it to town as you come in to trade. All citizens are asked to tie the paper in bundles and save it until the scouts can pick it up. The government needs waste paper.

### LOCAL GIRLS WIN GORMAN TOURNAMENT

We were very proud of our girls' basketball team when it was learned they were winners of a tournament which was recently held at Gorman. They came up against some strong competition, but as has been their custom, in the majority of the games, they came out victorious.

### Raymond Tennison Killed in Action In Many January 26

and Mrs. I. M. Tennison reword Tuesday from the War Department that their son, Pfc. Raymond Tennison, had been killed in action in Germany on January 26. A telegram received reads as follows:

The Secretary of War desires to express regrets that your Pfc. Raymond C. Tennison, killed in action in Germany on January 26, 1945.

Sgt. Tennison was inducted into the Army on February 16, 1944. He was sent to Fort Sill, Okla., where he was transferred to Croft, South Carolina where he received his basic training. He was with the 69th division in Shelby, Miss., before going to Europe, and was with the infantry company when he was killed. Raymond was 19 years old and the fifth child in a family of six children. He received his education in the Cross Plains schools.

Raymond and his brother, Sgt. I. M. Tennison, spent Christmas together in England. It was the first time the boys had seen each other in nearly two years.
