IS THE BOMB AN ASSET?

The possession of the atomic bomb by the United States does not necessarily mean that this nation is protected against the use of such a weapon in the hands of any country prepared to use it first and ask questions afterwards.

wards.

The situation leading up to the attack on Pearl Harbor demonstrates the attitude of a democracy, such as ours, to the question of possible war. Our armed forces were expressed in question of possible war. Our armed forces were expressly instructed to take no overt act against Japan and President Roosevelt expressed a policy of letting the enemy make the first hostile move.

It would be the same thing with the atomic bomb. Public opinion in this country would not uphold its sudden use by our military men in an effort to beat the enemy to the draw. Rather like we did in 1940, we would wait for the enemy to make the first offensive move and, if the bomb is as effective as some people think, we might not be able to make a counter-move.

RUSSIAN COUNTER-ATTACK When the United States pro tested to Russia against the con-tinued presence of Soviet troops in Iran, the reply from Moscow was not an explantion or a justification but a counter-charge that the United States violated the agreement of the powers in

regard to Bulgaria.

It seems that the Big Three agreed at Moscow last December that the United States and Great Britain would join Russia in its recognition of the government in Bulgaria, provided it was broadened to include representation of the opposition. Subsequently, the United States sent a diploration of the composition of the provided its result of the composition of the United States sent and ploration of the United States sent and ploration of the United States sent and Great Recognition of the government of the Control of tic memorandum to Bulgaria, in which it suggested that the op-position leaders should be given real authority in order to meet

the requirements.

The Russian contention is that this suggestion violated the Moscow Agreement but Secretary of State Byrnes pointed out that actual participation by the opposition in the government of Bulgaria is "the very essence of the agreement." He insists that Russian Control Private Priv sia and Great Britain were consulted in the effort of the United States to implement a spirit of cooperation in Bulgaria.

SELECTIVE SERVICE

The Selective Service Act expires on May 15th, unless renewed by Congress. Legislation has been introduced to extend its opbeen introduced to extend its operations for six months and Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson, Secretary of State James F. Byrnes and Army leaders recently appeared before a closed meeting of the House Military Affairs Committee to urge that the extension be enacted into law.

Mr. Patterson indicated that

Mr. Patterson indicated that there would be no major reduc-tion in the strength requirements of the Army after July 1, 1947, until occupation tasks are ended, and pointed out that this represents a reduction of almost five million men from those expected to be in service on July 1st, 1946.

The Secretary of War also outlined the tasks confronting the Army. These included the occupation duties in Europe, Japan and Korea, the maintenance of our lines of communication and supporting installations for the occupation forces and the

maintenance of key points in the national security structure, such as the Panama Canal, Alaska and air bases along the approaches to

the nation.
In addition, new men must be In addition, new men must be trained to replace men overseas who shuld come home, there should be a force available to the U. N. O. an adequate program of intelligence, research and development, and finally, the nation needs a strong military establishment in a world which is still far from settled.


