WENT THRU STORM

Taylor and Broad Bond have returned from a trip to Houston and other points in east and south Texas. They had meant to go to Galveston for an outing, but were caught at Houston by the hurricane that did so much damage in that country last week. They say they had an experience they don't care to repeat, one they will doubtless remember the rest of their days. They were stopping at the Benger Hotel, which is ten stories in height and one of the best steel structures in the city. They were marooned here one whole night, about the duration of the severest part of the storm. Nearly all plate glass fronts were blown into atoms and the stores exposed to the elements. The worst part of the storm was from four to six o'clock in the morning. boys out of his car. The Sheriff who had just arrived, seeing the rough-play or fighting approached. Thames and told him to consider himself under arrest, whereupon Thames, it is said, slapped or pushed or knocked the officer to the ground. Before rising from the ground, it is alleged, Mr. Bannister drew his gun and fired, the ball entering the fleshy part of Thames' left arm, piercing his left lung just above the heart and coming out near the eleventh vertebra on the right side. Mr. Thames' folks who live down the Bayou from Burkett were summoned, as were Mrs. Thames' people of Goldsboro. Dr. McCarver of Brownwood assisted Dr. Pendleton to whose home Thames was carried in locating and extracting the bullet from the body, which bullet Dr. Pendleton still has in his possession. Mr. Thames at this writing is reported doing very well. It is said that Mr. Bannister suffered in brusing his lung from the fall, necessitating the services of a doctor.

We are very sorry to learn of this trouble, both on account of the man shot and the officer and the good name of Burkett. While Burkett has never been without some little trouble, old timers, say that this is the first time for twenty-five or more years that a man has been shot in the community. All deeply deplore this tragedy.

It is said that they had prospered and made many friends in the new home.

University Station, Aug 1 Cotton contains more cellulose than any other plant, the percentage of this material in cotton being about 95. From cellulose is manufactured, as shown by an exhibit installed in the University of Texas for inspection by farmers attending the Farmers Institute, writing paper, blotting wrapping paper, in fact, paper of all grades. Cellulose is also turned into gun cotton and many different smokeless powders and explosives.

It is put into a solution treated with camphor and ether, and put on the market as cullodium and used for medical purposes and also in the manufacture of various photographic supplies. Celluloid is made from it, which, in turn, is manufactured into dozens of different articles including motion picture films, which, by the way, are made non-inflamable by a special treatment. From gun cotton with camphor and castor oil used with paper and cloth, artificial leather is produced. From cellulose is made artificial silk by a process closely resembling the process which the silk worm uses in making real silk. Imitation horse hair is also made from cellulose and due to the fact that that the fiber is spun out to a indefinite length it is much more easily manufactured into horse hair products than the short genuine horse hair. Metal threads are also produced from cellulose, the technical name for which is bayco yarn and which possesses a desirable quality of never fading. Artificial straw for embroidery purposes is also manufactured. The residue from the manufacture of paper is turned into a paper yarn, which, in turn, is manufactured into cloth which can be washed and handled as other goods.

WHAT'S KATY TRYING TO DO IN THIS SECTION?

SYLVESTER, Texas, Aug 13—It the Katy railroad preparing to girdle this part of the earth; is its tentacles feeling out after new territory; and are there any indications to this effect?

The person who likes to soak up all the railroad dope he can find whizzing thru the commercial world may well conceive the idea that it is not so much hot air as facts that are floating about at present. The proclivity of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas to wrest territory from her rivals by first-in-the-field methods has never been doubted.

Roby people are almost wild with sensations that have come about recently through a well-founded statement from where it came. The Lord only knows, to the effect that with the completion of the Roby and North Roby railroad now under construction it will be turned over to the Katy and be extended to Snyder and to a connection with the line at Cross Plains. Progress on the Roby line is rapid. Completion of the grade construction is expected within the next week. Steel will soon be forth coming. But where is Willie? Where Willie is is no circumstance to that big question being submitted to everybody, which reads thus: "Where is the injine?" Roby people smell a Katy tar box on wheels coming to do the motive power stunt. Then the secret will be given away.

Down at Rotan the people have been plied with questions. It is pertinent that we state just here that Roby has recently "fussel" Rotan feathers, because some of the latter village have been told rather banteringly that Rotan is no longer to be the "big cheese" and terminal on the Katy, but have been

told that Rotan is no more to command that key to the South Plains base. They have been told that the Roby line will soon be extended to Snyder, the main line pushed forward through to Maryneal where it will cross the Orient, and extended into Buffalo Gap and probably into Abilene before striking across the virgin redlands to a connection with the home base at Cross Plains. Rotan people admit that they don't like the way the railroad breeze smells, but they still stolidly deny that the idea is a feasible one—evidently, as Roby boosters' acalaim, being a sort of bluff before the real thing materializes.

Maryneal has been crossed by enough imaginary railroads to have made it a sort of Southern Chicago.

Still the town lies somnolent as it did on the Orient steel. But Maryneal evidently is in for better days. Tidings come from there to the effect that some of that jagged country has changed hands. just a long strip. Farmers who cannot be made to believe that a railroad is projected through there are telling about the madman from the North who will have turrows ten miles long. Some land has really changed hands in that section and it was after a buch of surveyors, field men and rodmen passed through. Pretty good evidence, eh?

Indications, therefore, lead the writer to believe that something definite is in store for Abilene and other parts of the Gap, for Roby, and maybe for Rotan. But we'll stop here. We can't afford to make all the towns in West Texas anticipative. Only final stringencies such as the present European conflagration has bequeathed can thwart the aim of railroad men who see a great future ahead for invested capital in a coming country. As the present financial stringency is about to be dissolved into the circumambient ether, the writer feel encouraged to allow his belief to grow in the construction of this proposed line.—From the Abilene Reporter.

Some Marvelous Exhibits at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition

Exhibits in Agricultural Palace at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition Show Caterpillar Gaining Favor Over Lug-wheeler Tractors in Farm Machinery.

An observer in the Agriculture Palace at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition at San Francisco cannot help noticing, in the display of agricultural power machinery, the almost complete supersedence of the new design of power tractor, known as the caterpillar, over the cumbersome, unstable, high-wheeled engine of a few years ago. There are few of the old models on exhibition, while the caterpillar principle has been applied to almost every type of engine for agricultural purposes.

The caterpillar proper is a heavy sheet metal chain, varying in width from ten inches to two feet according to the weight of the engine, which passes around two heavy sprocket wheels like a belt. These wheels revolving, pass the chain about them, the lower part moving backward, with the weight of the engine resting on the broad surface of the chain between the two sprockets.

An engine of this type can be operated on ground soft enough to mire an ordinary farm wagon.

Duplicate of the Roosevelt African Shotgun.

A duplicate of the shotgun which Col. Theodore Roosevelt took with him on his African trip, a gun constructed expressly for him by an American armorer, is on display at the manufacturer's exhibit in the Manufacturer's Palace at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, San Francisco. The gun cost its illustrious owner \$360, and its beautiful design, graceful lines and wonderful inlay work would justify the expenditure to any lover of fine pieces. The stock is elaborately hand carved, the barrels and lock are hand engraved, and the lock is inlaid with a hunting scene in gold. The barrels are of the finest Krupp steel. Before starting on the trip the president wrote to the makers: "I really think it is the most beautiful gun I have ever seen. I am almost ashamed to take it to Africa and subject it to the rough treatment it will receive."

The left barrel is choked and the right open. It is cored to shoot either buckshot or a single ball.

In a group in this Palace are displays by four of the world's greatest manufacturers of sporting arms, which form an exhibit which attracts hundreds of sportsmen. Each display is in charge of a firearms' expert.

Pearl Culture a New Industry.

Among the interesting exhibits of the Japanese in the Manufacturers' Palace at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition is a demonstration of the methods and results of pearl cultivation in the far East. The displays of this cultivated product, showing hundreds of pearls which until pearl culture was placed on a commercial basis a few years ago would have been the possessions of royalty, will delight any lover of beautiful gems, and the methods of production will prove interesting to any observer. Though pearl culture has become a thriving industry in Japan, attempts to reproduce it in other parts of the world have yielded but meager results.

The successful method of propagation was evolved by the Japanese scientist Kokichi Mikimoto, who discovered a species of oyster which produced the pearl on the surface of the shell. Though the finding of the oysters and inserting the nuclei, then waiting for the pearl to grow to a commercial size may seem a simple process, the fact that it has not reduced the price of the gems, even to that of the most expensive imitations, shows that it is beset with many difficulties.

Daniel Webster's Plow at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition.

One of the most valuable exhibits commercially, in the Agricultural Palace at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, San Francisco, is an ancient plow displayed in the Massachusetts exhibit, and forming a striking contrast to the highly-complex modern machinery displayed on the acreage of floor about it.

The plow owes its distinction to the circumstance that a hundred years ago Daniel Webster's youthful hands guided it along the furrows of his father's farm near Marshfield, Mass. It was drawn by a yoke of oxen and if the future peer of American orators and statesmen could turn an acre of sod a day he had to work from daylight to dark.

The Million Dollar Apportionment for County Schools. Available on and after September 1st, 1915.

A school receiving State aid must be well located on a plat of ground not less than one acre in extent, properly drained and suitably laid out. The district must have a building substantially meeting the requirements of the State school house building law. Each school must be provided with necessary desks, seats and blackboard, and with such library, books, maps and globes as recommended in the State course of Study; the teachers employed must submit to the State Sup't satisfactory evidence of professional training and successful experience, the school must have an enrollment of not more than 300, and the attendance record for the previous year must not be less than 50 per cent of the entire time-of school was in session, and (not less than 75 per cent for the year during which aid may be given. The school must not be located in a city or town of more than 1000 population as shown by the last Federal Census. The district must have voted and be collecting a 50ct local school tax on the \$100 valuation; provided that for the school year 1915-16 any district which voted the required tax, whether being collected for that year or not, shall be entitled to the benefits of this law; provided further, the State Board of Education may, in its discretion, for time only, apportion any amount not to exceed \$200 whether any tax has been levied or not, etc.
