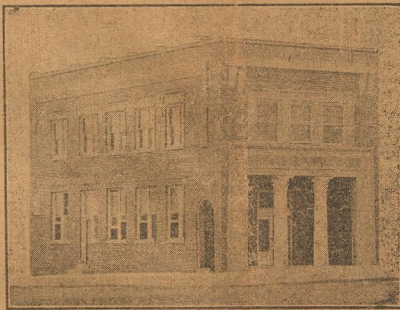

The election is over, and we are once again a democratic nation; but it does not answer for industrial development. Woodrow will not be much interested in our getting flour mills, peanut factories, and the like.

The half has never yet been told concerning our commonwealth's greatness as an agricultural state. It is not necessary to cultivate some of our best products—our pecan crop this year is enormous, according to reports and will be relied upon to supply the holiday markets, as there seems to be a shortage of her nuts. Great is Texas.

Pecans are bringing 9 cts. and more. Some land owners are realizing nice little revenues from their pecan crops. Here one could live without much exertion—one could make careful selection of land live off pecans and peanuts, vegetables, and a few bushels of wheat ground to flour, in the winter, all of which are easily grown here; any man can recall his boyhood days who will know how to get along in summer when water melons, peaches, etc., are invitingly tempting to every red-foot boy. Physically this part of the world is a very good Utopia, anyway. Socially, it may not be.

San Angelo is bothered with an overflow of lungers who have come that place trying to get admission to the state institution at Carlsbad tuberculars. What to do with these lungers, many of whom are penniless and penniless, has become a pressing question as a last report of the city council decided to buy tickets to their homes for those who would be induced to leave. To have a consumptive about you is to be in danger, years ago we were not aware that tuberculars was communicable, and has no fear from coming in contact with those afflicted with this disease. But not now—we are learning to avoid the deadly germ whether on the tent air elsewhere, Cross Plains doesn't need any state institutions it must be one that invites the affliction into our midst.

A news item from the Dallas market says: "Cabbage continues to be plentiful and cheap. This means that many thousands of dollars which formerly went out of Texas are kept at home. Large quantities of kraut have also been put up this season by local houses."

No one tries to deny the importance of an army and navy, but there are also other conditions which are very needful to the welfare of a nation and state. One of these is a strong and steady advance in agriculture—supported, encouraged and nurtured by the government. The time has passed when it is recognized that the "old method" will do for farming; that a farmer is either a laborer or a man of leisure who can, without scientific knowledge, secure in the fullest measure of success. And think of what the cost of a single modern battleship would be for agriculture. It would reclaim irrigate tens of thousands of acres and endow scores of agricultural schools or experimental stations. Agricultural success in Texas is handicapped by the small amount of appropriations allowed by the state for our agricultural department. 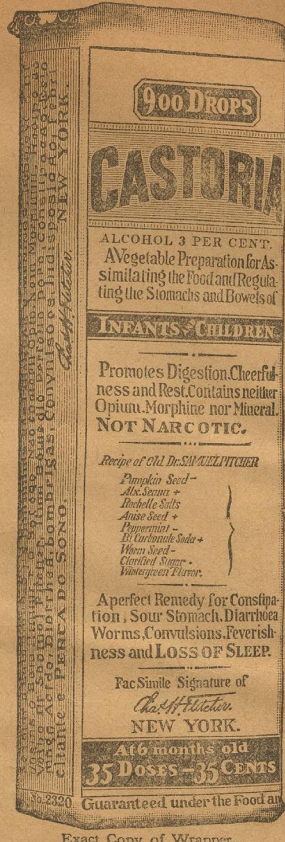
