## CLOSE OF SCHOOL

BEST SESSION IN HISTORY OF SCHOOL JUST BROUGHT TO A CLOSE

The 1912-13 session of the Cross Plains school, easily the best in the history of the school, came to a close Monday night with the graduating exercises and the awarding of prizes at the Presbyterian church. The initial commencement exercise was the old time exhibition given in the open just east of the school building Friday night, to hear which there was present an audience that used all the available seats and the standing room besides. A program of some two or three hours length, in which the children did themselves credit, was rendered.

Sunday Rev. Crane preached a sermon at the Presbyterian church, which should be helpful to every body and a source of inspiration to all ambitious students.

Monday night at the Presbyterian church the four graduates delivered their final orations or essays, interspersed with piano solos by Miss Shackelford and Mrs. Lindquist and a vocal solo by Mrs. Powell. The following are the graduates and their subjects: James Perry, "Ambition: Our Vision"; Vivian Nordyke, "Character"; Walter Causey, "The Call of Duty"; and Mabel Boyd, "Reward for Service". Hon. Virgil Hart who presented the diplomas made the graduates a short address in which he gave them some wholesome advice for their guidance after leaving school. Among other things he told them that their education, far from being a burden had just now begun, that they should strive to keep well informed at all times by judicious reading and study of current events, that they should make the living of a useful life their aim rather than the accumulation of wealth, and above all to take God into a life partnership with them.

After this address Supt. S. E. Settle announced the prizes offered by the Cross Plains business men in the various grades and the winners, which are as follows:

1st Grade—Story book awarded to Marvin Thorn.

2nd Grade—offered by Joe Shackelford—book—Bernice Haley.

3rd Grade—V. V. Hart—\$2.50 in gold—Gladys Adams.

4th Grade—Frank Carpenter—Dictionary—Clara Edwards.

5th Grade—B. F. Adkisson—\$2.50—Alex Ogelsby.

6th Grade—City Drug Store—gold watch—Esther Hall.

7th Grade—C. S. Boyles—ticket to Dallas Fair—Ernest Gilbert.

8th Grade—F. S. Bond—\$5.00 in gold—Rena Crane.

9th Grade—Davis-Garner & Co.—Standard Poems—Laura Boyles.

10th Grade—Carter & Kenady—ticket to Cotton Palace—Walter Causey.

Mr. Settle then gave a few words of commendation to all the pupils whether prize winners or not, for the good work they had done. He took occasion to say that Cross Plains school had the best prospects of any school in this section of developing into a first class high school. He said that all the whole community so far as he knew was in complete harmony with the school work, and wanted especially that this relationship continue to exist, with a little more active co-operation on the part of the patrons.

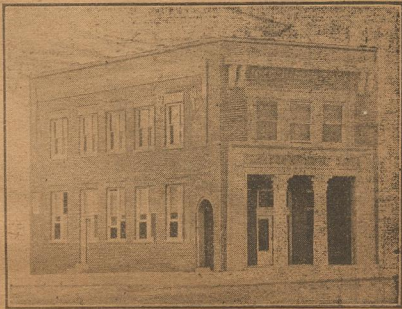

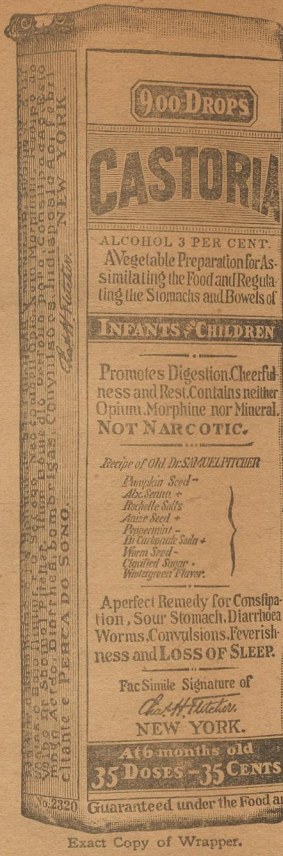
### MONEY IN POULTRY RAISING IN CALLAHAN COUNTY.

The poultry industry of Callahan county is assuming large proportions and the hen is contributing her share towards lifting the mortgages and swelling the bank accounts of the farmers of this county. The Federal Census Reports, which contain data gathered in the spring of 1910 show a total of 54,246 fowls, valued at \$17,760 on the farms of this county. The annual poultry production of 1909 was 118,478 head of fowls and 234,970 dozen eggs which had a combined value of \$63,494, according to the report.

Poultry raising in Callahan county when properly conducted can be made a most profitable investment. The conditions are ideal for breeding and raising chickens, ducks, turkeys and other species of domestic fowls, and our climate makes expensive poultry houses unnecessary.

There are 13,670,000 head of fowls on the farms of Texas and the annual poultry and egg production which is largely consumed at home is valued at \$53,000,000 which probably twenty-five per cent of our products find its way to northern and eastern markets.
