Poll Tax Laws For Voting Now in Effect

All World War II Veterans discharged within 18 months or less before any election are entitled to vote without poll tax. A Veteran discharged before May 5, 1945, should secure poll tax if he expects to vote in the November election. Persons who became 21 after January 1, 1945, or will be 21 before elections in 1946 are entitled to free exemptions which must be secured by last day of January. Persons over 20 are not required to secure exemptions annually unless they reside in a city of 10,000 or more.

Death came as the result of a heart condition described as myocarditis. He had been in failing health for several months. Born in Wright county, Missouri, March 2, 1865, "Uncle Marion", as he was familiarly known here, was eighty two years, ten months and twenty days of age at the time of his death. He was converted and joined the Church of Christ when he was thirty two years old, remaining in that church until fifteen years ago when he joined the Baptist church here. He was married to Miss Bonnie Derrington, who preceded him in death five years ago, in 1885 and to this union five children were born, all of whom are living. He was re-married June 7, 1937 to Mrs. Emma Sadler, who survives him. Funeral services will be held at Higginbotham Funeral Home at an hour to be named pending arrival of daughters from California. Rev. J. E. Miller, pastor of the Baptist church, will read the rites assisted by Rev. D. L. Barnes, Methodist pastor. Survivors include the wife; two sons, T. H. Moore of Longworth, Tex., and R. S. Moore of Big Spring; three daughters, Mrs. M. H. Bowen and Mrs. Addie Wheeler both of Tulare, Calif., and Mrs. Alice Cowan of this city; one brother, Pete Moore of Cross Cut, and two sisters, Mrs. Arthur Grist of Cisco and Mrs. Laura Grist of Meamey. Other survivors are twenty seven grandchildren, forty one great-grandchildren, and two great-great-grandchildren, as well as a nephew, Sam Moore of this city.

PAVING OF 3.6 MILES OF HIGHWAY 279 NOW ALMOST A CERTAINTY

It appears now that paving of 3.6 miles of Highway 279 toward the Brown county line will be a certainty, advises F. V. Tunnell, chairman of the local highway committee. Property owners along the route have come forward with every cooperation, says Tunnell, with highway engineers moving over the proposed road area and staking right-of-way. Fences must be moved inward at several points on the stretch. Attention is drawn to the fact that expenses of moving property lines will, in most instances, be borne by the county, subject to approval by Commissioner's Court. Approximately seventeen property easements, that is owner's release to the Highway Department, are being prepared this week. These must be signed and in the office of S. J. Treadway, district engineer of Abilene, by February 19. Contract will be let March 12 for this paving, along with a short stretch on Highway 183 between Baird and Coleman. It is pointed out that completion of this 3.6 miles will not offer a completely hard-surfaced highway to Brownwood, a length between the Brown county line and intersection of the Brownwood Lake road remaining unpaved. However, it is expected that when this end is paved, both Brown and Callahan counties will make efforts to secure completion of the unpaved section thus connecting Abilene and Brownwood, says Tunnell.

SWING OF SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

The third week of January saw southwest farm markets disrupted by rains, snow and dangerous highways, as well as unsettled labor conditions, according to USDA's Production and Marketing Administration.

Livestock receipts fell off to a mere trickle even at terminals which were not affected by the packinghouse workers' strike. Stock yards were closed at some of the more seriously affected markets, including Fort Worth which suffered most in the Southwest. Price trends as far as could be determined by the light volume of sales, were on the strong to higher side on cattle and fully steady on most hogs though San Antonio reported light weight butchers down 25 to 50 cents for the week. Sheep prices were mostly nominal due to lack of supply.

Both eggs and poultry, which had taken on a seasonally easy trend under increased offerings early in January, drew strength from the prospective reduction in meat supplies if the strike lasts long. Eggs continued to lose ground, however, in line with the gradually declining ceiling level.

Grains held firm at ceiling levels with tight supplies a predominating factor. Demand is very active from both domestic and export buyers. Feeds are extremely short because mixers are unable to buy the necessary ingredients. Peanuts also are below trade needs at ceiling prices.
