Body Will Have Control Over Funds 151 Million

WASHINGTON—Importance of the new Aeronautics Commission, authorized by the 49th Legislature, is apparent here recently when the South Texas Chamber of Commerce estimated that the state will build 532 airports under the federal program shortly after close of war.

Computation was founded on a report prepared from official records. It shows that, exclusive of hangars and other facilities, the cost of program will approximate \$121,000,000. Improvements will add another \$30,000,000. If this cost will be borne by federal government and the state will be the officials in charge of dealing with the program. It would also have a considerable influence in the handling of remaining half which local mental units would furnish. The act which created the commission gave it authority to advise cities and counties on the location of new airports and need of a measure of control over travel.

Through membership on the commission carries no salary, state observers declare that it will be one of the most influential of boards and may ultimately top as the railroad commission developed.

Governor Stevenson has been swamped with applications for posts on the board, but is withholding announcement of any appointments until the act becomes effective in September.

Southern Governors Meet to Discuss Future Policy of ICC Rate Case

Olin Culberson, chairman of the Railroad Commission of Texas, who has just returned from the Southern Governor's Conference held at Mobile, Ala., July 29 to 31 for the purpose of considering the future policy with reference to the Interstate Commerce Commission rate case, stated that all of the governors of the Southern states were present with the exception of Texas and Virginia.

Culberson, as chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, participated in the deliberations of a committee which has represented the Southern states of Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas and Louisiana in the freight rate case concerning discrimination against the Southwest. The Southwest Steering Committee, composed of one member from each of the regulatory bodies of the states named, was formed at the request of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of especially representing the interests of the Southwestern states.

The major action of the conference was the designation by the Southern Governor's of Honorable Van Norman of Kentucky to continue to represent the southern states east of the Mississippi in answering any protests of the order that might be filed by the railroads or other interests in the part of the nation and also the meeting was continued recognition of the Southwest Steering Committee as the representatives of the southwestern states.

Culberson, who participated in the trial of this rate case when it was held in Indianapolis, expressed satisfaction at the terms of the order and at the prospective benefits to the southwestern territory and particularly for Texas.

Culberson said: "While to the average man in the street this order of the Interstate Commerce Commission removing discriminatory freight rates over the nation might not appear to be of great importance, it is in fact the most important happening in the industrial and economic life of the south and southwest. It is sure to be one of the great dates in the economic life of the whole nation. It is a milestone in the development of a national policy that permits a full development of the resources of the whole nation and of the southwest particularly.

"Some people have doubtlessly jumped to the conclusion that the benefit to be received by the southwest would be that there will be an immediate migration of already established industries from the north and east to the south and southwest. This undoubtedly will not occur, and it is my opinion that the south and southwest should want such a situation to arise.

"It simply means that with the removal of discriminatory freight rates and the opportunity entering all areas of demand in the United States on a parity, this area will acquire a great portion of the 'new' industries that are in the process of being developed in this section. It is particularly blessed with raw materials and resources necessary for their development.

"The people of every section of the great country of ours should be the right and equal opportunity to develop industry based upon resources of their section. The right rate structure in the United States has violated this right and to grant this opportunity.

"There can be no doubt in the minds of any person that the entire industrial and economic picture of this nation would be more profitable if industry were free to locate where it could operate most profitably, without artificial handicaps. The manner in which freight rates have been prescribed by territories and zones has undoubtedly retarded this freedom to industry.

"It is to the inevitable expansion of industry and bringing into production of new products and the permanent establishing of the plants and their manufacture that the southwest will experience its opportunity for industrialization. America is not 'through' industrialization. Little patience is due the quality howlers and the timid souls who have no more confidence in the onward destiny of America.

SOME COUNTIES IN WEST TEXAS GAIN IN FARMS

ABILENE—Of the seven counties in this 8th Texas Farm Census District so far tabulated in the office of Homer Blankenship, the supervisor here, five show increases in the number of farmers while two show decreases as compared with the 1940 figures.

For the seven counties so far reported, the figures show a loss of 813 farms in the 10-year period since 1935 and a gain of 397 farms in the five years since 1940.

Shackelford Gain Remarkable

While most of the counties so far reported for the United States as a whole showed decreases in the number of farms since 1940, it is noted that five of these counties showed increases, the gain in Shackelford of 291 farms being the most remarkable change made in that five-year period.

Shackelford Stephens and Eastland are the only three counties in this district so far reported which show gains for 1945 over the figures for 1935, the increase in the number of farms in the 10-year period being small even here.

Changes in Erath

Erath county, which shows a gain of almost 100 farms since 1940, shows a very heavy decrease of 235 farms since 1935. Taylor county, shows a decrease in the number of farms since 1935, the loss being 178 farms.

Callahan county shows a decrease of 462 farms since 1935. Largely the decreases noted in the number of farms in the various counties since 1935 are attributed to the purchase of several farms by individual investors and their combination into larger units, in most cases with higher taxable values and better chance of profitable operation.

"The southwest now has a mandate to develop its resources in 'new' industry. If we should misinterpret this mandate as a green light to attempt to bring about a moving of factories and businesses which already exist in other areas, overwhelming opinion in other parts of the country would probably arise to in some way make the rate order ineffective. The only sound course, it seems to me, is to assume that the nation needs more output and new industrial plants, and to be sure that, largely under our own leadership, the southwest develops 'new' industries which fit our resources and environment."

WASHINGTON—The OPA announced last Saturday that a wide variety of shoes retailing for \$3.50 a pair or less will be released temporarily from rationing.

Effective from August 27 thru October 13, the release will apply only to adult's shoes in that price group. It was said stocks of children's shoes are not large enough to be included.

A War Production Board official predicted meanwhile that shoe rationing probably will be ended early in 1946.

DANIEL BAKER COLLEGE HAS ONLY WOMAN PRESIDENT IN STATE; AIM IS TO KEEP COLLEGE ABREAST OF TIMES

Elsewhere in this issue is an advertisement announcing plans for the fall opening of Daniel Baker College, Brownwood, which enjoys the unique distinction of being the only college or university in Texas which has a woman president.

Mrs. J. W. Trapp, the new president, is well known in Cross Plains and was connected with Daniel Baker College for several years before her elevation to the presidency. The following article concerning Mrs. Trapp and Daniel Baker College was carried in a recent issue of the Dallas Morning News, and was written by a staff correspondent:

late Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Adams, her father being former Senator from the Brownwood district. Of the three sons and six daughters, Mrs. Trapp was the only one who chose teaching as a profession. She received her Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees from Daniel Baker and her Master's degree from the University of Texas. She did graduate work at Columbia University.

For three years Mrs. Trapp was principal of Brownwood high school before becoming a member of Daniel Baker faculty where for sixteen years she was head of the department of education. While education department head, Mrs. Trapp for three years was identified with the extension service of Daniel Baker College.

The new president is familiar in every respect with Daniel Baker's past achievements. She will tell you, not boastfully, but with pride in her voice, that the college has her on five times more teachers than any institution its size in Texas.

She also will tell you that three former students of Daniel Baker served at the same time as college presidents in Texas; Dr. Umphrey Lee, Dallas; the Rev. Frank Turner, former president of McMurry College, Abilene, and T. H. Hart, who recently resigned as Daniel Baker president.

Renovation Planned. President Trapp places a valuation of approximately \$350,000 on the physical properties of Daniel Baker, including grounds, buildings, equipment and endowment. The late S. R. Cugin, probably the school's most liberal benefactor, provided that his estate, at the death of his wife, revert to the institution. Buildings will be renovated and grounds beautified before the beginning of the 1945-46 school year.

An ambitious program under the guidance of the new president is in the making, concerned primarily with the inauguration of additional courses. One of these will be the department of business administration. Then, too, there will be a speech department, with special attention to radio work.

To make it particularly appealing to boys there will be, said Mrs. Trapp, courses in agriculture. Elaborating on her statement that too frequently colleges have not kept their courses abreast of the times, President Trapp said: "Children now get from the radio what once was obtainable only by and through a college course."
