Peanut Producers To Vote By Mail In Marketing Quotas Referendum

BAIRD — Peanut growers will vote by mail in a referendum on having marketing, on their 1972, 1973 and 1974 crops, says Tommie Harris, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. The referendum dates have been set as Dec. 6 through 10, and ballots must be returned to the County ASCS Office - by mail or in person - by the Dec. 10 deadline.

"Growers have approved marketing quotas for each year's peanut crop since 1949. In the last year vote held in December 1968, 96.9 percent of the 50,358 growers voting approved quotas. We are hopeful that all peanut voters will use the convenient mailing system to cast their ballots this year," Mr. Harris said.

A grower will be eligible to vote in the referendum if he is entitled to share in the 1971 peanut crop of a farm which produced more than 1 acre of nuts. A landlord of a standing

rent, cash rent, or fixed rent tenant is not eligible to vote. It takes a favorable vote by two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum to approve marketing quotas for the next three years. Whether or not quotas are approved, peanut acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for government loans.

Mr. Harris explained that if marketing quotas stay in effect there will be marketing penalties on the peanuts produced in excess of a farm's allotment. Growers who do not exceed their allotments will be eligible for loans of 75 percent of parity.

If more than one-third of the growers voting are opposed, marketing quotas and penalties will not be in effect for the 1972 peanut crop, and loans to growers who keep within their acreage allotments will drop to 50 percent of parity. In this case another referendum would be held in 1972 for the next three crops.

Texas has received an allotment of 358,005 acres, which represents the State's share of the 1,610,000 national acreage allotment. There are 212 peanut farms in Callahan County. Growers will receive notice of their individual farm peanut allotments prior to the referendum.

"Peanut farmers in the area should keep in mind the referendum dates and be sure to cast their votes by the Dec. 10 deadline," Mr. Harris said.

Savings Bonds Sales Totals \$3,300.00

BAIRD — Mr. Howard Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Saving Bond Committee has announced that United States Savings Bonds sales in Callahan county totaled \$3,300 during October. Sales for the ten month period were \$91,252 with 70 per cent of the 1971 sales goal.

Series E and H Savings Bond sales in Texas during October were \$15,480,457. Sales for the first ten months of 1971 totaled \$167,863,056 which represents a 10.4 per cent increase over the same period last year.

Nationwide, sales were \$407 million during the month, unchanged from the same month a year ago. Redemptions were 10 per cent below last year's and the least for any October since 1962.

County Farm Bureau Sponsors Fire Prevention Program to Students

BAIRD — Nothing is fire-proof and anything will burn. This fact was brought out by Ben Bullard, Asst. Safety Director for Texas Farm Bureau, in a graphic fire demonstration held Friday, Dec. 3, at Baird High School. He illustrated this point, and many others, in the 45-minute demonstration, using a variety of materials.

The fire triangle board was used to illustrate what fire is and how to effectively control fires.

By igniting a piece of steel wool with a dry cell battery, Bullard proved that even steel will burn under the right conditions, and disproved the erroneous theory that a flame must be present in order to have a fire.

In a specially prepared explosion chamber, Bullard created an explosion with one single drop of gasoline comparable to a shotgun blast. The Asst. Director explained that a gallon of gasoline contains 155,000 drops and has the explosive potential of 30 sticks of dynamite. He urged caution in the handling and storage of petroleum products and other flammable liquid materials.

After demonstrating how fires can be caused by overloaded electrical circuits and improper fusing, Bullard pointed out many fires of this type are blamed on faulty wiring. He suggested that "faulty thinking" is involved more often than "faulty wiring."

The demonstration, which was brought to the Baird High School under the sponsorship of Callahan County Farm Bureau, is part of a long-range fire prevention program now being conducted by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department. The demonstration has been presented over 961 times for some 249,200 people.

Dicky Greenway assisted Mr. Bullard during the demonstration as the school's Junior Fire Marshal.





UNDERSTANDING THE SCRIPTURES

(continued from last week)

Another rule for studying the scriptures which we must observe if we wish to understand the scriptures is given by the Apostle Paul in 2 Tim. 2:15. "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

When we fail to recognize the natural and divinely given divisions of God's word of truth it adds to the confusion and controversy over the scriptures. Only when we follow the divinely given injunction to "rightly divide" it can we understand God's way for us today.

One cannot just pick up the Bible and read anywhere it happens to fall open and indiscriminately apply it to himself. Most people readily recognize this to be true regarding many obvious passages, but they do not follow this rule to its fair conclusion in other matters just as obvious.

Let us illustrate. In Gen. 6:14 God said, "Make thee an ark of gopher wood." Now, we don't hear preachers admonishing people today to build their ark of gopher wood. Why not? The Bible commanded it, did it not? "Yes," you say, "But that was a command to Noah, not to us." And, you are right. It is obvious that God did not intend for us to be saved by the same act that saved Noah. But, many fall into this identical error when they read the 23rd chapter of Luke. Many read this passage, especially verses 42 and 43, and conclude immediately that they can be saved just like the thief was. But, they do not believe that one has to be crucified like the thief was, just be saved like he was. If he were saved by what Jesus spoke to him, it follows that we cannot be saved like the thief was because Jesus isn't going to speak to us directly in person as He did to the thief. This language applied to none except the thief, just as the language of Gen. 6:14 applied to none but Noah. If we want to be saved, we must find the words in the Bible which God has spoken to all men for all time.







Select Live Tree For Christmas

Select a living Christmas tree this year, suggests Everett Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist.

After the holidays, it can be moved to the yard or patio as a permanent fixture. Any of a wide variety of trees may be selected, depending upon the area of the state.

Do not keep the tree indoors more than two weeks and do not place it in the air stream of a heater or air vent. The tree will probably require watering at least twice a week. Do not use lights on living Christmas trees except the small twinkle type.
