Q. Our son was killed in action in France and buried there. Now that V-E Day has come, wouldn't it be possible to have his body brought back home?

A. The bodies of soldiers buried outside the United States will not be brought back until action has ceased in all theaters of war...

Q. I understand that soldiers on pass or furlough are allowed to work at civilian jobs. Are there any restrictions on the types of work they can do?

A. The War Department policy is to encourage soldiers to use as much of their freedom as they wish in essential war industries or agriculture...

Q. My husband is an officer who has been in combat in Germany. Does the War Department policy for release of enlisted men apply to him?

A. Only in part. Although officers will have adjusted service rating scores just as will enlisted men, this factor will be secondary...

Q. Under the G. I. Bill of Rights, does the government loan a veteran money to buy a home or is the loan made by a bank?

A. The loan is made by a bank. The government guarantees a portion of the loan and pays interest for one year on the portion it guarantees...

BEEF CATTLE FEEDERS MAY APPLY FOR PRODUCTION PAYMENT

Cattle feeders in Callahan county can now apply to the county AAA office for beef production payments under the Government's new program to increase the production of meat.

The purpose of the beef production program is, (1) to encourage greater beef production by giving the feeder higher returns from feeding more cattle and feeding to better finish...

To be eligible a feeder must certify on his application (1) that he owned and fed the cattle at least 30 days before their sale...

Any feeder whose operation is carried on in this county may now file an application for beef production payment, on eligible cattle sold during the period May 19 to June 30, 1945 inclusive...

PAVING PLANNED FOR BALANCE OF HIGHWAY 36 TO ABILENE

Abilene, Cross Plains and Rising Star will be connected by paved highway this year as result of approval by the War Production Board of a 19.4 mile project on Highway 36, the 39th division Memorial highway.

The construction of asphalt paving on the section of No. 36 from 4.5 miles south of its northern terminus at highway 80 just east of Abilene to highway 183 was one of the projects just approved by W.P.B. on an emergency list for 1945.

Highway 36 is designated from Abilene to Freeport, on the Gulf of Mexico. With completion of the Taylor and Callahan county section it will be paved from end to end with the exception of two long sections.

Discharged Veteran Puts His Feelings Into Writing

Pvt. W. T. Jones, who received a medical discharge from the army May 22, had spent 15 years in the armed forces. He was a member of Headquarters Troop 1st Cavalry Brigade, and saw several months' action in the Southwest Pacific during this war. He was given a medical discharge due to a fractured back that had kept him hospitalized for several months.

Mr. Jones puts his feelings into a poem which he dedicates to his buddies, Jack Little and Jimmy Brewer, who returned home with him on the same ship. Jones states that Jack Little lost his voice while stationed in New Guinea from having malaria for many times.

The poem reads:
SHIP BOARD TALK
We talked about the islands, the jungle and the rain.

The Japanese and natives reviewed the whole campaign. How general waste still carries on. At times he has forgot, The Stacks of sugar, flour and tea, Standing there to rot.

Of all the bikes the army bought, Then took them back again, Perhaps they didn't know, New Guinea was a land of rain.

And how we had misjudged the Japs, And how our leg he'd pull, Now he's using a pigskin shoe, Our scrap iron, lend and wood.

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FUNDS ALLOCATED FOR TENANT FARM PURCHASE LOANS

Allocations among the states and territories of half the \$50,000,000 authorized for the Farm Administration's Tenant Purchase Loans for the next 12 months have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The remaining \$25,000,000 is earmarked for loans to World War II veterans and will be made available wherever the demand for the loans occurs.

The allocated funds distributed on the basis of farm population and the prevalence of tenancy, will be used in the regular FSA Program under which loans are made to tenants, sharecroppers, and farm laborers for the purchase of family-size farms.

Congress increased these funds by \$10,000,000 over last year. The loans, made under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act of 1937, can cover the full purchase price of a family farm.

They are repayable over a 40-year period and bear three percent interest on unpaid principal. One requirement applicants must meet to obtain a loan is inability to get adequate credit from other sources on reasonable terms.

An exception to this is made only in the case of veterans who show a need for the type of vocational guidance offered by FSA.

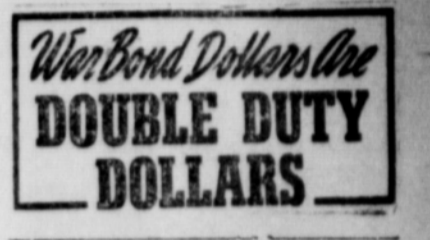

Federal land bank experts are warning that wheat is worth only what it will produce in an average year to sell at average prices and pay for itself at that rate in 20 years. E. R. (Hico) Endley, says cattle feeders who pasture wheat extensively needn't suffer losses from "wheat poisoning" if they'll provide plenty of carbonaceous feed like prairie or Johnson grass hay or bundle feed right along with the lush green wheat. The "wheat poisoning" condition, he declared, is a diet deficiency which can be overcome if the heavy protein in green wheat is balanced by the right amount of carbohydrates, and the cattle, themselves, will do the balancing if they have a chance.

Rabbit breeders around Ft Worth are declaring they have the solution to the meat shortage. Members of the Southwest Rabbit Breeders Association maintain that rabbit meat is the "best in the world," and can be produced in quantity with little trouble. Some Fort Worth cafes are featuring it on their menus now. Rabbits, like poultry, require shade and cool water in hot summer, plus some extra attention like damp gravel or burlap in the hutch and double roofs if hot shade. Their heavy fur makes extra protection from heat important. Dressed rabbits are selling from 50 to 60 cents a pound.

Eight weeks old rabbit, at about four pounds each, are popular on the markets, we hear, though generally the bunnies are fed 8 or 9 weeks to the weight of 9 to 12 pounds before butchering. Pests usually bring around 25 to 40 cents each.

Texas' current yellow grasshopper infestation is reportedly the worst since 1927. Some say it's 50 times as bad as last year. Heaviest hopper population seems to be along the principal rivers—Brazos, Colorado, Trinity, and in Coleman, Runnels, Taylor and Brown counties. Government-provided poison is available in 77 counties. See the county agricultural agent.

Veteran's Developments With the number of veterans returning to civilian life constantly increasing the U. S. Employment Service will expand its veterans' programs and activities immediately to assure adequate and special service to veterans, Paul V. McNutt, chairman of the War Manpower Commission, said. The special service to veterans includes a veterans' employment representative in each state; veterans' employment representative in each local USES office throughout the country, trained personnel to interview, counsel and refer veterans to jobs and to furnish them with information concerning other agencies set up to serve veterans; and to speed up placement procedures to reduce the amount of time a veteran spends in the USES offices. Insofar as possible, USES personnel handling veterans' placement activities will be veterans themselves.

Service women discharged under honorable conditions from the army, navy, marines corps, and coast guard are entitled to reemployment in their former positions, if they meet the requirements and desire such re-employment, officials of the Selective Service system said, in commenting on the fact that numerous inquiries have been received concerning the status of former service women in regard to reemployment.
