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Sign Large Carnival Company For Picnic Here July 8th & 9th

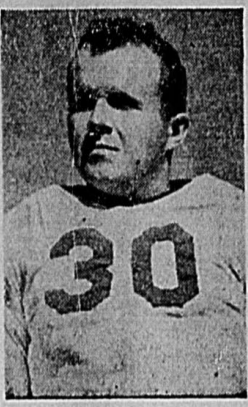

City Of Baird Sells Electricity To REA

The City of Baird has contracted to furnish the Taylor Rural Electric Administration electricity for its lines immediately West of Baird, it was announced by Mayor Betah Freeland.

Riggs Shepperd manager of the Taylor REA, and R. L. Elliott, Jr., Merkel, presented the proposition to the city council. The REA will take reserve electricity generated by the three-unit plant. If the use grows there is a possibility that a fourth unit may be added in time to the municipal electric plant, according to Marvin Hunter, city commissioner. The added revenue will materially help the city, it was pointed out.

Local Airman Training For Aviation Engineer

Pfc. Paul Neeb, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Neeb, who are rural residents of Cross Plains, has begun training as an Aviation Engineer in the Air Force at Fort E. Warren, Wyoming. It has been announced. Drafting, surveying and carpentry are other subjects taught at the engineer training school.

Foster Told Pavement To Cottonwood Could Be Built With No Additional Tax

Oplin Well Flows - From Ellenburger

Operators were waiting on completion of storage tank installation before continuing tests on what may prove to be a major Ellenburger discovery in Callahan County, the Anderson - Prichard Oil Corp., No. 1-A Tom Windham, 3 miles Northeast of Oplin.

Completing from two feet of Ellenburger pay, from 4,423-25 feet, almost 100 feet below the top of the formation, the well was loaded with oil for treatment with 500 gallons of acid. After only a part of the acid had been injected, however, the formation broke down and unloaded the oil load plus formation oil at the rate of 150 barrels per hour.

After the load had flowed off, the well was connected to the single 100 barrel tank on the lease and at the end of three hours had overflowed the tank. It was then shut in to await more storage.

Located 330 feet from the South and 660 from the West Line of the Southeast quarter of section 369 George Hancock survey, the discovery is on a checkerboard farm-out from the Capital Company.

Cottonwood Area To Get Deep Oil Test

New development for the area West of Cottonwood was assured last week with the announcement that Southern Minerals would drill an Ellenburger oil test on the C. D. Sammons tract, 10 miles Northwest of Cross Plains.

The test is a farm-out from the Woodley Petroleum Co., which previously drilled two tests in that vicinity. Permit is for 4,400 feet with rotary and location is 1,400 feet from the North and West lines of the Spotswood survey.

The recent location is approximately 1,500 feet from the Woodley number one Mary Murphy, which had good showing in the Ellenburger early this year.

Stop Center Parking On South Main Street

Signs were posted by the Texas Highway Department Tuesday morning, prohibiting center parking on South Main Street to the intersection with 8th.

Mayor S. N. Foster pointed out that the regulation was being imposed by the state and that the city had no alternative but to cooperate. "Only by special permission of the highway department are we going to be allowed to continue angular parking on South Main", Foster declared.

Highway officials have advised members of the city council that they intend to enforce the parking regulation and that if compliance with the rule is not voluntary that highway patrolmen were to be assigned to apprehend offenders.

Rising Star Thanks Fire Fighters Here

Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department received grateful praise this week in three letters received from Rising Star, as a result of the local organization's efforts in helping fight a \$200,000 blaze which ravaged that city recently.

Letters were received by Fire Chief V. C. Walker from the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce, Higginbotham Brothers & Company and the City of Rising Star.

The Cross Plains fire department is at present laying plans which members hope will lead to the purchasing of a small truck and equipment to fight rural fires. It is also an ambition of the organization to construct a fire station some time within the near future, in which all equipment can be housed and more capably maintained.

Cross Plains Enjoys Abundance of Water

Installation will begin next week of 87 new water meters here, the Review was told yesterday by Mayor S. N. Foster.

City water supply in Cross Plains is adequate now for the first time in recent years with present potential of wells exceeding consumption.

Water Commissioner Edwin Baum, Jr., told the Review yesterday that potential of all wells now exceeds 200,000 gallons daily, whereas highest consumption thus far this year has been 150,000 gallons daily.

At present all wells are not being pumped on a 24 hour per day basis, due to the insufficiency of storage. Both the settling tank and reservoir have been kept near full for more than a week. It is pointed out that these two storages give Cross Plains a reserve of over 120,000 gallons which could be quickly utilized in the event of an outbreak of fire.

COMMENCEMENT HELD AT CHURCH OF CHRIST FRIDAY

Commencement exercises for the vacation Bible school, which has been in progress the past two weeks, were held Friday night at the Church of Christ.

Because of much interest in a hard - surfaced farm - to - market road from Cross Plains toward Putnam, via Cottonwood, County Commissioner Claude Foster recently contacted a Dallas bonding company regarding the possibility of financing the project if 100 percent state monies can not be secured. Foster this week received a reply and analysis of the situation, in which it was pointed out that the road could be built with no additional tax to the district.

Based on the assumption that Commissioners precinct four would pay three fourths of the cost of construction and the state the remaining fourth and all engineering expense, the C. N. Burt Company of Dallas told Foster: "the present tax rate of 30 cents per \$100. valuation is ample to retire a \$50,000. obligation in 20 years and at the same time continue the current program".

Present assessed valuation of this district, which includes Cross Plains, Cottonwood, Atwell, Dressy and Caddo Peak, is \$1,364,000., and the total bonded debt is \$17,500. Of the bonded debt the Burt report says: "Your present bonded debt is being almost entirely paid by the state and your district has sufficient sinking funds on hand with which to pay your small portion of this outstanding debt. Therefore, the present rate of 30 cents would be applied to support the \$50,000 issue needed to build the road. It is evident from the study we have made of your tax structure and financial condition that a \$50,000 issue would not require a raise in taxation".

Foster consulted the Dallas firm after a delegation from the Commissioners Court had met with the Highway Department in Austin and learned that only through joint-sponsorship would state funds be supplied the project.

"I am not proposing a bond election nor am I going on record as disfavoring one", said Foster. "I simply feel that the public is entitled to the information and explanation as to how the road could be built. Sometime within the future we will call a mass meeting and give everyone an opportunity to express himself in this matter".

In addition to providing 25 percent of the construction expense and doing all engineering work on a jointly-sponsored farm-to-market road, the state highway department would agree to permanently maintain the road, thereby relieving the county and road district of that expense.

Local Utility Firm Using Radio Net To Contact Its Workers

Effective yesterday, "trouble-shooters" of the West Texas Utilities Company, Abilene-Cisco District, will get their orders by radio.

The work of linemen, installation servicemen, emergency repairmen, power dispatchers, and substation operators will be directed by two-way radio. According to an announcement by H. D. Austin, district manager, the West Texas Utilities Company has received authority from the Federal Communications Commission covering the operation of a two-way, high frequency FM radio system. The FCC license was issued on the basis of "public welfare." "The new system will materially help the Company in its efforts to maintain and provide interrupted electric service," said Mr. Austin.

At present, the system will consist of a 250 watt central station, and seven 60 watt mobile units.
