BAYOU CLUB WOMAN HAS UNIQUE METHOD OF GARDENING

Mrs. L. J. Atchley doesn't let a summer drought prevent her from having tomatoes, according to a statement from Dorothy Wilkerson Callahan County Home Demonstration agent, Mrs. Atchley is a member of the Bayou H. D. club and at a recent meeting she explained to the women how she used the tub garden to insure a tomato crop.

Here's How to Make a Tub Garden

Get an old tub, several five gallon cans, or cut discarded oil drum in half. Cut long slashes about half way up from the bottom, 4 or 5 to the tub, 3 to a 5 gallon can. Sink the lower two-thirds of the tub into the ground convenient to water supply. Fill to the ground level with barnyard manure and cover with an inch or two of good soil. Pour in water until tub is full. Select a drought resistant variety of tomatoes. Set tomato plants opposite each other and about 8 to 10 inches from the sides of the tub. About 10 to 12 inches farther out and between tomato plants, set 4 or 5 bell pepper plants and 4 or 5 egg plants. Around tubs or buckets try squash, or cucumbers or cantaloupes.

Water thoroughly through the tub 2 or 3 times weekly. Keep the weeds down. In hot weather provide a shade and windbreak made from old sacks tacked on to poles.

Veterans Business Loans Under G. I. Bill of Rights

The necessary machinery for processing applications by veterans of World War II for business loans under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 (G. I. Bill of Rights) has been set up in the Dallas Loan Agency of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, L. B. Glidden, manager of the agency announced.

Mr. Glidden's statement followed an announcement from Washington, D. C., that the Veterans Administration had designated the Reconstruction Finance Corporation as an Agency to review applications to banks by veterans for the guaranty of business loans. Under the program, RFC will recommend to the appropriate office of the Administrator of Veterans Affairs whether that office should approve or disapprove such applications.

Loans applied for may be used in purchasing any business, supplies, equipment, machinery or tools to be used by the veterans in pursuing a gainful occupation. The Government may guarantee repayment of such loans to the extent of 50 percent, but not in an amount exceeding \$2,000 as its maximum guaranty. Thus, the veteran who qualifies for a business loan may obtain a guaranty for 50 percent of any loan up to \$4,000. He may, of course, obtain from his banker a loan of greater amount, for instance, \$6,000, but the guaranty is limited to \$2,000. In loans of less than \$4,000 the Government guarantees half; thus, in a \$3,000 loan the guaranty amounts to \$1,500, not more.

Mr. Glidden outlined the following essential steps for veterans desiring guaranteed business loans: 1. The veteran should first con-

tact his local banker. 2. If the veteran is unable to obtain a loan from his local banker, he should then apply to his nearest RFC Loan Agency for a loan. The address of the appropriate agency for this region is 301 Cotton Exchange Building, Dallas 1, Texas.

"Banks desiring to assist veterans in this program may obtain the necessary regulations and loan application blanks from the local regional office of the Veterans Administration," Mr. Glidden said.

"The requirements of the Law are that the veteran must be found qualified by training or experience to engage in the type of business for which he seeks a loan, the property sought to be acquired is reasonable in price and suited to its intended purpose, and that the venture is likely to succeed."

"The Act does not provide for loans to run businesses, the lender will want to know whether the veteran has sufficient funds for this purpose, as well as ability, dependability, business experience, and business character, to assume a reasonable likelihood that the veteran's contemplated operations will be successful. The lender will also want to know whether the veteran has been in such business before entering the service and the nature of his service experience and training."

PAW Has Increased Non-Highway Farm Gasoline For Second Quarter of 1945

The nation's food growers will get extra gasoline for non-highway use during the second quarter of 1945, says P.A.W. Petroleum Administrator Harold L. Ickes has announced the allocation of 1,270,000 barrels of automotive gasoline a day for U. S. civilian consumption in the second quarter of 1945, comprising the months of April, May and June. Compare with the quantity of gasoline made available to civilians in the corresponding quarter of 1944, the new allocation is 19,000 barrels a day greater, the additional fuel being assigned to

the War Food Administration for farm use. Commenting on this, Deputy Administrator Davies said: "The quantity of gasoline required for non-highway farm use always rises sharply in the second quarter to provide fuel for spring plowing, cultivating and planting, and we have provided for that increase as usual. This year we were asked for an unusually large quantity, with the explanation that it was hoped to enlarge the productive farm acreage of our country by about 10,000 acres. There has been an increase in the number of tractors added to the nation's farm equipment, and we are informed that plans have been worked out to run all tractors 20 percent more hours per day."


