

USING THE SAME RULE BOOK

Suppose you and I take identical parcels to the same post office to be mailed to the same city. Whether one of the clerks, or the postmaster him-self, weighs the parcels and gives us the postal charges, we will both pay the same. Why? Because they use the same rule book. One clerk does not go by one rule book, and another clerk by some other rule book.

The same principle is true regarding matters of religion and the salvation of the soul. The Bible does not teach one doctrine in one place and another doctrine on the same subject in another place. "The law of the Lord is perfect, converting the soul." (Psa. 19:7)

The Bible teaches us to walk by the same rule. "Nevertheless, whereto we have already attained, let us walk by the same rule, let us mind the same thing" (Phil. 3:16). The Bible does not teach us to "each go his own way." not that it doesn't matter which way one goes since "we are all trying to get to the same place anyway." It teaches us that there is only one way. (John 14:6). If anyone goes to heaven it will be by this one way. All others lead to eternal destruction (Matt. 7:13,14).

to eternal destruction (Matt. 7:13,14). If we all use the same rule book, we will all be only Christians and Christians only. That is the only thing the Bible makes. (Acts 26:28, 1 Pet. 4:16. Acts 11:26). If a man becomes a sectarian, he has to go by some other rule book. This is in itself sin-ful, for the Bible claims to be all sufficient. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is pro-fitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" (2 Tim. 3:16, 17).
