Cottonwood Area To Get Deep Oil Test

New development for the area West of Cottonwood was assured last week with the announcement that Southern Minerals would drill an Ellenburger oil test on the C. D. Sammons tract, 10 miles Northwest of Cross Plains.

The test is a farm-out from the Woodley Petroleum Co., which previously drilled two tests in that vicinty. Permit is for 4,400 feet with rotary and location is 1,400 feet from the North and West lines of the Spotswood survey.

The recent location is approximately 1,500 feet from the Woodley number one Mary Murphy, which had good showing in the Ellenburger early this year.


