





TO PEANUT GROWERS

The following on h o g s an peanuts should have some weight coming from if. L. Poe, of East land county, far-famed as a hoj raiser. This is taken from hi speech before the Swine Breeder Association.

In discussing the subject I know no better method than to give a little of my actual experience, as my farm consists of sandy land.

I usually plant 25 or 30 acres of peanuts, dividing this into three plantings, with each plot of land fenced hog-proof separate. The first planting shuld be planted aour April the first, the second hanting about May the first, therehainder June the first. The April peanuts are ready to turn the shoats on by August 15th. Frovide the shoats with plenty of, pure, clear water and let them have free access to all the hardwood ashes and salt they will eat daily. Then take notice how those shoats are growing and fattening. When I see the shoats are having to rustle for peanuts. I turn them on the May planting, turning my brood sows on the

running on: with what scatter peanuts they find and vines th consume they keep in good breing shape. Never turn a brood s on a fresh peanit field; they to get so fat they will become alm worthlase as a breader.

An acre of peanuts should for 10 head of hogs for 30 days of more when the hogs will weig around 200 pounds; the hogs doin

The peanuts enrich the soil which they grow, the same as alfa fa, clover and cowpeas. Millior of dollars are spent annually by or farmers for pork products, who the thinnest, chespest sandy lar in this state will produce \$50 worl or an acre a year, the hogs dour ne harvesting. Like the cowpea the peanut seems to be especial adapted to the sandy soil and in climate of Texas, they prefer th peanuts to any other feed, both

pens and pastures. After a run of six weeks or months on peanuts the shoats ready to exhibit at fairs, to ma or to ship out as breeders, and



am sometimes asked the question in these peanut shoats are not too fat for breeders. We rarely ever injure a hog under a year old from getting him too fat, if he has plenty of ex, ercise. Feeding and breeding go to rether; you must develop a hog to the highest degree in order to bring put the best characteristics in him. Peanuts will carry pigs safely hrough from infancy and develop them into strong bealthy individuals juitable for breeding purposes and mitable for market.

Peanut fed port has a more delic loss flavor than that produced by any other feed; the highest priced ham in the United States is the Smithtield ham of Virginia and it's flavor is secured by using peanuts as a part of the ration while the hogs are fattening.

The vines can be utilized to good profit: they can be mowed fo hay, or can be grazed off by mile cows and work stock. I prefer th latter method of making use of ther as it adds greatly to the fertility of the soil
