Mrs. W. J. Cross Fatally Hurt In Traffic Accident Here Monday

THREE VEHICLES INVOLVED; DAMAGE TO PROPERTY GREAT

Funeral Services Held At Local Methodist Church Thursday, January 31

Funeral services for Mrs. W. J. (Bill) Cross, fatally injured in a freak automobile accident here Monday morning, were held Thursday, January 31, at 2:30 p. m. from the Cross Plains Methodist Church with Rev. D. L. Barnes, pastor, conducting the rites. He was assisted by Rev. C. D. Wooten of The Leon, former pastor of the local church. Mrs. Cross died in Graham Hospital at Cisco at 12:01 a. m. January 26, where she was carried following emergency treatment rendered by physicians here at the scene of the accident. Suffering from skull fractures, crushed chest and right arm, bruised lower limbs and possible internal injuries, she never regained consciousness. The tragedy occurred at 12:10 noon Monday when an army two and one-half ton, four by six, supply truck smashed into a car owned and operated by Charlie Smith of this city at the intersection of Highway 26 and Main Street, then crashing into the entrance of the post office building across the street, striking Mrs. Cross where she and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. J. T. Cross, were standing. The daughter-in-law received only minor bruises. Smith, whose car was involved, was slightly injured in his right shoulder, hip and leg when thrown clear of his car on impact. Both he and Mrs. Cross were given first aid treatment at the Cisco hospital. A third vehicle was involved when the car driven by Smith was thrown against a parked Chevrolet coupe belonging to Andy Bewel Neff and occupied at the time by his wife and child, both uninjured. Driver of the army vehicle, identified as Senadio S. Trevino, accompanied by John G. Pisci, both stationed at Camp Barkeley, was enroute from Camp Bowie to Barkeley carrying food supplies when the accident occurred. Trevino asserted the accident was due to faulty brakes. Neither occupant of the truck was hurt. Highway patrolman Sgt. Roy Kelly of Abilene investigated the mishap. Charges of assault with a motor vehicle were filed against the soldier driver at the county seat in Baird. Edna V. Colvin was born August 17, 1896, in Cook county, Texas, and at the time of her death was 52 years, 5 months and 13 days of age. With her parents she came to Cross Plains in 1896. She was "Coleman" in 1896. She was married to W. J. Cross April 8, 1913, moving to Cross Plains where the family have since made their home. To this union, three children were born, two sons and one daughter, all of whom survive her. Mrs. Cross became a Christian in early childhood and was an interested worker in the local Methodist church throughout her residence here. She was a member of the official Board of Stewards and active in the Women Society of Christian Service. Besides her husband, two sons, Frank Cross and J. T. Cross of this city, and a daughter, Mrs. Billy Jean Calhoun of Tampoc, Calif., she is survived by five sisters: Mrs. Connie Cross, Mrs. Emmett Harris, Mrs. Archie Harris, Mrs. Jessie Harris, all of Burkett, and Mrs. Jim Tom Ervin of Aspermont; one brother, Bob Colvin of Burkett and several nieces and nephews and other relatives. A brother, J. C. Colvin of this city, preceded her in death July 16, 1920. Active and honorary pallbearers were Fred Tunnell, Mark Adair, G. R. Neel, Brooks Eubank, Fred Stacy, Edwin Baum, Mrs. Vera Pearl Bunnell, Doyle Burchfield, Olan Wilson, C. C. Holdridge, Clark Anderson and V. C. Walker, all members of the Board of Stewards of the Methodist Church. The Women Society of Christian Service acted as flower bearers. N. L. LONG, JR. SHOWS GRAND CHAMPION CALF AT STOCK SHOW

"Chubby", a Hereford calf weighing 840 pounds fed by N. L. Long, Jr., and bred by Cox and McGinnis of Hyrds, was judged Grand Champion of the forty six calves shown here last Friday before a crowd of several hundred people. The show, an annual event of F.F.A. and 4-H club boys and girls, was considered the best fat stock show ever held here. Following the show, twenty-one boys carried 31 calves and 6 hogs to the Brownwood eleven county district show, including Mason county, where they won seventeen places and \$114 in prize money. In the wet lot division here N. L. Long, Jr., took first place with "Chubby", Dick Vestal took second place with "Stubby", a Hereford calf bred by Cox and McGinnis; third place, Loyce Edward Davidson with "Sideburns" bred by H. A. Fitzsimons; fourth place, Billy Parker Baum with a calf bred by Fitzsimons; fifth place, V. A. Montgomery with a calf bred by Porter J. Davis; sixth place, Dick Vestal with a calf bred by Elmer Vestal; seventh, A. H. Ringhofer with a Black Angus 1040 pound calf received in a calf scramble at the Houston show last year; eighth, Dick Vestal; ninth, N. L. Long, Jr.; tenth, Barbara Garrett. In the dry lot division Dick Vestal took first place with a calf bred by Milton Branch of Eldorado; second place, V. A. Montgomery with a calf bred by Cox and McGinnis; third, Edward Panacek with a calf bred by Owens Ranch; fourth, Billy Anderson; fifth, Billy Anderson; sixth, Leonard Jones; seventh, V. A. Montgomery; eighth, Sterling Gibson; ninth, Harold Garrett; tenth, Barbara Garrett. In the hog show Doyle Purvis took first place with a 280 pound Poland China; second place, Billy Foster with a Poland China; third, N. L. Dillard; fourth and fifth, Roy Neal Tatum. At the Brownwood show in the senior wet lot calf division, calves weighing over 850, A. H. Ringhofer took third place with his Black Angus; and Loyce Edward Davidson placed thirteenth with "Sideburns". In the junior wet lot division, calves weighing less than 850, N. L. Long, Jr. placed fifth; Truman Clark took eighth place and Dick Vestal, twentieth. In the senior dry lot division, Billy Anderson placed eighth; and Leonard Jones, twentieth first. In the junior dry lot class, Dick Vestal placed fifth; Harold Garrett, ninth; N. L. Long, Jr., seventeenth and Jack Lacy, nineteenth. In fat hogs, weighing under two hundred, N. L. Dillard placed first in the show; and Billy Foster placed fifth. In the over 200-pound class, Roy Neal Tatum took third, fourth and fifth places. In the "group of three" fat hog class, Roy Neal Tatum placed first. Following the Cross Plains show two calves were auctioned. The Red & White Store bought a 640 pound wet lot fed calf belonging to Dick Vestal for 20 1/2 cents. Tom Cox Grocery bought an 800 pound dry lot fed calf belonging to Harold Baxter for 20 cents. Kathryn Anderson won the \$100 bill, awarded in the place of a cow and calf previously announced, at a drawing held after the show.

Funeral services were held from the local Methodist church Sunday afternoon, January 27 at 2:00 p. m. with the pastor, Rev. D. L. Barnes, officiating. Interment was made in the Cross Plains cemetery with Higginbotham's Funeral Home in charge. "Deafy" Wright, as he was familiarly known in this section, was born in Missouri in 1851 and came to Denton county when a young man. He was married to the former Miss Marissa Ely, who preceded him in death eight years ago. Two children; a son, Cal C. Wright, pastor of the First Methodist church in Lamesa, and a daughter, Mrs. Cross survive him. A member of the Methodist church for sixty years, both he and his wife were active in the Cross Plains church while they lived in this section and both their children were converted in the old church, before the town was moved to the present site. The Wright family came to this community in 1884 and had much to do with the early development of schools, churches and farming activities in this section. Besides the two children, Mr. Wright is survived by seven grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren. DR. GEO. W. COX URGES CARE IN PREPARING RABBITS FOR FOOD

Austin—During the winter months hunting rabbits is a popular sport and a wild rabbit makes very fine food, but according to the State Health Department, extreme care should be used in the handling of wild rabbits to prevent a possible infection with tularemia.

"Those little cottontail rabbits are not always as harmless as they look," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "For some of them are infected with tularemia. This serious disease which is also known as rabbit fever usually is acquired by human beings through contact with infected rabbits or through contact with the infected insect that spreads it from animal to animal."

Dr. Cox cautioned that hunters should shoot only the rabbits that run away at his approach. A rabbit without the energy to scamper away from the hunter is likely to be a sick one that can transmit tularemia.

"It is necessary to handle unskinned meat cautiously," Dr. Cox said. "The use of rubber gloves will protect your hands since the germs may enter the body through any cut or scratch however small if an infected rabbit is handled without gloves."

As a further safeguard Dr. Cox said rabbit meat should be cooked very thoroughly so as to destroy any disease producing germs that may be present. This means that it would be cooked at a boiling temperature for at least 20 minutes before cooking it to your individual taste.

Some of them think it is compulsory to secure the duplicate from the office where they received the original card and are telegraphing these offices from various parts of the United States, according to Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office. The fact is that any field office of the Board will be glad to accept an application for a duplicate and thereby save the applicant the time and expense of wiring back to the office where the original was issued.

Ex-servicemen do not have to request duplicates from the issuing office. Without cost any office will gladly cooperate with the applicant and do everything possible to expedite the issuance of his card, Fisher said. Since several days are required to verify the number and issue the card, however, each veteran is urged to make application as soon as possible after his discharge, rather than waiting until he is ready to go to work.
