H. Bowman who is making a op on Mrs. W. R. Inving's farm crop on Mrs. W. R. Ivving's farm four miles northeast of town had
ast week picked four bales of ast week picked four bales of cotton off fifty acres of land, and states he will make as many more. Mr. Bowman last year rear the Star gathered aubto 11 bales off sixty acres in the weevil-intested country. His yield this year is
indeed light. but when it is recalled indeed light. but when it is recalled
that some or his nearest neighbors his crop looks goods. He says that he came from Central Texas valent for some time, aad that he knew something of the methods used in combating them. He plants
in March if possible, but this year in March if possible, but this year did not plant until the 14 th of did not plant until the 14 th of April, finshing on the 16th. He
advises continual plowing and the use of posion aud the picking off and destroying of affected forms and bolls. Exerything must be done to fight the weevil and everything helps. If he could have continued to plow after the rains in August, he states, that he believes he would have made seven more bales. Our rains came the 9th of August at which time he had 25 bales of torms on his cotton.
The coming year he will work P. Smith's farm just north of town. He means to plant only 20 acres to coltor and will use every means to defeat the purpose of the weefth he should not make 10 bales off 20 acres. 10 bales off 20 acres will be as easily made and gathered as 10 off 50 , for while the 20 acres intensely cultivated will require abcut as much work as the 50 acres under the old regime, the 20 acres of cotton will be much easier picked Those who for any reason mean to raise cotton in the weevi-infested infested?) next year mi he not in fested?) next year, might do well to study Mr. Bowman's methods.
