CLOSE OF SCHOOL BEST SESSION IN HISTORY OF SCHOOL JUST BROUGHT TO A CLCSE

The 1912-13 session of the Cross Plains school, easily the best in the history of the school, came to a close Monday night with the graduating exercises and the awarding of prizes at the Presbyterian church The initial commencement exercise was the old time exhibition given in the open just east of the school building Friday night, to hear which there was present an audience that used all the available seats and the tanding room besides. A program of some two or three hours length, in which the children did themselves credit, was rendered. Sunday Rev. Crane preached a

sermon at the Presbyterian church, which should be helpful to every body and a source of inspiration to

Monday night at the Presbyterian church the four graduates delivered their final orations or essays, intertheir final orations or essays, inter-spersed with piano solos by Miss Shackelford and Mrs. Lindquist and a vocal solo by Mrs. Powell. The following are the graduates and their subjects: James Perry, "Ambition: Our Vision"; Vivian Nordyke, "Character"; Walter Causey, "The Call of Duty"; and Mabel Boyd. "Reward for Service" Mabel Boyd, "Reward for Service". Hon. Virgil Hart who presented the diplomas made the graduates a short address in which he gave them some wholesome advice for their guidance after leaving school. Among other things he told them that geir education, far from being tete had just now begun, that should strive to keep well inmed at all times by judicious , reading and study of current events, that they should make the living of a useful life their aim rather than the accumulation of wealth, and above all to take God into a life partnership with them.


