Cross bred their stock is worth a straight bred of the same age, but the deal as it sounds on the

surface. It takes plenty of feed to make a cross bred calf weigh 400 or 500 lbs. at six months of age, and whole milk makes up a good share of the feed that the calf gets. Suppose it gets a gallon of milk a day, for five months, and a lot of them get twice as much. At present prices that amount of milk is worth about \$45. If the calf gets two gallons, the cost of course is \$90, which doesn't leave much profit from the selling price of the calf. But the real loss, is to the future dairy herd. Six young housewives in a certain apartment house recently fell into a dispute which, by reason of the disturbance it caused, resulted in their being haled into court.

When quiet had been restored, the patient magistrate said very quietly: "Now, I'll hear the oldest first."

During the first nine months of this year 1,336 Texans have met death on the highway, according to the Texas Safety Association. This reflects a 36 percent increase over that of last year.

The commissioner of the International Boundary and Water Commission, L. M. Lawson, has notified Rep. Milton J. West that construction of 415 miles of fence along the Mexican border will be started next April 1.

Wide Board Makes Ironing Easier Many housewives are finding that ironing can be made much easier by using a wide, 20 inch board constructed to fit the regular ironing board.

The wide ironing board attachment has been introduced to many homemakers in the state, and they've found that it saves a lot of effort normally spent in shifting articles about on regular-sized ironing boards.

The wide board is not a replacement for the regular board, but it is useful added feature. Most suitable material to use in constructing the attachment is 7/8 inch plywood, sawed out to extend two inches beyond each end of the regular board. To hold the wide board in place, four wooden strips, placed underneath to fit the edges of the regular board, can be screwed in place. The attachment is easily put on and removed, and the wood clots hold it firmly in position.

Most ironing boards now in use are approximately 14 inches wide, with a taper at one end. The advantage of a straight, long board, six inches wider than the average board, is easily seen. Many homemakers have found it especially handy for ironing flat pieces, such as sheets, pillowslips, table linens and hand towels. It also saves a lot of shifting when ironing trousers, slacks and shirts.

Sweet Potatoes High In Food Value The sweet potato, which has long been recognized as an energy food, will also add a lot to your diet in the form of Vitamin A and C, as well as iron and phosphate.

By baking or boiling the yams in their skins, you'll get the full benefit of these food values, says Miss Loreta Allen, County H.D. Agent. The deep colored yams yield the most Vitamin A, so try to skip the pale fleshed types when you select potatoes for cooking. The vitamin content will be retained most satisfactorily when the yams are cooked in a pressure sauce pan.

Here's a recipe for yams on half shell that Miss Allen offers as one of the several good sweet potato dishes you can prepare: cut baked sweet potatoes in half, lengthwise. Scrape out the centers, being careful not to cut the skins. Mash the pulp and season it with salt, pepper

and butter. Then refill the potato shells with the pulp and brown in the oven. If you wish, add various other ingredients, raisins, coconut, pineapple, peanuts, pecans, spices any of these will add a lot to the flavor. And marshmallows or pecans placed on top of the yams make a tasty decoration.

Miss Allen says that this and other recipes, making use of baked sweet potatoes, are certainly worth trying, since yams are quick and easy to prepare and are a source of high food value.

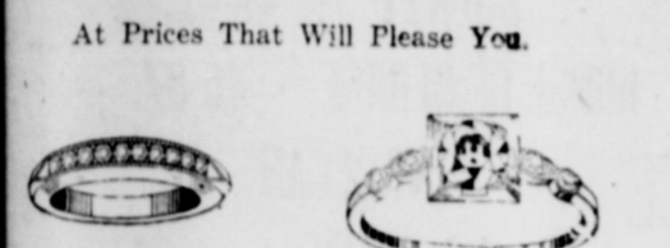

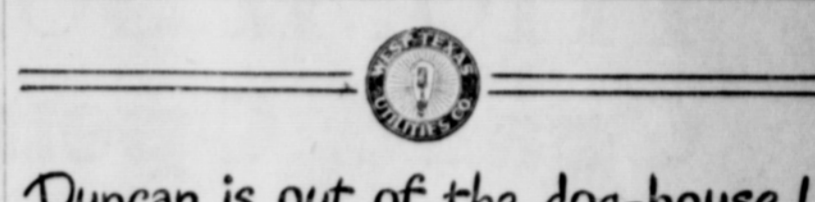
