Returns from Italy

Strong, who is a gunner on a ten-man Liberator bomber, has been based in Southern Italy with the 15th Air Force. His group has attacked enemy installations in Yugoslavia, Austria, Northern Italy, Czechoslovakia, and the Reich itself. He has participated in missions over the oil refineries of Brax, rail centers at Vienna and Munich and other military and industrial targets throughout Germany.

His wife, Mrs. Oneta Strong, who has been making her home in Breckenridge, met him in San Antonio and returned here to spend his furlough with him.

Following is a letter written by Pvt. John Paul Jackson, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Jackson, of this city.

Private Jackson has been overseas about 29 months and has been in some of the toughest battles fought in this war.

He decides to tell some of the things where he has been, and a recent letter received by his parents appears below:

Dear Folks:

Since they have lifted the ban on censorship I am writing you my military shoe leaving Fort Dix some twenty eight or nine months ago.

Overseas Boys Write Home Of Actions--Uncensored

The fourth day at sea we were hit by another ship and knocked nearly half in two. It took us eight days to limp back into Bermuda Islands. These islands are much like the States. Left there three weeks and landed in Casablanca (seaport of Morocco) twelve days later.

A strange place this was to a Cross Plains boy. The place is pretty but the Arabs are dirty. Our next stop was at Rabat, from there to Badou, on to Morocco, to Algiers, and our last stop was Tunis. Here the Arabian mosques are wonderful sights to see. Here the war ended in North Africa.

We rested in Algeria and Bezerta for awhile, then on through all of Sicily. After the fighting there, we stayed for two months near Palermo, then on to Italy. We crossed the straits of Messina and went to Naples. We battled at Magnino, where there was a constant pouring down of rain. From there we pulled off and hit at Anzio. This was the worst part of the whole war. We stayed there four months and got shelled every day and bombed every night.

Everything seemed pretty good after leaving there. Saw all of Rome. From there we went back to Naples, on to southern France, reaching there August 15th. From Toulon we moved fast up the Vosges mountains to Alsace. We crossed the Rhine at Mannheim, and then on to Karlsruhe. Here we were assigned to the Task Butlere Force and took off with some tanks, no infantry. We were cut off and had to have our supplies brought to us by plane. After this I went to rest camp a few days.

Our next stop was in Austria, then back to Germany — and the war ended in Europe.

Much of the scenery is very picturesque. I hope to see you soon.

HUSBAND OF LOCAL LADY PROMOTED TO FIRST LIEUTENANT

Cpl. Vern Morrow, who has been a prisoner of war in Germany, was liberated from a prison camp and is now on his way home, according to word received here last week.

Corporal Morrow was serving with the 45th Division based in Italy when he and all the men of his company were taken prisoners in the early part of 1944. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Morrow of Lamar, Colo., and a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Stephens of this city.

His wife and their baby, whom he has never seen, are making their home in Colorado.

Sgt. Travis Foster Returns Home From AAF Base in Italy

Sgt. Travis Foster arrived here May 31 to spend a thirty day furlough with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Steve Foster. His wife, who has been making her home at Melvin, Texas, came with him.

Serving in a Heavy Bombardment Group of the 15th Air Force, Sergeant Foster has been in Italy eighteen months and in the army thirty two months.

For meritorious service he wears the Good Conduct Ribbon, Presidential Unit Citation with one oak leaf cluster, European Theater of Operations Ribbon with eight battle stars, and three overseas bars, each representing six month foreign service. He accounts for 89 points, four more than the required number for discharge, although he believes that he will not receive a discharge in the near future.

At the end of his furlough he will report to Fort Sam Houston for reassignment.

To The Tax Payers of Callahan County

We, the Commissioners Court of Callahan County, sitting as the Board of Equalization, have found it necessary for a thorough check of valuations in this county. In the past ten years the valuation has dwindled from \$10,000,000.00 to \$6,571,647.00, approximately \$3,000,000.00.

In an effort to equalize values each tax rendition has been examined, compared with every piece of property in the Block or Survey, and raised or lowered if found out of line. It has been the intention of the Board to forget names and value the property for its true value. A minimum of \$4.00 per acre has been set on the poorest quality land.

All who receive a notice that the value of their property has been raised may feel free to appear before the Board and compare his values with those of his neighbors. We are sure that every person rendering property in the county wants to carry his part of the load and it has been our aim to equalize it.

J. T. Hammett Gets Discharge From Army On Points

J. T. Hammett, one of the state's outstanding amateur golfers, has been honorably discharged under the army point system. Three and a half years of service plus nine decorations gained on combat missions with the 15th Air Force netted him 139 points. Hammett's home is at Eastland, but is well known in and around Cross Plains, having participated in numerous golf tournaments at the Phil B. county club east of Pioneer. We might add that J. T. practically lived there after becoming large enough to swing a club.

Last summer, shortly after completing 50 missions over the North African and Italian theaters, Hammett came home in time to enter the Abilene 4th of July blowout. His game was far from his peak but had a great homecoming, anyway.

He has won practically every major invitation tournament in Texas at one time or another, but the victory that gave him his greatest thrill was in downing his old rival, Ivey Martin, in the Abilene invitation match in 1941. This was recorded as the hottest streak of golf ever played on the course.

Notes From H. D. Agent

DOROTHY WILKERSON
 The establishment of two new locker plants in Callahan county, within the past year, has multiplied several times the quantity of food preserved.
 However, we must not forget to progress in quality as well as our enormous increase in quantity.
 Using high quality fresh food is the first step, but wrapping, preparation methods, quick freezing, and storage temperatures, all are factors in obtaining A-1 products. All foods to be frozen should be stored in moisture and vapor proof paper or packages and experts consider a cellulose film best for this purpose. For meats and poultry, two wraps are recommended with string or gum tape used to hold the wrapper secure.
 Vegetables must have a heat treatment before packaging and freezing in order to stop enzymatic or chemical changes which impair color, flavor, texture, and food value. Fruits do not have to be treated, but should be packed in sugar syrup or dry sugar for freezing.
 Homemakers unfamiliar with recommended techniques can obtain bulletins on freezing of food from their county home demonstration agent.
