PROSPECTS FOR GETTING MORE PEPPER ARE POOR

WASHINGTON—The prospect of purchasing pepper is still poor, here's why:
There were no imports of unground pepper in 1944. The Census Bureau announced that fact recently. Virtually all pepper imports before 1944 came from areas still held by the Japanese.

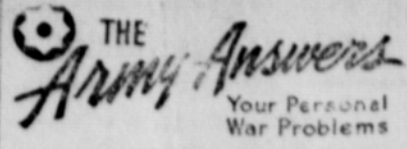
In 1941, imports of unground pepper were 73,957,710 pounds. This dropped to 9,099,821 pounds in 1942, and imports were negligible in 1943. Almost the entire stock of unground pepper entering this country in 1941 and 1942 came from the Netherlands Indies and British Malaya. None came from either country in 1943 or 1944.

NO MORE RATIONING OF NEW 1942 CARS

Removal of the remaining small supply of new 1942 cars from all rationing restrictions was announced by OPA. "Beginning July 18, 1945, dealers who still have new 1942 cars in stock may sell them to any buyer without rationing restrictions," Max McCullough, Deputy Administrator for rationing, said.

U.S.O. also has expanded another service to the wounded, through U.S.O. recreation centers established at all military and naval hospitals.

The Pacific war is a shipping war. Thousands of merchant ships, and increasing numbers of merchant seamen, carry the munitions, equipment and men required for the war against the Japs. Still others continue to serve the European front, carrying supplies and transporting troops home or to new battle areas.

United Seamen's Service follows the ships to all part of the world, to provide off-duty recreation for the millions of seamen at the end of their voyages through battle zones. Submarines, bombs and suicide planes are forgotten, at least for a few hours, as the heroic seamen relax in facilities provided by this great National War Fund agency.

In the Pacific, the needs of relief agencies are constantly increasing, as new islands and new lands are liberated. The people of the Philippines, who fought the Japanese throughout the year of occupation, are in pitiful condition, as are Chinese in areas newly liberated from the invader. Thousands of children and helplessly aged people



Why must we raise so much money this year as in 1944? Why, with the European war over, can't the National War Fund Budget for the coming year be cut?
Those are natural questions—questions which every businessman and war chest worker can be expected to ask. They are simple but important questions and, fortunately, can be answered simply and directly.

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LABOR ON MOVE CAN GET TIRE

Passenger car owners using their automobiles for bona fide change of residence for which they were issued special gasoline rations will be eligible beginning July 16, 1945, for Grade 1 passenger tire purchase certificates, subject to quota and other restrictions, OPA announced.

This restriction of eligibility is particularly needed now that increasing numbers of persons are moving from one city to another, OPA explained. It will allow the following groups to apply for new tires if they have a tire failure while making a permanent change of residence:

1. War workers moving from one city to another as production shifts from one type of war goods to another and to civilian commodities.
2. Members of the armed forces moving to a new post.
3. Discharged war veterans returning home or moving to another city to accept a job.

Just as the automobile could not become generally useful to even American who wanted to own a drive one until good roads were built, so personal flying will be grounded until suitable landing facilities are available everywhere.

There is little time to lose. American communities must get ready and plan now for this coming nation-wide interest in personal flying.

Mr. A. M. Burden, Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Air, to inaugurate the five million estimate flying enthusiasts may be conservative. Mr. Burden offers the figure: 250,000 pilots in uniform and 250,000 others in civilian life.
