Funeral services for Arthur Ed-ward Young. 74, who died in a Coleman hospital early Sunday morning after an illness of two days, were held at Burkett Monday afternoon and interment was made in the cemetery there. Mr. Young suffered a stroke Saturday and was taken to the Overall Hospital in Coleman, where he expired Sunday morning about six o'clock.

Tyson points out that the supply would be inadequate to cope with a blaze of the type which ravaged an entire business block at Rising Star Wednesday. "Water must be conserved", he declared, "as a precaution against fire".

A-No. The law specifically pro-vides, that the Administrator of Veterans Affairs in such matters is final and conclusive. Q-Tam an ex-GI of World War II and receive disability compen-sation. 
